Safina doubtful for Aus Open

Dinara Safina is a serious doubt for the Australian Open after a back injury forced her to withdraw from the Brisbane International, a main lead-up event to the first Grand Slam of the year.

Safina retired in tears after just two games of her opening match of the WTA Tour Championships in Doha, despite receiving pain-numbing cortisone injections the night before in a bid to be fit for the season-ending tournament.

Sangakkara and veteran Sanath Jayasuriya plundered 81 in 39 balls for the second wicket after danger man Tillakaratne Dilshan was bowled by Ishant Sharma for one in the second over.

Jayasuriya made 31 off 21 balls with five fours and a six before he was trapped lbw before by off-spinner Yusuf Pathan.

Sangakkara himself fell in the 11th over when he holed out in the deep off Yuvraj Singh, who celebrated his 28th birthday on Saturday with 23-23 from three overs.

The lower order batsmen kept a good pace as the Indian fielding wilted in the cold weather.

Vettori drives Kiwis

It was even balance at tea on the second day of the third and deciding Test at Napier. New Zealand were trailing by 57 runs with only five wickets in hand. Brendon McCullum and Daniel Vettori were yet to settle in, Danish Kaneria was in hot form having run through the middle order and the second new ball wasn't far away. Either team could have grabbed the ascendancy. It was Vettori and McCullum who broke the shackles of the first two sessions with a combination of intelligence and exhilarating strokeplay, and seized control of the game.

McCullum was explosive, improvising constantly, while Vettori combined inventiveness with solidity to rapidly change the character of the game. New Zealand's nervous approach of the first two sessions - the defensive, perhaps over-cautious, batsmen struggling to survive Kaneria as several close catchers hovered around the bat - gave way to a thrilling evening. Runs came quickly and New Zealand swiftly took a sizeable first-innings lead.

New Zealand's jail-break was assisted by the Pakistan fast bowlers, who have caused batsmen the most problems this series with seam, swing and tight lines and lengths. Not today though. Umar Gul and the rest offered width with their short-of-a-length deliveries and Vettori kept picking boundaries with his favourite short-arm cuts and deflections. McCullum attacked Kaneria by playing the sweep and suddenly the floodgates

were flung open.

At times McCullum placed his bat outside off, with his back foot in line with off stump, and started to create his own angles. Even the skilful Mohammad Asif lost his poise and sprayed the ball around. The shot of the evening was an imperiously-pulled six from outside off stump against Asif. McCullum startled the bowler again when he charged out to crash a length delivery over cover.

Pakistan seemed to have run out of ideas when, against the run of play, Gul got the ball to burst off the pitch towards the throat of McCullum, who fended it straight to gully. Pakistan also had an opportunity to get rid of Vettori, but Kaneria dropped a straightforward return catch off him on 97.

Until Kaneria's lapse, though, Vettori, who has marvellous self-awareness of the limitations of his game and thrives within them, had played a chanceless innings. He arched his back to cut short-of-a-length deliveries from the line of the stumps without making it appear risky, he walked across to work perfectly acceptable deliveries to fine leg and frustrated bowlers with his short-arm pulls and nudges. Once in a while, Vettori increased pressure on the bowlers with calculated big hits: he lifted Kaneria for a straight six, and swept him and pulled Asif for more fours.

New Zealand's 123-run lead at the end of day two, however, might not have been possible without the patience Tim McIntosh showed during the first session. The defining image of his half-century was not a shot but the military snap with which he shouldered arms. He left 57 balls alone and played 151 dot balls as he defended

passionately. McIntosh's batting has almost an anaesthetic air about it but the day's stone-walling effort wasn't dull or boring. He laid the platform and allowed McCullum and Vettori to express themselves later on.

McIntosh's defiance was the primary feature of the morning session, but Kaneria eventually broke his resistance and that of several others after lunch. Kaneria was allowed to settle into a rhythm because of New Zealand's defensive approach and it was his googly that caused batsmen the most trouble. Unlike in the past, when he has been guilty of overusing it at times, Kaneria was more prudent in deploying the wrong 'un today. He concentrated on building pressure with his bouncing legbreaks and sliders, and bowled a variety of deliveries that slowly suffocated the batsmen.

It was the wicket of Ross Taylor, who top-edged a slog sweep, that got Kaneria going. He bowled a few loopy deliveries on the leg side to McIntosh who suddenly began playing the sweep before top-edging one as well. Kaneria then turned his attention to Daniel Flynn, spinning a few legbreaks into the left-hand batsman before slipping in a googly that caught the edge. The appeal for caught-behind was turned down, but the decision was reversed after a review. It may have been the right decision, for Flynn seemed to walk as soon as the review was asked for, but video evidence wasn't conclusive.

New Zealand were 145 for 5 at that stage, having lost three wickets for 27 runs, and Vettori and McCullum had just come together for a partnership that would give New Zealand the upper hand in the deciding Test.

