

## Archers leave for Indonesia

The 15-member squad consists of eight players including three female archers while British coach Richard John Priestman and Indian coach Nishith Das will also be part of the team.

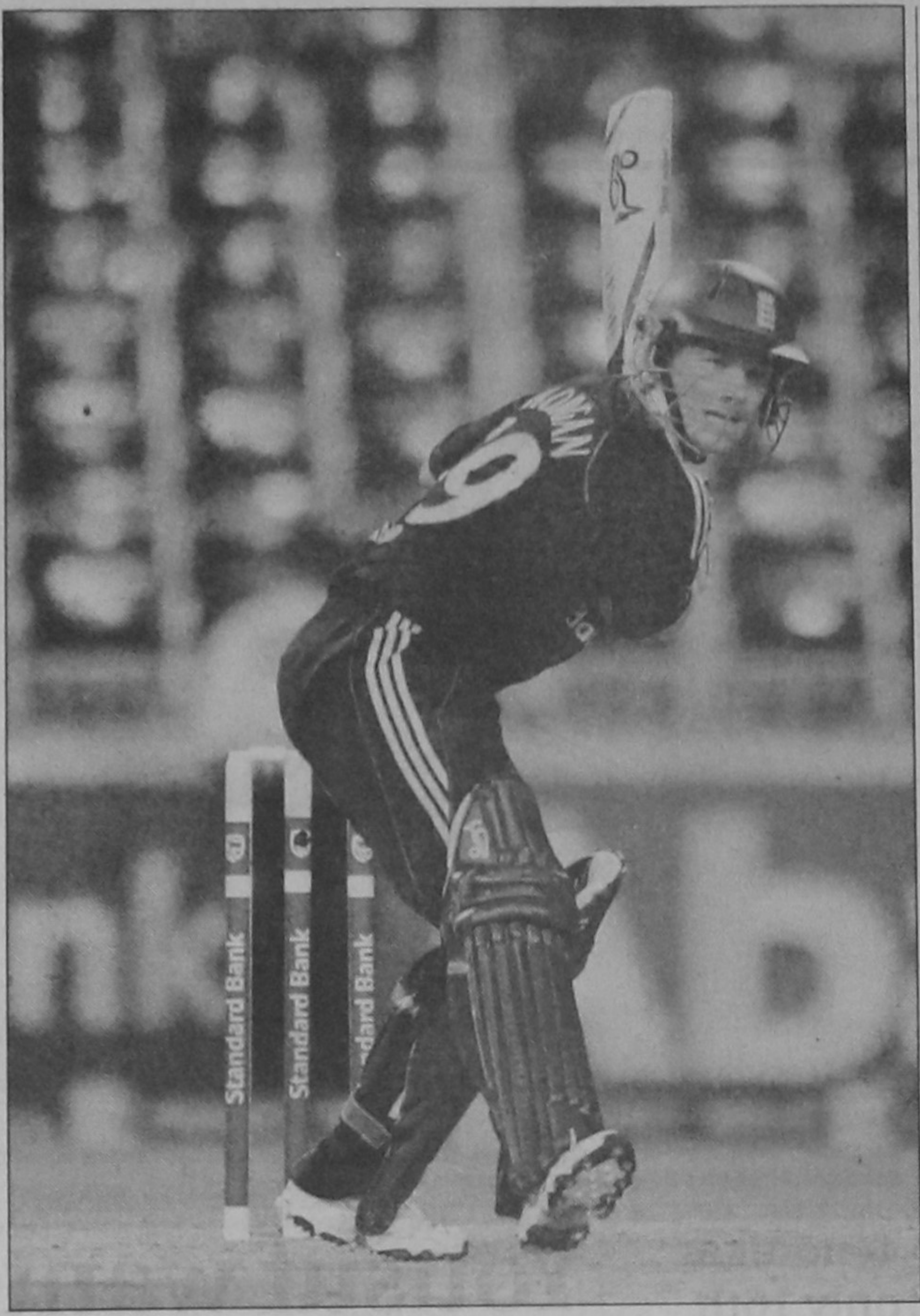

# India's tough change

India will make a quick switch to Test cricket to defend their unbeaten home record against Sri Lanka in a three-match series starting here on Monday.

Mahendra Singh Dhoni's men have endured a gruelling six-month schedule of limited-overs cricket which ended this week with a one-day series loss against world champions Australia.

