Secretaries concerned of the president office were present during the meeting.



Climate change to cost trillions Say economists

Estimates vary widely on the costs of damage from climate change, easing these impacts and taming the carbon gas stoking the problem, but economists agree the bill is likely to be in the trillions of dollars.

"On the cost of adaptation, there's a timing issue. For instance, there's no point building sea walls now if the sea levels are only going to rise gradually over the next 50 years.

But we do know that costs of adaptation will go up non-linearly, in other words exponentially, with the degree of warming that we have."

Following is a snapshot of the main items on the tab.

-- IMPACTS: Warming of between two to three degrees Celsius (3.6-5.4 degrees Fahrenheit) over pre-industrial times would inflict a permanent loss in global world output of up to three percent, according to the 2006 Stern Review, authored by British economist Nicholas Stern.

Despite these uncertainties, economists share a broad consensus: climate change will ultimately cost thousands of billions of dollars, a tab that keeps rising as more carbon enters the atmosphere.

"The cost of climate impacts goes up with the delay on emissions mitigation," said Sam Fankhauser of the Grantham Research Institute on Climate Change and the Environment at the London School of Economics (LSE).

But this would rise to an average of five to 10 percent loss of GDP with warming of five to six C (9.0 F), with poor countries suffering costs "in excess" of 10 percent of GDP.

On current trends, Earth is headed for an average increase of 4 C (7.2 F) this century, to which 0.74 C (1.33 F) of warming from the 20th century must be added, according to the so-called A1FI emissions scenario of the UN's Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC).

-- MITIGATION: Action to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases focuses on more efficient use of coal, oil and gas and a switch to clean renewable sources.

The European Union (EU) and others have set the target of limiting overall warming to 2C (3.6 F), which entails stabilising carbon concentrations in the atmosphere at 450 parts per million (ppm).

Attaining this would require 10.5 trillion dollars in energy-related invest-

ment by 2030, which would be additional to money committed under existing policies, the International Energy Agency (IEA) says.

The largest increase -- 4.7 trillion -- is in transport, mainly to purchase more efficient, but more expensive, vehicles.

Investment to make buildings more energy-efficient would cost an additional 2.5 trillion dollars by 2030 while a switch to clean or low-carbon power generation would notch up another 1.7 trillion.

-- ADAPTATION: Estimates of the cost of protecting against water stress, flood, extreme storms, rising sea levels and other ills vary widely, from four billion a year to 109 billion annually over the next 20 years.

A widely-regarded estimate put forward in 2007 by the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) suggested the bill by 2030 could be between 49 and 171 billion dollars annually, of which 27-66 billion would be

needed in developing countries.

The figure is based on the need to climate-proof infrastructure; help agriculture; protect water supplies; defend coastal zones; and treat malnutrition, diarrhoea and malaria, which are among the diseases likely to be amplified by climate change.

But this is only half, or even just a third, of the likely cost, as it does not factor in protecting ecosystems, energy, tourism, manufacturing and mining, according to a paper published in August by Martin Parry of Imperial College London.

By way of comparison, the EU estimates developing nations will need 100 billion euros (150 billion dollars) per year by 2020, for both adaptation and mitigation.

Trillions spent in mitigation and adaptation will have an economic benefit and create new jobs, although exactly how far they will ease the cost of impacts is -- once more -- hard to calculate, say economists.

Police said Arif remained missing as he was kidnapped by a gang of miscreants at 11:00pm on Wednesday while he was returning home from his workplace.

On information, police recovered the slaughtered body of Arif at about 2:00pm yesterday and sent it to Mitford Hospital morgue for autopsy.

Victim's elder brother filed a case with local police station.

Seven killed in road crashes

Seven people were killed and seven others injured in separate road accidents in Sirajganj, Magura, Narayanganj, Kurigram and Gopalganj in last two days.

Our correspondent in Sirajganj reports: Two people were killed and five others injured in a road accident at Sattikri on Hatikumrul-Bonpara highway under Solonga Police Station in Sirajganj on Wednesday night.

