## 'You're a role model'

Former rivals of Sachin Tendulkar on Sunday praised the Indian batting master on the anniversary of his Test debut against Pakistan twenty years ago, describing him as a genuine role model.

Tendulkar, who plays his 160th Test against Sri Lanka at Ahmedabad from today, made his debut as a 16-year-old on November 15, 1989 against Pakistan in Karachi.

Former captain Rameez Raja, who opened the innings for Pakistan in that Test, said Tendulkar had been amazing on and off the field.

"We know what a genius Tendulkar has been but the way he has conducted himself off the field has been amazing," Raja told AFP. "He has been a great role model and there has been no controversy linked with him. It's amazing."

"Tendulkar is so graceful that youngsters will follow him in the years to come. His records will remain in the books, and may be overhauled, but his grace would be unmatched."

Since making his debut, Tendulkar has scaled unmatched heights, scoring 12,773 runs with 42 hundreds -- both world records in Tests -- and 17,178 with 45 centuries -- both world records -- in 436 one-day internationals.

Raja said very few people believed Kapil Dev's words on Tendulkar in 1989.

"Dev told us to watch out for this kid and described him as world class material but we thought a 16-year-old couldn't be world class

and were of the opinion that Dev was praising him because he was an Indian.

"But when he showed confidence and hit Abdul Qadir for three sixes at Peshawar in a game, we realised his potential and the tour of Pakistan gave him the right kind of platform to build his great career."

Another former captain, Javed Miandad, advised young people to follow Tendulkar's example.

"Tendulkar is a genuine role model for youth of the world," said Miandad, himself a great batsman. "The way he projects himself off and on the field is remarkable and a lesson for others."

Miandad singled out Tendulkar's passion for cricket.

"I remember Tendulkar dived and took a catch off the last ball of the 50th over in a recent one-day match against Australia, which shows his passion for doing the best for India, otherwise very few people do such a thing off the last ball."

Former leg-spinner Abdul Qadir praised Tendulkar as a great batsman.

"Tendulkar is unmatched," said Qadir, himself touted as a magician of spin. "The way he batted on that tour of Pakistan and hit quite a few sixes off me proved that he will have a great career."

Tendulkar's rival in the first Test, paceman Waqar Younis, said Tendulkar was a genius.

"The way he bats no one can match him," said Waqar, who also injured Tendulkar with a blow to his nose in the fourth Test at Sialkot. "His passion for batting never waned even he was badly hit by one of my deliveries. He has been amazing."

## One more Sachin mark

First Test against Sri Lanka from today

India's captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni on Sunday urged Sachin Tendulkar to mark his third decade in world cricket with a century in the first Test against Sri Lanka.

Dhoni also stressed the hype over Tendulkar's landmark with round-the-clock coverage on the world batting record holder in the Indian media would not distract his team from the task at hand.

"It's not a distraction, in fact it's an inspiration for all of us," Dhoni said ahead of the first of three Tests against the Islanders which opens at the Motera Stadium here today.

"What Sachin has achieved is phenomenal. He has been an ideal role model for all of us. I never dreamt of playing alongside him, so it's an honour to share the same dressing room with him."

"Hope he gets a century here. That will be the ultimate."

It will be the 160th Test for Tendulkar, the world's most successful Test and

one-day batsman, since his debut as a 16-year-old on November 15, 1989 against Pakistan in Karachi.

Only retired former Australian captain Steve Waugh has played more Tests -- 168.

India last played a Test match in March-April in New Zealand and Dhoni said his team was excited to be playing the traditional five-day game again after a hectic round of limited-overs cricket.

"We are not under-prepared for this Test," the captain insisted. "We will have to shift attention and apply ourselves to the longer game, but all of us have been in good touch."

"Hopefully we will play to our potential and win."

Sri Lanka have never won a Test match on Indian soil on six previous visits -- losing eight while six were drawn -- but Dhoni said the pressure on the hosts was as much as before.

"Whether we are playing the world's best team or a side that is at the bottom of the rankings, the pressure remains the same. That is what Test cricket is all about," he said.

"Sri Lanka is one of the best sides and it will be an interesting series."

India, helped by a formidable batting line-up and quality spinners, have won three of their last four home series against Pakistan, Australia and England, while the fourth against South Africa ended 1-1.

