Unsavoury behaviour from a Gazi Tank official marred the spirit of the game after an exciting encounter at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur on Friday which Mohammedan won by three wickets.

Ugly scenes returned to the cricket field when Rakib Haider Pavel, coordinator of Gazi Tank cricket team hurled abusive language towards the match umpires--Nadir Shah and Sharuddoula Ibne Shahid Saikat, after a run-out appeal was ruled out. He went further entering into the safety zone of the dressing room with an attempt to physically assault the match officials.

"It was a shame what happened today. This was not a sporting behaviour and everybody should understand that we are a Test playing nation. They are both international umpires and are highly respected and we have to protect the match officials. It's at least a level-2 or 4 offence. I already gave my recommendations to

Abahani ride on Rafique

Hot favourites Abahani kept their winning streak in tact with a 92-run victory over Cricket Coaching School (CCS) in their Premier Division Cricket clash at BKSP yesterday, thanks to a brilliant 90-run knock from 72 deliveries from veteran all-rounder Mohammad Rafique that made their task easy.

Battling first, Abahani found themselves in a lot of trouble losing five early wickets, including left-hander Imrul Kayes and their skipper Shabik Al Hasan. It was a fine spell of bowling from left-arm pacer Syed Rasel with 4 wickets to reduce Abahani to 30 for five in the eleventh over. It was Arafat Sunny (43) batting at no. 7 who revived the innings somewhat. Then came the evergreen Mohammad Rafique at number nine, who hit six boundaries and four huge sixes to give Abahani a modest total of 204 losing eight wickets in allotted 48 overs.

In reply, CCS found themselves in trouble as they lost their skipper Uttam Sarker (6) very early and kept losing wickets. Mohammad Rafique came back to dismiss CCS's highest scorer Nizamuddin Ripon (28) to script an easy win in the end for Abahani.

Over at Fatullah, fast bowler Tapash Baisya

bowled an inspiring spell to lead Surjo Torun to a 24-run victory over Partex.

Batting first, Surjo Torun built a challenging total of 227 for 9 in their stipulated 50 overs, with contributions from Mysukur Rahman (55) and Rajin Saleh (40 not out).

In reply, Partex innings fell to Tapash's fierce bowling as they were reduced to 46 for five in 10 overs. A brilliant partnership between all-rounder Rashed Hanif (58) and Rezul Karim (71) revived their hopes, but in the end they fell well short of the target as they got bowled out for 203 in 49 overs.

Pak too hot for Kiwis

Pakistan overcame their one-day international series loss and maintained their world champion status in Twenty20 cricket with a convincing 49-run win over New Zealand at Dubai Stadium on Thursday.

Opener Imran Nazir lifted Pakistan to a competitive 161-8 on a pitch of variable bounce before the bowlers unleashed a tight line and length to dismiss New Zealand for 112 in 18.3 overs.

The victory was Pakistan's 20th in 26 Twenty20 internationals and their third in as many matches against the injury-ravaged Black Caps.

Brendon McCullum, leading the side in the absence of the injured Daniel Vettori, raised hopes by smashing 17 off the first over bowled by Mohammad Aamir.

But Aamir came back strongly by claiming McCullum (19) in his second and Ross Taylor (five) in his third to quash any hopes of an upset. Aamir finished with 2-21.

Abdul Razzaq (2-9) then dismissed Scott Styris (four) and Neil Broom (14) before spinners Shahid Afridi (2-21) and off-spinner Saeed Ajmal (2-18) wrapped up the New Zealand's innings.

Captain Afridi said the win was a much-needed boost for Pakistan.

"We had to win this match after our one-day loss," said Afridi. "After getting 161 I thought that with our varied attack, we'd successfully defend the total."

Earlier, Nazir hit five boundaries and four towering sixes off 38 balls before New Zealand, who put Pakistan into bat, hit

back by taking the last six wickets in the space of 69 runs.

Nazir and Kamran Akmal (13) took Pakistan to 34 as Nazir hit two successive sixes off Ian Butler's fifth over.

Nazir added a quickfire 36 with captain Afridi (24), also completing his second Twenty20 half-century off just 34 balls. Paceman Shane Bond had Nazir caught in the out

field in the 12th over to put the brakes on the innings.

Aaron Redmond, bowling occasional leg-breaks for the first time in a limited overs match, dismissed Afridi for 24 and Shoaib Malik (six) to finish with 2-24, before hobbling off with a groin injury.

Abdul Razzaq hit a 15-ball 26 with three boundaries and one six.

Nayeem's 6-6s in vain

Close win for Mohammedan

All-rounder Nayeem Islam scripted history in domestic cricket by hitting six sixes in an over but his terrific effort in the action-packed match was not good enough for Gazi Tank to stop Mohammedan's winning run in the Premier Division Cricket League yesterday.

In the end it was former national skipper Mohammad Ashraful's well-composed hundred which broke the heart of Nayeem as title contenders Mohammedan posted a three-wicket victory with one ball in hand in the chase of 260 runs at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur.

