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president at the Oval office of the White House, according to a message received from Washington.

Speaking on the occasion, the US president said: "Bangladesh-US relations exemplify the vision of a partnership in protecting our people from terrorist threat and from those who might wish to destabilize democracy."

Obama welcomed, once again, the free, fair, and transparent elections in December 2008 in Bangladesh and assured to help Bangladesh "to extend its democratic roots."

The envoy reiterated Bangladesh's request for granting duty-free and quota-free access of Bangladeshi garment products to the US market.

Ambassador Qader, while conveying greetings from the president and the prime minister of Bangladesh to Obama, underlined the commitment to individual liberty and the cherished values of democracy, rule of law, respect for diversity and pluralism, shared by Bangladesh and the US.

He reiterated the desire of Bangladesh government to further strengthen the multi-faceted bilateral relations between the two countries that have witnessed a remarkable transformation since the restoration of democracy in Bangladesh.

Qader also highlighted Bangladesh's vulnerability to challenges of climate change.

Recalling his recent meeting with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in New York during the UN's General Assembly,

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alert so that none can take away their democratic rights," she said.

The premier said she along with the speaker made efforts to bring the main opposition back to the House but they refrained from joining the third session.

Hasina alleged that the previous BNP-led alliance government patronised militancy and criminal activities.

"Militants have acquired a large arms cache. We are sincerely working to improve law and order," she said.

"Even my party activists will not be spared if they are found guilty of committing any crime," she warned.

Referring to the recent labour unrest in Gazipur, she feared that another attempt might be made to create such unrest again.

The prime minister said anti-corruption drives will continue and the government will not interfere in the activities of the Anti-Corruption Commission.

She claimed that the country's overall situation has improved.

Speaker Abdul Hamid hoped that lawmakers will perform their duties properly to make parliament effective.

The speaker in his concluding speech said the third session, which began on September 7, had 22 sittings and passed 11 bills.

Liberal Democratic Party Chief Oli Ahmed and independent lawmaker Fazlul Azim spoke on behalf of the opposition bench on the last day of the third session.

They said law and order in the country has not improved and urged the government to take effective measures in this regard.

"Problems will not be resolved through speeches. Realistic measures have to be taken to improve the situation," Oli Ahmed said.

## Labour law

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Jamaat-e-Islami lawmakers opposed the bill and asked to send it to the relevant committee for further scrutiny. But their proposals were not placed in the parliament, as they were absent.

Employees of the ports will now be allowed to collectively form one trade body at each of the ports, says the bill.

According to the bill, trade union must be formed in line with the provisions of the act within six months from the date of enforcement of the law and with the formation of the unions all the existing trade bodies will be dissolved.

The bill makes a provision on qualification of workers saying that one can be registered as a member of trade union on completion of one year's service.

The Act empowered the government to control the activities of trade unions and it may cancel registration of a trade body on grounds of violation of the law.

Workers' provident fund, gratuity and welfare fund will be put under the jurisdiction of the port authorities concerned and the authorities will maintain and conduct those.

Obama described her as a pragmatic, wise leader.

Obama also recalled Hasina's invitation and assured that he was looking forward to visit Bangladesh.

The US president warmly welcomed the ambassador to the Washington DC and said Bangladesh, by virtue of her firm belief in democracy, remains a natural partner of the US.

He highlighted the broad range of strategic interests and fundamental democratic values shared by the two countries.

Referring to his Cairo speech, Obama reiterated his desire to see a Muslim majority Bangladesh where economy is "robust," educational opportunities are in "abundance" and international investments are in "plenty."

Earlier, Qader was greeted with a guard of honour from a smart contingent of US Marines on arrival at the entrance of White House.

## Textbook

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secondary level, 1.51 crore for Dakhil, 1.74 crore for Ibtidai and 16.4 lakh for Technical Board books.

Till yesterday around 58 percent of the textbooks were printed.

Around 22.38 percent books for the primary schools, 44.39 percent for the secondary schools, 84 percent for the Ibtidai have already been sent to deputy commissioners of districts and upazila nirbahi officers for distribution, sources said.

Besides, around 12.6 percent of Technical Board books have been printed and 4.4 percent of Dakhil books have been sent to the districts.