Test regulars Rahul Dravid and Venkatesh Laxman are back to join Tendulkar and Yuvraj Singh in a strong middle-order, with twice triple-centurion Virender Sehwag and Gautam Gambhir opening the batting.

India's bowling will be bolstered by the return of pace spearhead Zaheer Khan, who was sidelined for five months with a shoulder injury. The 31-year-old left-arm seamer has 210 wickets from 65 Tests.

Khan and young paceman Ishant Sharma are expected to share the new ball, with seasoned off-spinner Harbhajan Singh and leg-break bowler Amit Sharma providing the spin options.

Dhoni said the brownish wicket was "very different" from the seaming track that was prepared for India's last Test here in March last year.

India succumbed to South Africa in three days in that game after being shot here in March last year.

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## Shakib not playing today

## Kumar thinks alike

Sri Lanka captain Kumar Sangakkara on Sunday joined Indian great Sachin Tendulkar in calling for more Test cricket, saying the lopsided schedule needed to be changed.

"It's really a shame that we are being deprived of Test cricket," Sangakkara told AFP ahead of the three-Test series against India at the Motera Stadium on Monday.

"The young guys in our side are desperate to perform at the highest level, and that means Test cricket. They are just not getting enough of it."

The International Cricket Council is working on a Future Tours Programme (FTP) for international matches post 2012, juggling to fit in Test matches amid an explosion of one-day and Twenty20 cricket.

Sri Lanka have just one Test series scheduled next year -- against the West Indies at home in

November -- forcing world bowling record holder Muttiah Muralidaran to abandon his dream of claiming 1,000 Test wickets.

Muralidaran, 37, who has claimed 783 Test wickets, has already said he will retire from the five-day game after the West Indies series, with no hope of reaching the 1,000-wicket mark.

"At one time, I could have gone for it, but for that to happen we needed to play more Tests and that is just not happening," the off-spinner said.

Sangakkara said there was no point in talking of a proposed world Test championship till each of the nine Test nations -- Zimbabwe are currently playing only one-day matches -- got to play more Tests.

"Ideally, there should be eight to 10 Tests a year for every team, that needs to be worked out first," the Sri Lankan captain said.

Sangakkara's grouse followed a similar appeal from Tendulkar, the world's leading batsman in both Test and one-day cricket, who begins a third decade in international cricket today.

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## Armin, Mahmud shoot to gold

## Pakistan off to NZ

Coach Intikhab Alam identified batting as the key area for improvement as a 17-member Pakistan squad minus Younus Khan flew to New Zealand early Sunday to play a three-match Test series.

Younus opted to sit out the New Zealand tour and hand the captaincy to Mohammad Yousuf after his side's one-day series defeat in Abu Dhabi last week, saying he wanted to rest after suffering poor batting form.

Yet it was not only him, the batsmen faltered badly in the one-day series which New Zealand won 2-1. Pakistan won the two-match Twenty20 series 2-0 here on Friday.

"Our batting must click and show improvement because it will be tough to switch from one-day and Twenty20," Alam told AFP. "Our bowling has the capacity to bowl New Zealand out twice but we must put runs on the board first."

Alam, who took over as coach after Australian Geoff Lawson was sacked in October last year, said Younus's absence was a blow, but expected to harbour no bitterness.

"Naturally, Younus is a senior batsman and although he had a poor batting form he is a world class player who can come good any time, but you miss players through injuries as well and Younus's replacement will have a chance to prove his worth."

"Batsmen will have to show temperament

because you need to stay longer at the wicket, which is the real test of a batsman."

Pakistan open the tour with a three-day game against a New Zealand invitational XI at Queenstown from Wednesday before the first Test starts at Dunedin from November 24.

Alam said conditions in New Zealand will also test his players.

"It is an early start to the season and conditions will be tough because the weather will be very cold but I hope all the players show professionalism and adjust to the conditions," said Alam, a former captain.

The three-Test series, like the limited-overs series played in the United Arab Emirates, was scheduled for Pakistan but had to be relocated after New Zealand refused to tour over security fears.

Alam said New Zealand captain Daniel Vettori will be key for the home team.

"Vettori is a seasoned player and we have to play him well without giving him too many wickets."

"But if New Zealand prepares wickets conducive to spin then we too have quality spinners in Saeed Ajmal and Danish Kaneria," said Alam, a leg-spinner in his playing days.

After the New Zealand tour, Pakistan will move to Australia to play three Tests, five one-dayers and a Twenty20.