Nothing could have been better than the way Sri Lankan batsman Farveez Maharoof finished the exciting game by smashing a mid-wicket boundary against pacer Quazi Kamrul with seven runs required in the last over to overhaul Gazi's 259-6.

There was excitement in the clash between the traditional force and a new powerhouse as the match saw some good knocks and controversy with the ruling out of a run-out decision against Maharoof but it was Nayeem who hogged the spotlight no matter that his heroics ultimately went into vain.

Fresh from his match-winning knock against Zimbabwe in the last one-day game at Chittagong where he smashed three over-boundaries in an over to ensure a one-wicket success, the right-hander this time got occasional spinner Marshal Ayub in his stride to make history.

Nayeem smashed all the sixes through the leg side in the penultimate over of the innings during his unbeaten 31-ball 66 which also contained three sweetly timed boundaries as Gazi set a challenging target for the popular Motijheel outfit.

"In the end it's frustrating as we lost the match because the ultimate result is always important. Actually the innings against Zimbabwe in the last game gave me the confidence that I have the ability to hit the ball hard and you know Marshal's speedier spin helped me to clear the fence," said Nayeem.

Earlier Gazi's innings was built around Shahriar Nafees' 114-ball 70 that featured seven fours and a six and Pakistani Misbahul Haq's 50-ball 51 that saw a boundary and two big sixes after opener Nazimuddin's 43 off 56 that contained five fours and a six.

In reply, Mohammedan got off to a confident start as Shamsur Rahman, along with his more illustrious opening partner Ashraful, associated in a 99-run partnership before being caught by Mohammad Mithun off Forhad Reza for a 41-ball 43 with six fours.

Ashraful however carried his innings to a brilliant hundred to get back among the runs. He played nine eye-catching boundaries during his 115-ball 100 and the right-hander was caught at square leg when he tried to play a sweep shot against left-arm spinner Abdur Razzaq.

Mohammedan got a jolt in the middle but Mahmudullah Riyad (24) and Maharoof, who hit three fours and two sixes during his unbeaten 25-ball 36, made sure that the giants kept intact their winning streak.

U-19s win against Zim

Bangladesh Under-19 continued their excellent form with a 6-wicket victory over touring Zimbabwe Under-19 in the first one-day match at the Khulna Divisional Stadium yesterday.

Batting first, the visitors put on a decent score of 204 before being all out in 49.4 overs, thanks to a 77-run knock from Mazhawidza and a half-century from Chirumita. Kamrul Islam was the most successful bowler for Bangladesh as he took three wickets conceding 37 runs.

The 205-run target never looked too much for the hosts as they were laid a good platform by their two openers Anamul Haque (52) and Saikat Ali (25). Then, promising middle-order batsman Monimul Haque, batting at No. 4, played a superb knock of 63 off 80 deliveries to make sure Bangladesh won comfortably by six wickets with 4.1 overs to spare.

Vettori injury not serious

Daniel Vettori, who was ruled out of the first Twenty20 international against Pakistan in Dubai due to a head injury sustained during the ODI series, has undergone a scan which revealed no serious damage. He sat out the second Twenty20 international on last night but is expected to be available for the first Test against Pakistan in Dunedin, starting on November 24.

"The scan report is clear, but Vettori had concussion and will be continuously monitored," Dave Currie, the New Zealand team manager, was quoted as saying. "He will not be available for the second Twenty20 match on Friday. The doctors have advised him a couple of weeks rest."

Vettori was struck hard on the helmet by a bouncer from Mohammad Aamer in the second ODI but played the series decider. His decision to skip Thursday's game was due to a bout of vomiting before the match.

New Zealand had only 11 players to choose from for the Twenty20 internationals, as Kyle Mills is recovering from an injured shoulder, and James Franklin nursing an injured back. Allrounder Jacob Oram, too, is missing, for he had to return to New Zealand for the birth of his first child. During the first Twenty20, Aaron Redmond picked up a groin strain while bowling, forcing New Zealand to use a half-fit Franklin as a substitute.

Worry over Aminul

Goalkeeper Aminul Haq sustained injury in his shoulder during the practice with the national football team at the Bangladesh Krira Shikha Protisthan on Thursday.

The footballers have been preparing for the upcoming the SAFF Championship to be held in Dhaka.

Aminul, who has been out of action before the start of this season due to a surgery in his back to cure his old back pain and is now going through the healing period is expected to return to practice in a couple of days, said coach Shahidur Rahman Shantoo yesterday.

Apart from him, promising Abahani midfielder Shahedul Alam also sustained an ankle injury while Emon Babu has been suffering from knee injury and just played a Federation Cup match for Sheikh Russel KC before being picked up for the national camp.

The squad would be reduced to 25 members from 32 on the basis of their performance in the next one week, said Shantoo, who was given the charge following the termination of the contract of Brazilian coach Edson Silva Dido.

The players looked very serious at the camp to cement their places in the squad as the coach was basically working with the technical sides, which includes build-up the attack through wings as well as through the midfield, shooting, quick side-changes and defending own territory.

Meanwhile, the National Team Management Committee led by its chairman Badal Roy yesterday visited the BKSP to see the facilities provided by the BKSP and talked with the coaching staff on whether they faced any problems.