The victims were identified as Mansur Ali, 35, a microbus driver and Rashed Ahmed, 23. Both are of Panchpaka village in Bogra. The injured were admitted to Sirajganj Sadar hospital.

Police and witnesses said the accident occurred when a wheel of the Dhaka-bound microbus exploded and fell into the roadside ditch.

On information, Police rushed to the spot and recovered the bodies and sent to Sirajganj Sadar hospital for autopsy.

Our correspondent in Magura adds: One person was killed in a road accident at Nageswari upazila in Kurigram yesterday.

near Wapda-square on Magura-Faridpur highway yesterday.

The deceased was identified as Abu Sayeed Sheikh, 45, of Chougachhi village in Sreepur upazila.

Police and locals said the accident occurred when a Dhaka-bound bus knocked him while he was crossing the road.

He was rushed to Magura Sadar hospital where he succumbed to his injuries.

Our correspondent in Narayanganj adds: One person was killed in a road accident near Madanpur bus stand on Dhaka-Sylhet highway at Bandar upazila in Narayanganj on Wednesday.

The victim was identified as Hasimun Bibi, 75, wife of late Asmat Ali of Bagdabaria in Madanpur.

The accident occurred when she was crossing the road a covered van hit her.

The body was sent to Narayanganj General Hospital morgue for autopsy.

Our correspondent in Kurigram adds: Two bicycle riders were killed in a road accident at Nageswari upazila in Kurigram yesterday.

The victims were identified as Nur Alam, 30, son of Abdur Rashid and Hamidur Rahman, 28, son of Abdus Sattar.

Police and locals said the accident occurred when a passenger bus hit them from behind at Aleper Tepoti on Bhurungamari-Kurigram road, leaving Nur Alam dead on the spot.

Hamidur died on the way to Rangpur Medical College Hospital.

UNB adds: A cattle trader was killed and two others were injured as a cattle-laden truck ploughed into a roadside ditch at Sonasur under Sadar upazila in Gopalganj yesterday.

The deceased was identified as Nur Mohammad of Nagarkanda in Faridpur.

Witnesses said the Dhaka-bound truck turned turtle and fell into the ditch at about 2:00pm as its driver lost control over the steering, leaving Nur dead on the spot and two others injured.

One injured Shah Alam was rushed to Khulna Medical College Hospital while another to Faridpur Medical College Hospital.

Army presence in CHT acceptable Speakers tell roundtable

Speakers at a roundtable in the city yesterday viewed that the presence of the army in the Chittagong Hill Tracts is acceptable, but the administration must be run by civilians.

The discussion titled 'A decade of Chittagong Hill Tracts Peace Agreement: An evaluation' was organised by the daily Bhorer Kagojatis office marking the completion of a decade of the CHT peace accord.

Shah Alam, chairman of the parliamentary standing committee on CHT affairs ministry, presided over the function.

Rashed Khan Menon MP, Hasanul Huq Inu MP, Maj Gen (retd) Subid Ali Bhuiyan

MP, Mujahidul Islam Selim of CPB, Prof Harun-ar-Rashid of Dhaka University and journalist Jaglul Ahmed Chowdhury took part in the discussion.

Shah Alam said all confusions will be removed once the Land Commission on CHT starts survey the lands and distribute those to the real owners.

Subid Ali said no development activities can be undertaken in the region with-out peace established through implementation of the peace accord.

He said the army should stay in the garrison in the hill tracts and the government has right to use them in the event of country's territorial integrity is threatened.

Menon who was involved in reaching the December 1997 peace accord with the Parbatya

Chittagong Jana Sanghati Samity (CJSS) viewed that the problems of the hill tracts could not be resolved in an isolated way. CHT has to be involved in the mainstream politics.

He said BNP-Jamat alliance government opposed certain provisions of the accord. But it neither annulled nor implemented it.

Inu lauded Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina for her success in reaching the accord with the tribal insurgents and thus ensured peace in the hill tracts. She is now to ensure implementation of the accord within the current tenure of her government that ends in 2014.

terming the peace accord as a time-bomb, Mujahidul Islam Selim said if it is not implemented, it may explode.