It will take a few days to complete the printing of Dakhil and technical board books, as the number of books to be printed is small, sources said.

However, distributions might be delayed, as the binders will be on leave during Eid-ul-Azha, officials said.

The education ministry at a meeting yesterday decided to request the binders to resume their work as early as possible after the vacation.

"Printing 19 crore books is a big task and NCTB earlier faced difficulties in distributing 7 crore free textbooks in time in the beginning of this year," the minister said.

The National Monitoring Committee led by education ministry asked the printers at the meeting on November 1 to expedite their work.

## 4 injured

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The injured were identified as Sheikh Nazrul Islam, 43, Bagerhat district AL leader, his friend Nasir Uddin, 44, Kachua upazila union AL joint secretary, Abdur Rashid, 58, a former accountant of PWD, and shoe factory employee Kartik Das, 40.

All the injured were admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH).

DMCH sources said tiny pieces of broken glasses were found in the flesh of the wounded people.

Injured AL leader Nazrul Islam said, "We heard a big bang and then I found blood spurting from my body."

Other injured Rashid and Kartik said they were hit by shrapnel as they were waiting for buses at around 2:30pm.

Contacted, Inspector General of Police (IGP) Nur Mohammad told The Daily Star, "The motive behind the explosion and the persons behind the attack could not be known immediately."

Major MM Shafiqur Rahman of Rapid Action Battalion (Rab-3) said, "We are yet to make sure if the bomb was exploded on any of the injured people."

"So far we have not been able to collect any evidence from the spot and none has been arrested in this connection," he said.

## 20 BDR men seek to retract confessions

Twenty Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) members yesterday appealed to a Dhaka court to let them retract their confessional statements in the BDR mutiny case.

Metropolitan Magistrate Muminul Hassan asked the authorities concerned to put the petitions in the file of the carnage case.

In the petitions, the arrestees told the court they were tortured inhumanly during remand to give the confessional statements.

Earlier, twenty other BDR jawans had submitted their appeals to the same court to let them retract their confessional statements.

The carnage at the BDR headquarters on February 25-26 left a number of BDR high officials including its director general dead.

Criminal Investigation Department had so far arrested a total of 2088 BDR members and civilians for their alleged involvement with the carnage.

Of them, a total of 2071 members were remanded while 471 gave confessional statements.

Former BNP lawmaker Nasiruddin Ahmed Pintu and Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal leader Muhammad Ullah Palash were earlier arrested in the case.

Awami League leader Torab Ali was arrested in the case and he gave confessional statement before the magistrate.

## US embassy

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Islam told The Daily Star that they had picked up the militants from Lalkhan Bazar Madrasa located on the top of a hill and founded by Mufti Izahar.

The arrestees were taken to Dhaka last night and would be produced before court today.

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interfere in tender bidding. She also asked them to refrain from any wrongdoings.

"The party chief has said that no criminal activity, tender manipulation and extortion in the name of Awami League will be tolerated," said Ashrafur Islam.

Hasina also directed the lawmakers to keep tie with the party leaders in their constituencies and warned that any split in the party would not be accepted.

She also asked them not to visit Bangladesh Secretariat frequently.

The LGRD and cooperatives minister informed the meeting that an amount of Tk 15 crore has been allocated for each of the 300 constituencies for the rural infrastructure development activities for the FY 2009-2010. The prime minister asked the lawmakers to oversee the development activities with the allocation for their constituencies.

She also directed them to face the media very carefully and without going harsh.

"Don't react sharply with the media," a lawmaker quoted Hasina as saying.

The AL president instructed the party leaders to prepare a database of all leaders of the party and collect primary membership across the country.

"We will hold councils of upazila, union and ward units after completing the members' recruitment across the country so that the next general council of the party is held in three years as stipulated in the Awami League constitution," the AL general secretary said.

## 'Crossfire' only worry

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Sources in the home ministry say there is pressure from Ansar not to rehabilitate any outlaws in the force this time as many of those rehabilitated in 1999 deserted the force later.

But the situation is different this time as deaths in so-called shootouts or crossfire have been occurring for the last five years. Some of the well-known top tier leaders including Mofakkar Chowdhury and Dr Mizanur Rahman Tutul were killed in similar fashion during the BNP-Jamaat rule.

