Bill placed in JS to curb TU rights

The government placed a bill in parliament vesterday seeking to amend the Bangladesh Labour Act 2006 to limit the number of trade unions at the Chittagong and Mongla ports for ensuring better management.

Labour and Employment Minister Eng Khandaker Mosharraf Hossain placed the bill, which was sent to the parliamentary standing committee on the ministry concerned for scrutiny and placing report in parliament.

Once the proposed law is enforced, employees of the ports will be allowed to collectively form only one trade body at their work places.

Similarly, other workers and employees appointed by different berth-operators, ship handling operators and other organisations concerned to the two ports can collectively form one trade union at each port of Chittagong and Mongla.

authorities at the two ports will be allowed to form one trade union at each port.

"Trade union must be formed in line with

the provisions of the act within six months since the date of enforcement of the law," a provision of the bill said.

With the formation of the new trade unions under the new law, all the existing trade unions will be dissolved, according to a provision of the

The bill also proposed to make provision on qualification of workers to be enrolled as members of the trade unions saying one can be registered as member of the trade union on completion of one year's service.

A provision of the bill empowered the government to control the activities of the trade union and it may cancel registration of a trade body for violation of the law.

Despite dissolution of the dockworkers management boards at Chittagong port' and Mongla port, all officials and employees of the boards will be engaged as officials and employees of the Chittagong port authority and Employees appointed by owners of different Mongla port authority under the same terms of reference of their job.

Alternative submarine cable route proposed

PMO urged to consider Mongla-Chennai route

The telecommunications ministry recently has urged the Prime Minister's Office to consider Mongla-Chennai route for connecting Bangladesh with an alternative submarine cable line.

The alternative undersea cable line from Mongla, Khulna to Chennai in India has been given preference as international submarine cable consortiums are available on the route.

"The proposed undersea cable line will connect Bangladesh with other parts of the

world using the government's own fund," Sunil Kanti Bose, secretary of the ministry, told The Daily Star over phone yesterday.

He, however, said the donors may finance for this alternative submarine cable line.

The secretary said the private sector initiative would also be considered along with the government initiative.

"We also prefer the Mongla-Chennai route as it is more secured than other undersea cable routes," he said.

Afghanistan's presidential challenger announced yesterday he would not participate in next weekend's runoff election because his demands for measures to prevent fraud were rejected.

He stopped short of calling on his supporters to boycott the

balloting. "I will not participate in the November 7 election," Abdullah told supporters, because a "transparent election is not possi-

Abdullah made no mention of agreeing to take part in any future unity government with President Hamid Karzai, which the US and its international partners believe is the best hope for

curbing the Taliban insurgency. Asked by reporters if he was calling for a boycott, Abdullah said: "I have not made that call."

Abdullah's running mate, Homayoun Assefy, said it was up to the government's Independent Election Commission to decide

whether to hold the runoff next Saturday as scheduled. Karzai campaign spokesman, Waheed Omar, said it was "very unfortunate" that Abdullah had withdrawn from the race but

that the Saturday runoff should proceed without him.
