between the two countries. Hasina said, "We have already talked to India to establish road links with Bhutan and India responded posi-

With the establishment of road connectivity with Bhutan, the two countries would benefit in terms of expansion of trade and business and increasing people-to-people contact, she added.

When asked about joint efforts of generating hydro-electricity, Hasina said the matter came up during the bilateral talks with her Bhutanese counterpart.

"We have to take environmental consequences into consideration while taking any projects," she said, adding that there was a prospect of buying electricity from Bhutan.

Referring to the importance of launching package programmes by Bangladesh and Bhutan for tourists, she said both the countries could be economically benefited as Bhutan has a slivery Himalayas and Bangladesh has golden sandy sea beach, the two most popular tourist attractions.