Woods goes for a break

The fallout continues for Tiger Woods who says he will step away from the sport to try and fix the damage his infidelity has done to his relationship with his wife and family.

Woods said he was taking an "indefinite break" from the PGA Tour and apologized, pleading for forgiveness and vowing to become a better husband to his wife, Elin, and father to his two young children.

"It may not be possible to repair the damage I've done, but I want to do my best to try," Woods wrote Friday on his website. "I am deeply aware of the disappointment and hurt that my infidelity has caused to so many people, most of all my wife and children."

Woods, who has not been seen in public for the past two weeks, has a two-year-old daughter and a 10-month-old son with Elin.

"After much soul searching, I have decided to take an indefinite break from professional golf. I need to focus my attention on being a better husband, father and person," he headed.

PGA Tour commissioner Tim Finchem said Friday they would not attempt to rush Wood into returning to the sport.

"His priorities are where they need to be, and we will continue to respect and honor his family's request for privacy," Finchem said. "We look forward to Tiger's return to the PGA Tour when he determines the time is right for him."

Ten women have been romantically linked to the billionaire golfer, whose private life has come under the glare of public scrutiny since he crashed his car in late November.

Woods was taken to hospital on November 27 after hitting a fire hydrant and a tree, two days after a tabloid reported he was having an affair with New York club hostess Rachel Uchitel.

Woods, who turns 34 on December 30, was first linked to Uchitel, who has denied the affair.

Cocktail waitress Jaimee Grubbs, 24, played a voicemail, which she claims to be Woods talking, to support her claim they had a 31-month relationship.

Also on a list compiled by FOX News are porn star Holly

Sampson, 36; Kalika Moquin, 27, a Las Vegas club manager; model Jamie Jungers, 26; Mindy Lawton, a 33-year-old waitress from Orlando; and three unidentified women, two from British reports and another waitress from Orlando.

"I want to say again to everyone that I am profoundly sorry and that I ask forgiveness," Woods wrote.

"Again, I ask for privacy for my family and I am especially grateful for all those who have offered compassion and concern during this difficult period."

Australian golfer Craig Parry said Woods needs time to do some soul searching.

"What he did was totally wrong," Parry said during a tournament in Australia Friday. "And he's got no one to blame except himself. You can look at other people, but he's the one who's got to look in the mirror."

Woods usually does not start his season until the former Buick Invitational in San Diego at the end of January so if he takes an "indefinite" leave it could be some time before he tees it up again.

He had knee surgery last year and spent eight months recovering. Television ratings

dropped 50 percent with Woods minus from the Tour.

It is not known if he will be ready to return in time for the first major of the season The Masters tournament on April 8-11.

PGA golfer Jesper Parnevik reiterated to ESPN that he made a mistake in linking up Woods with his former nanny and current wife, Elin.

Elin Nordgren previously worked for Parnevik and in 2001 she met Woods through her friend Mia.

"I vouched for the guy," Parnevik told ESPN's "Outside the Lines" show which airs Sunday night. "I told her this is the guy that I think is everything you want. I was wrong."

"I am sure she felt very lonely and very small in the whole hoopla and chaos when her world was turned upside down."

American golfer John Cook calls Woods a close friend and says he is sticking by his pal.

"He put himself in this position," Cook told ESPN television. "It is disappointing but he has admitted to it and he is dealing with it."

Woods earned an estimated 118 million dollars last year in prize money and endorsements.

England enjoy run fest

England captain Andrew Strauss cruised to a century and Kevin Pietersen played himself into form on the first day of the touring team's two-day match against a South African Invitation XI at Buffalo Park on Friday.

The England batsmen feasted on some unthreatening bowling as they piled up 317 for five in their final warm-up match before the first Test against South Africa starting in Centurion on Wednesday.

Strauss made exactly 100 off 161 balls before he was one of three batsmen who retired, while Pietersen hit 71 off 101 deliveries. Pietersen and Ian Bell were the only batsmen to be dismissed by bowlers.

Strauss and Alastair Cook put on 101 for the first wicket before Cook retired on 52. It was his second successive half-century after he made 81 in the first match between the two teams which ended on Thursday.

Jonathan Trott was the third batsman to retire after making a watchful 50 off 135 balls.

Although the bowling and a slow pitch were in contrast to what he is likely to

encounter in the Test match, Pietersen played a confidence-building innings to register his first half-century since pulling out of the Ashes series against Australia in July because of an ankle injury which required surgery.

He hit 12 boundaries before he was caught at deep midwicket off the off-spinner Yaseen Vallie.

Medium-pace Roy Adams conceded only 14 runs in 13 overs to be the pick of the Invitation team bowlers. The Invitation team is drawn from South Africa's amateur provincial competition.