The Indians have played just three Tests this year -- in New Zealand in March-April -- and Dhoni agreed the sudden adjustment to the traditional five-day format will not be easy. "This is the way modern cricket is played," said Dhoni. "We have to be mentally prepared to make the change and I am confident we will be up for the challenge."

Sri Lanka are brimming with confidence after two back-to-back series wins at home against Pakistan and New Zealand which lifted Kumar Sangakkara's men to the number two spot in the Test rankings behind South Africa.

India, however, remains the final frontier for the Sri Lankans, who have never won a Test on Indian soil in six previous series, losing eight matches while the remaining six were drawn.

"Winning Tests in India is a goal, but we are not putting ourselves under any pressure," said Sangakkara. "We want to enjoy the tour and if we play as well as we are capable of, there is no reason why we can't win."

Sri Lanka suffered heavy defeats in their last series in India in 2005, losing the second Test by 188 runs and the third by 259 runs after the first match was rained off.

Sangakkara, Mahela Jayawardene, Tillakaratne Dilshan, Thilan Samaraweera and star spinner Muttiah Muralidaran are the only survivors from that tour, but the skipper said his young side was capable of delivering.

"Inexperience is sometimes a good thing as the Indian batsmen have not played our fast bowlers regularly in the longer form of the game which can work to our advantage," said Sangakkara.

"Sometimes a fresh perspective, attitude and enthusiasm could be an added bonus."

Muralidaran, Test cricket's leading bowler with 783 wickets, also has a score to settle after claiming just 31 scalps in eight matches on Indian soil at an expensive average of 39.58.

The off-spinner, 37, will once again lead the attack with help from fellow spinners Rangana Herath and Ajantha Mendis on wickets that

traditionally help slow bowlers.

India, riding on their formidable batting led by world record holder Sachin Tendulkar, have won three of their last four home series against Pakistan, Australia and England, while the fourth against South Africa ended 1-1.

The Ahmedabad Test will mark the start of a third decade in international cricket for Tendulkar, the world's leading Test and one-day batsman, who made his debut aged 16 against Pakistan on November 15, 1989.

Test regulars Rahul Dravid and Venkatesh Laxman are back to join Tendulkar and Yuvraj Singh in the middle-order, with twice triple-century Virender Sehwag and Gautam Gambhir opening the batting.

India's bowling will be bolstered by the return of pace spearhead Zaheer Khan, who was sidelined for five months with a shoulder injury. The 31-year-old left-arm seamer has 210 wickets from 65 Tests.

Khan and young pacer Ishant Sharma are expected to share the new ball, with seasoned off-spinner Harbhajan Singh and leg-break bowler Amit Sharma providing the spin options.

The remaining two Tests will be played in Kanpur (November 24-28) and Mumbai (December 2-6).

# Sachin rues less Tests

Sachin Tendulkar has expressed his disappointment at India not playing enough Tests in the near future. Besides the three Tests in the upcoming home series against Sri Lanka, which begins in Ahmedabad on November 16, India plays only two more Tests, in Bangladesh in January, in the 2009-10 season. There are no further Test series planned at least till the end of the 2010.

"We should play more Test cricket for sure. It is obviously not great news that we are only playing five Tests this season," Tendulkar said at a media event on Friday to commemorate his completing 20 years in international cricket.

Test cricket, he said, was the true testing ground for any youngster and the best way to fast track his development. "Ideally for any team to progress you need to play more Test cricket as that is where the real cricket is according to me. Test cricket is cricket of the highest level and since it is played across five days at the end of each day it allows you to regroup, re-think, come up with fresh ideas and plan for the next day. Sometimes in Twenty20 and ODIs even before you realise the match is over."

As a 16-year-old Tendulkar cut his teeth in the 1989 Test series against Pakistan and immediately understood it was not going to be easy. In the final Test of that series, Waqar Younis drew blood after striking Tendulkar on the nose. Ajit Tendulkar, his elder brother, the man whom Sachin counts as his biggest influence as a player, was sitting in the stands. Ajit might have winced but his brother

didn't. "When I was hit by Waqar that got me more competitive and I decided not to move from the middle and I would continue to fight," Tendulkar animatedly recounted the incident to a 75-odd media contingent.