A number of dreaded outlaw leaders were also killed in 'crossfire' or 'shootouts' with law enforcers. Only infamous outlaws like 'Kashai' Siraj and Laltu who killed scores of people, many by burning alive in brick kilns, are still in jail since they surrendered in 1999.

The current leadership in Kushtia fears they might face the same fate of 62 'comrades', who were killed in 'shootouts' since the ongoing crackdown on outlaws began on August 22.

The Prime Minister's Office gave the order for massive crackdown on the outlaws due to a serious slide in law and order in the region marked by frequent killings.

Sources say against this backdrop, leaders of different factions of outlawed outfits and underground parties now consider surrender and return to "normal" life.

Home Minister Sahara Khatun on October 12 informed the House the government would soon announce its surrender offer so that the outlaws may return to "normal" life.

However, cross-section of people expressed dismay over the government move and said giving such opportunities might be "futile" like in 1999.

Members of the law-enforcement agencies are also against the surrender move right now and are eager to continue the operation to arrest the outlaws.

"We want to see an end to the outlaw problem and want security to our lives," said a local businessman wishing

anonymity.

A list prepared in September-November last year on 13 underground parties and crime rackets mentions names of 2,847 cadres and their godfathers, mostly from 23 southwest and northwest districts.

The list also includes names of 80 kingpins and 150 patrons from mainstream politics.

Sources in Rapid Action Battalion could not say for sure how many firearms the outlaws, underground parties and crime rackets posses but hinted that every active member has at least one gun.

However, a report prepared by a law-enforcement agency around a year ago gives some specific impression about the strength of some of those underground parties.

Purba Banglar Communist Party's (PBCP) ML-Janajuddha faction has 50 to 60 active cadres. The outfit has firearms like M16 and AK47 assault rifles, .303 rifles, 9 shooters, shotguns, single and double barrel guns, locally made and foreign pistols and revolvers and light guns (LG).

PBCP (ML-Red Flag) cadres possess AK47 rifles, single and double barrel guns, local and foreign pistols and revolvers, LGs and bombs.

PBCP (ML mainstream or followers of Mofakkar) has around 50 armed cadres, who use Indian and locally manufactured arms and bombs.

Biplabi Communist Party (Haque Group) has over 50 armed cadres, who have AK47, 9 shooter guns, single and double barrel guns, local and foreign pistols and revolvers, LGs and bombs.

The report states that most of the firearms and ammunition are smuggled in from India, though some underground parties smuggle weapons from Myanmar through Bandarban and Cox's Bazar borders.

## RMG culprits

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The government would take measures to elevate the BGMEA Institute of Fashion and Technology (BIFT) to a university to meet the growing demand of skilled manpower in the sector.

Mentioning her government's development scheme as the development of rural economy Hasina asked the owners to employ more skilled people to reduce poverty.

Admitting the negative impact of global recession she said the government has already formed a taskforce committee to address the problems in the sector.

The PM said the owners should not to make profit only but to pay more attention to the workers.

Hasina also suggested exploring the potentialities of new apparel markets in Australia, Argentina, Brazil, Mexico and South Africa. "We should not restrict our markets only to the USA and the EU," she said.

The manufacturers should not rely only on making clothes, she said, adding that they should develop innovative designs to be more competitive in the global apparel market.

The scenario of the country's apparel sector will change a lot if Bangladesh can obtain duty-free and quota-free (DFQF) access to the US

market, she said.

She asked the manufacturers to work to attain DFQF access in the US market, as the government will play a supportive role in this venture.

At his speech as the special guest, Finance Minister AMA Muhith said he would take measures to improve the sick industries. He suggested the entrepreneurs to go for loans form the government's housing fund to build dormitories for the workers.

He said at present the government gives Tk 1 crore as loan to set up effluent treatment plants (ETP) in the factories. "We have a plan to increase the loan amount in near future," he added.

LRGD (Local Government and Rural Development) and Cooperatives Minister Syed Ashrafur Islam said female workers of rural areas now play an important role in the family, as they have become breadwinners with the rapidly growing RMG sector in the country.

In his speech BGMEA President Abdus Salam Mursheyed demanded that the government increase incentives on total export performance, reschedule facilities for bank loan, improve of law and order and give 5 percent subsidy on bank interest rates.

