US President Barack Obama Monday night phoned Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and hoped that she would play an important role in the Copenhagen climate summit.

Obama assured her that the US government would stand beside Bangladesh in its battle against climate change.

Awami League's Joint General Secretary Mahbubul Alam Hanif told this to reporters at the Zia International Airport after Hasina's departure for the summit.

Obama's assurance came three days after UK Prime Minister Gordon Brown extended his country's support to Bangladesh for its position in the ongoing climate talks.

Govt reports on 4 rivers tell court


Over 8,000 land grabbers have occupied areas of the Buriganga, Shitalakkhya, Turag and Balu rivers around the capital, building various structures, say survey reports of four district administrations concerned.

Districts administrations of Dhaka, Narayanganj, Gazipur and Munshiganj calculated the figures of land grabbers as per the Cadastral Survey (CS 1910-1913) records.

But, veteran activists of river protection campaigns have a different opinion about the figure of encroachers, which they said should be much higher if estimated according to the CS records.

Only Narayanganj district administration has mentioned the amount of river area lost to grabbers, which is 1,158 acres as per the CS records.

The four district administrations prepared the reports on river demarcation and submitted them to the High Court in the SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

The fallen heroes were mainly policemen, members of the East Pakistan Regiment (EPR) that was later turned into BDR or Bangladesh Rifles and civilians.

pletely at private initiatives by freedom the issue with the Bangladesh mission in Delhi and the matter has been taken up with the Indian government.

"This is just one small example of our war heroes lying buried anonymously on Indian soil," said Lt Col (Retd) Q Sajjad A Zahir, Bir Protik, a brave freedom fighter and war researcher. "There must be thousands of graves strewn around the major war theatres along the borders. Those who fought on the ground know so many of our co-fighters died in the battles. But where are their graves? Our latest find only confirms that they are buried across the border."