Though the event was by invitation only for a select group of journalists, a lot of media personnel -- aware of the unique opportunity it presented -- gatecrashed the event. Tendulkar remained unruffled and for the next five hours remained seated in the middle of the room, answering hundreds of questions, even if most were repeated. Displaying the same proficiency he has shown against various forms of bowling, Tendulkar moved seamlessly from English to Hindi to Marathi in his responses, paying detailed attention to the questioner's every word.

While his zeal for the game continues to amaze, he is not at all surprised by it. He says it is because he is passionate about what he does and is confident and clear about what he wants to do.

It's not his fans alone who wonder how Tendulkar has been strong in various situations and stayed competitive over the last two decades; MS Dhoni, the India captain, recently said he did not rule out Tendulkar being in contention to play the 2015 World Cup.

Tendulkar, though, said he wanted to live in the moment and plan for the near future instead of dwelling on what could happen five years down the line.

"It would be nice if I can go on that that long (till 2015) but I don't want to think that far and concentrate on the next phase," he said. "My focus is on the near future. I've enjoyed every bit so far and I feel there is cricket left in me and everything is going really well."

# Semenya doesn't like it

Caster Semenya, the South African teenage world champion runner who sparked allegations over her gender, has spoken of her difficulties coping with her newfound fame.

Semenya, who emerged from obscurity to win the women's 800 metres title at the world championships in Berlin in August, told Britain's Guardian newspaper: "People want to stare at me now. They want to touch me. I'm supposed to be famous but I don't think I like it so much."

In an interview at her training track at the University of Pretoria published on Saturday, she admitted: "It's not so easy. The university is OK but there is not many other places I can go."

Semenya's future as an athlete could be decided on Friday when the International Association of Athletics Federations is expected to announce its ruling on tests undertaken on her gender.

The IAAF could ban her from competing again, require that she undergo surgery, or take no action.

Leaked test results said Semenya was a hermaphrodite, sparking anger from the South African public and government, who have rallied behind the athlete.

But as the controversy swirls around her, Semenya said she had found refuge with her

training group and her coach, Michael Seme.

"I am myself here," she told the newspaper. "Everyone just accepts me. They know who I am. I am just Caster to these guys. I feel good with them. I feel much better here with (Seme) and the athletes."

Semenya insisted she was unchanged by her elevation to global stardom.

"What is the point of me changing? If I became another person it would be bad. If I acted in a different way with my friends they would not be happy. It's important I stay the same."

She joked that "I can't go shopping no more" because of her new status in South Africa, but added: "I know who I am. I can't change what (people) say."

Semenya lowered her personal best time by eight seconds to win the world title.

"I am a fighter," she said. "I never give up. And I knew I was going to get better."

With the clock ticking to the IAAF ruling, her coach said: "We hope for Caster. That's all we can do."

Athletics South Africa (ASA) was suspended by the country's national Olympic committee this month over its handling of the Semenya row.

The decision came after ASA boss Leonard Chuene was suspended pending an investigation after admitting he knew about the gender test conducted on the athlete prior to the world championships.

Tsonga, hugely popular with the Paris fans, let slip three more break points in the sixth game and was made to pay the price five games later when a resurgent Nadal grabbed the first break of the match with a stinging forehand drive that the net-bound Tsonga volleyed long.

The Spaniard duly pocketed the set on his own serve.

The second set followed a near identical pattern to the first with Tsonga holding serve comfortably earlier on and Nadal having a harder time of it.

But once again in the 11th game, Tsonga's concentration wavered resulting in a rash of unforced errors that handed Nadal the break of serve he needed.

The Spaniard had no trouble putting the match away as Tsonga's game fell apart and the title he won superbly last year was taken from him.

"Easy the best match I have played here," said Nadal, who is without a tournament win since May as he has battled injuries and loss of form.

"It's the fifth straight semi-final for me so I am there all the time and when you are there all the time one day you will win. "But he (Djokovic) is the player who is playing the best at this part of the season so he will be the favourite."

Djokovic's win over Soderling wrecked the Swede's

hopes of a first-ever appearance in the ATP World Tour Finals in the first of the quarterfinals.

Soderling, who made the final of the French Open last time he played in Paris in June, went into the match knowing that he needed to at least reach the final here to clinch the remaining spot in the season-ending tournament.

But having lost all four of his previous encounters with the young Serb, the Swede knew he would have to produce something special.

He did just that in the second set which he won 6-1 after dropping the first, but in a tense decider he was the first to crack on serve in the eighth game when two unforced errors on the backhand side followed by a double fault gave Djokovic three break points.

