



Driving stays willy-nilly

Random fines, strict watch do little to get vehicles into right lanes

Dhaka dwellers did not see the benefit of the new traffic rules as a good number of drivers continued to drive willy-nilly despite many drivers faced penalties yesterday for failing to follow signal lights and maintain lanes.

In addition, the main opposition BNP's council at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre at Shere-e Bangla Nagar also made congestion worse at Collegegate, Asadgate, Agargaon, Shyamoli and Bijoy Sarani.

City dwellers had to face additional congestion on many streets between Gulshan and Moghbazar, Airport and Karwan Bazar, Mirpur and Gulistan yesterday while traffic flow from Shanir Akhra to Karwan Bazar saw little improvement in the morning but took a turn for worse in the afternoon.

A good number of drivers are still unaware of the new traffic rules. Many, however, appreciated the new system and emphasised on the need for its proper enforcement.

Dhaka Metropolitan Police had announced that from Tuesday drivers violating signal lights or lane rules could be fined a maximum Tk 1,000 with three month's licence suspension.

Repeal criminal defamation against journos

CJA urges PM UNB, Dhaka

The Commonwealth Journalists Association (CJA) has welcomed the Bangladesh government decision to drop arrest warrant provision from the defamation law.

But it urged Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to repeal the provision for criminal defamation against journalists.

"We welcome the government decision to drop relevant clauses in the defamation law that allows courts to issue arrest warrants against editors, publishers, reporters or writers," said CJA International President Hassan Shahriar in a statement.

Govt slaps ban on raw jute export

Aims to ensure availability in local mills; traders, exporters protest

The government has imposed a ban on export of raw jute to ensure smooth supply of the natural fibre to local mills, which are facing troubles because of rising prices of jute amid increased demand of jute goods in the international market.

"Considering the importance of ensuring availability of raw jute in the domestic market, the government has imposed the ban until further notification," said a circular of the

Ministry of Textile and Jute issued on Monday. awaiting shipment will also come under the

People involved in jute industries lauded the

government move saying it will greatly help stabilise the volatile prices of raw jute, which they think was created artificially.

"Jute prices went as high as Tk 1700 maund, which is unusually high," said Bangladesh Jute Mills Association (BJMA) President Najmul Huq. This price is still tolerable but if it goes beyond that then the millers could not sustain, he noted.

Bangladesh's raw jute production was estimated to be 55 lakh bales this year, but there is no exact data on it. The domestic demand of raw jute is around 35 lakh bales. According to The raw jutes that are already at the port local demand, there is not supposed to be any crisis, industry sources said.

The final charge sheet in the BDR headquarters killings case would be received within this month, Home Minister Sahara Khatun said yesterday.

Chairing a monitoring cell meeting on sensational cases at her ministry, the home minister said they reviewed the progresses in inquiry so far made in 10 cases, including the BDR headquarters killings case and the 10-truck arms haul case.

The meeting accepted the death of Ganotantri Party leader Nurul Islam in fire at his house in the capital as a sensational case.

Polythene layers to be removed

The authorities will launch a drive on January 1 for removal of layers of polythene from the Buriganga bed manually to free the river from the imperishable pollutant.

. The government-formed taskforce on maintaining navigability and normal flow important rivers took this decision yesterday at a meeting at the shipping ministry.

And Dhaka Wasa will take measures to prevent direct dumping of clinical liquid waste from Mitford Hospital and other waste into the Buriganga.

The taskforce meeting, chaired by Shipping Minister Shahjahan Khan, also decided that the government would later procure excavators and other heavy equipment to expedite waste removal and demolish concrete structures within the river area, said a handout.

In Chittagong, the Karnaphuli river will be re-excavated up to Chaktai Khal to prevent water logging in the port city.

The meeting reiterated that Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority would not lease out river foreshores for sand extraction on daily basis until the land ministry comes up with a fresh set of policy in this regard.

10 wounded in cop-outlaw gunfight

At least 10 people including three policemen were injured in a gunfight between police and the members of Janajuddha, a faction of outlawed Purba Banglar Communist Party, at Gurpipul Jojaipara in Tarash upazila yesterday.

Police also arrested two members of the outlawed party and recovered a shotgun, looted from Bamihal police outpost in Natore district on December 12, 2007, 10 bullets and some documents after exchanging around 20 rounds of bullet.

'Shootout' kills outlaw in Bagerhat

A leader of Janajuddha faction of outlawed Purba Banglar Communist Party was killed in a "shootout" between police and his cohorts at Brahmandia village of Fakirhat upazila in Bagerhat early yesterday.

He was identified as Sheikh Murad, 32.

Acting on a tip-off, a police team of Fakirhat Police Station raided Brahmandia Government Primary School area around 5:00am as outlaws were holding a meeting there, police said. Sensing the presence of the law enforcers, the outlaws opened fire on police personnel.

Baghdad blasts kill 127

Five massive vehicle-borne bombs rocked Baghdad yesterday, killing 127 people, including women and students, and wounding hundreds in the third coordinated massacre to devastate the city since August.

The attacks shattered a month of calm in the Iraqi capital and came hours before an official said the war-torn country's general election, the second since the USled ouster of dictator Saddam Hussein, would be held on March 6.

Baghdad's top security officer said the attacks -- four of which were conducted by suicide attackers driving cars or minibuses -- and which targeted key government buildings, bore "the touch of al-Qaeda."

One of the suicide bombers detonated

his payload at an office of the finance the fact that three of them targeted govministry, another attacker struck at a tunnel leading to the labour ministry, and a third drove a four-wheel-drive car into a court building.

"The suicide bomber drove up to the court and the security forces tried to stop him by firing their Kalashnikovs, but they did not kill him before he exploded,' police sergeant Emad Fadhil told AFP.

A fourth suicide bomber in a car struck a police patrol in Dora, in southern Baghdad, causing 15 deaths, 12 of them students at a nearby technical college, an interior ministry official said.

The first explosion in the centre of Baghdad was heard at 10:25 am (0725 GMT), another came within seconds and a third one minute later.

Although no group has yet claimed responsibility, the timing of the blasts and

ernment buildings bears all the hallmarks of an al-Qaeda operation.

The interior ministry official said 127

people had been killed and 448 wounded in the bombings, with the finger of blame pointed at al-Qaeda. "The same black hand that was behind the attacks in August and October com-

mitted today's bombings," Major General Qassim Atta, a spokesman for security operations in Baghdad, told AFP. "This has the touch of al-Qaeda and

the Baathists," he said, referring to the outlawed Baath party of now executed dictator Saddam.

BDR MUTINY TRIAL Charge-framing in Satkhira Jan 18

A special court in Satkhira yesterday fixed January 18 next year for framing charges against 60 accused BDR personnel of 7 Rifles Battalion under Khulna sector in the mutiny case.

All the 60 accused BDR men were produced before the special court no-1 that was formed at Satkhira 41 Rifles Battalion (BDR) headquarters to hold the trial of BDR mutiny at Nildumur BDR battalion headquarters in Shyamnagar upazila on February 26.

The BDR has set up six special courts to try the BDR personnel with links to the February 25-26 mutiny at its headquarters in Dhaka and elsewhere in the country under the Bangladesh Rifles Order, 1972.

The court proceedings began at 10:10am yesterday and it went on for 55 minutes before being adjourned till January 18, 2010. Prosecutor Lt Col Badrul Alam, also the commanding officer

of 7 Rifles Battalion, read out the complaints yesterday against

the 60 accused BDR personnel who were in the dock.

In his submission, the prosecutor told the court that the accused soldiers in collaboration with each other revolted at Nildumur battalion headquarters in support of the carnage at