Commerce Minister Faruk Khan, among others, spoke at the inaugural ceremony.

A number of BNP leaders met the party chairperson to discuss the issue at her Gulshan office on Wednesday night.

"The chairperson discussed the matter with us after we received information that ruling party men with the help of local administration are planning to foil BNP council in some districts," Goyeshwar Chandra Roy, BNP joint secretary general, told The Daily Star yesterday.

He said the party chief asked them to settle all internal disputes immediately to complete the party's reorganization process at the field level by December 4.

Meantime, the sub-committee on foreign affairs led by Shafiq Rehman threw a

tea party for foreign diplomats and invited them to the party's national council. The committee also plans to invite international leaders and renowned personalities to its council.

The sub-committee on constitution and declaration led by former minister Tariqul Islam at a meeting at the party office last night discussed placing of proposals for amending the party constitution.

The sub-committee on management headed by Mirza Abbas at a meeting on Wednesday made a few decisions on arrangement for the national council.

The two sub-committees on publicity, and office and communications led by Goyeshwar and Rizvi Ahmed have sat twice to discuss issues related to the national council.

BNP on October 22 formed 12 sub-committees as part of its preparation to hold a national council slated for December 8.

Maj (ret'd) Bazul Huda, on a four-day remand and Nazmul Hasan Sohel and Mahbubul Hasan Emran, sons of Lt Col (ret'd) Mohiuddin Ahmed, another convict of August 15 killings case, and Freedom Party leader Abdur Rahim on one-day fresh remand.

Besides, he sent Kamrul Haque Swapan, younger brother of Maj (ret'd) Dalim, another convict in Bangabandhu murder case, and Freedom Party leader Shafiuddin Sofu to jail.

Earlier, Swapan had been grilled for 12 days while Sofu for six days in two spells of remands in the bomb attack case, police said.

In a forwarding report placed before the court, Assistant Commissioner Akbar Hossain stated that they had information about Ataul taking part in the bomb attack.

He also mentioned that following the incident, Ataul escaped to Alamdanga for regrouping Freedom Party activists to carry out further subversive activities.

In his statement, Akbar said they needed to verify the information extracted from Swapan and Sofu regarding the bomb attack.

Detective police arrested seven people for their suspected links to the bomb attack, and five of them are from the families of convicted killers of Bangabandhu.

Lawmaker Taposh came under bomb attack on October 21 night that left at least 13 people injured. Taposh escaped unhurt.

the town yesterday, in a second incident after police launched a drive to nab women armed cadres of outlawed parties.

She was identified as Nahid Parvin Champa, 23, daughter of Abu Bakar Siddik, a cadre of GMF.

On Wednesday, police arrested Baishakhi Rahman Chumki, 22, a suspected female GMF activist, less than 48 hours after the arrest of Mahila Awami League (AL) town union general secretary Taslima Khan Ankhi, her accomplice Rani and three other top cadres of GMF.

Police said the relation among the top brasses of the outlawed parties and the women was confirmed through checking the mobile phone call list of Ankhi and Rani.

Sources in the police said a good number of women involved in outlawed party activities are either members of mainstream political parties or maintain relations with influential political leaders.

Police also said they raided a house owned by Tushar around 3:00pm following information gleaned from Ankhi and arrested Champa where she took shelter to avoid arrest.

Later, Chumki also provided more information about their activities and on some

women involved with their ring.

Though police got the names of two sisters -- Champa and Nasrin -- of Aruapara, the latter remains untraced.

Meanwhile, Ankhi and Rani with their three accomplices are being interrogated by district police after Kushtia chief judicial magistrate court placed them on a five-day remand on Wednesday.

"The outlawed outfits are using women -- a safe medium for preserving and transporting their weapons to different places, just before any 'operation' by the outfits," said Alamgir Hossain, assistant police super (headquarters) of Kushtia, also the coordinator of the drive.

According to sources, at least 25-30 women, using veil (Burkha), are active in the outlawed parties' network in the district.

Women cadres reached weapons in a number of killing missions, including Bheramara AL leader murder on August 26, where Chumki carried weapons, police said.

Different sources, including the police, confirmed that a few women are also just used for 'entertainment'.

Asked, Kushtia Police Super Sahabuddin Khan told The Daily Star no political figure can influence their job.