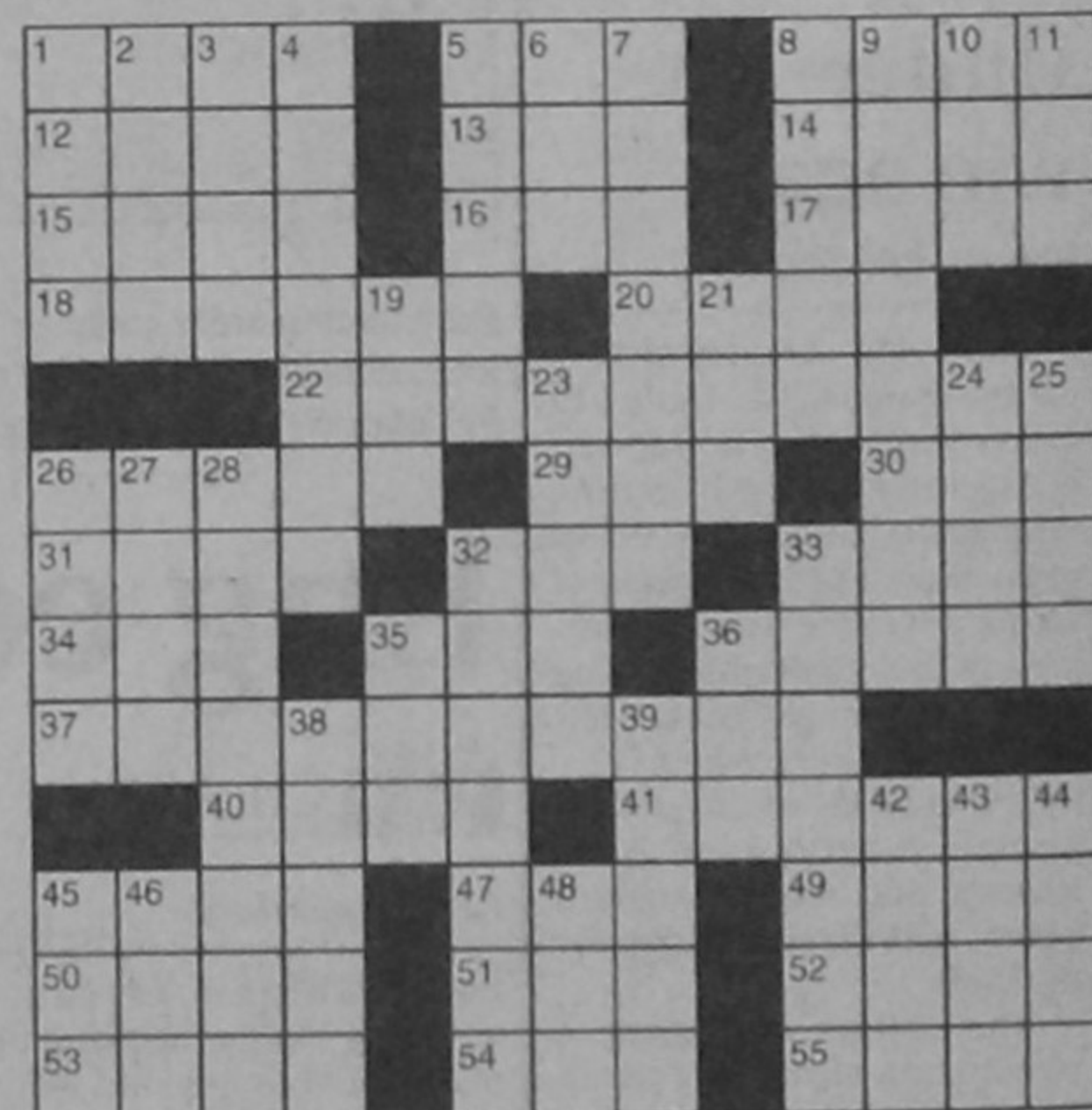
Soderling saved the first of these, but then netted a weak backhand to hand the break to the third seed who made no mistake in serving out for the match.

In other quarterfinal action Gael Monfils kept home hopes alive with a closely-fought 3-6, 6-4, 6-4 win over Marin Cilic of Croatia.

In the semi-finals he will play Radek Stepanek of the Czech Republic who made it through when US Open champion Juan Martin del Potro of Argentina abandoned when 0-4 down in the first set.
