## Siddle ruled out

Aus-WI third Test from today

Australia and West Indies have both been hit by a series of injuries the day before the third Test in Perth, with Peter Siddle ruled out, Shivnarine Chanderpaul and Adrian Barath unlikely, and Nathan Hauritz also in doubt.

The problems have left Australia with one confirmed debutant, the Victoria fast bowler Clint McKay, who will replace his state teammate Siddle. And Steven Smith, the 20-year-old batsman and legspinner, has been put on standby for Hauritz and will fly from Sydney to Perth on Tuesday night.

Hauritz took a blow to his spinning finger while fielding at training on Tuesday and although he did bowl afterwards, he suffered some soreness and will not know his fate until the morning of the match. Smith has starred with the bat for New South Wales this week, scoring a century against Queensland, but not with the ball.

Ricky Ponting said the replacement spinner would not necessarily step straight into the starting line-up if Hauritz missed out. The Tasmania fast bowler Brett Geeves joined the squad on Monday night and will be considered along with Smith if Hauritz wakes up with a swollen finger.

"There'll be a chance of that," Ponting said of a four-man pace attack. "Geeves flew in last night and trained with us this morning. There'll be that possibility but I've said for a while it's always my preference to go into a Test match with a specialist spin bowler but we'll wait and see what happens."

West Indies are likely to have two changes with the key

batsmen Chanderpaul and Barath both in serious doubt. Chanderpaul is still struggling with a finger problem after being struck on the hand in Adelaide, while Barath hurt his hamstring during the second Test.

"It's not looking too good but we'll see what happens tomorrow," the captain Chris Gayle said. "Those two guys are the worry for us right now. It's a big blow going into the final Test match but having said that whoever gets that opportunity, hopefully they will make the best use of it."

Ponting said he was coming in and open with Gayle in place of Barath, while Chanderpaul's spot is likely to be taken by Narsingh Deonarine. Ponting said the injuries to Chanderpaul, who Australia found almost impossible to dismiss last year in the Caribbean, and Barath, who made a hundred on debut in Brisbane, would be a major blow for West Indies.

"That's not ideal for them," Ponting said. "Barath's looked pretty good most times he's come to the crease and we all know how much of a run scorer Chanderpaul is for them, so that's two of the better players out of their batting so that'll leave a couple of big holes. It'll be nice for Clint to be bowling to some of their younger guys, in a way."

The opportunity for McKay opened up because Siddle, who was under a cloud during the week after suffering a strain to his left hamstring in Adelaide, woke up on Tuesday with some soreness following a lengthy spell in the WACA nets the previous day. Prosecutors said he and Haris Ahmed—who was convicted in June on similar charges—drove around Washington and filmed 62 clips of various sites including the US Capitol, a fuel depot and a Masonic temple.

him to 13 years' in prison on the same charges.

A US court in Atlanta on August 13 this year convicted Sadeque on terrorism related charges.

Sadeque, of the Atlanta suburb of Roswell and an FBI suspect as global Islamist militant, was arrested on April 17, 2006 in Dhaka when he was 19 and was secretly taken back to the USA in a special flight on April 20, 2006.

The High Court of Bangladesh in a verdict on August 27 this year declared that Sadeque's deportation to the US without any visa and deportation to the US without an extradition treaty was illegal.

The HC verdict came upon a writ petition filed by Sadeque's wife Happy Shahna challenging the legality of her husband's arrest and handing over to FBI.

Born in the US, Sadeque came to Bangladesh on August 20, 2005 and married Happy Shahna in 2006.

BBC adds: Sadeque was sentenced three years less than the prosecution had requested. He was in Bangladesh to meet terrorist cells and tried to help a Pakistani militant group.

His friend and co-defendant Haris, a US citizen of Pakistani descent, got 13 years in prison and 30 years supervised release.

## SA-Eng weighing options

First Test starts today

South Africa and England both face tricky decisions ahead of the first Test of a four-match series, starting at SuperSport Park on Wednesday.

South Africa have to decide whether to play star all-rounder Jacques Kallis, who is recovering from a rib injury. If he plays it will almost certainly be as a batsman only, which would probably mean South Africa going into the Test with only four recognised bowlers.

England, too, must decide whether they can afford to pick only four bowlers, especially as two of the likely attack, James Anderson and Ryan Sidebottom, have only bowled in one innings after recovering from injuries.

If England want to ensure back-up for the specialist bowlers, they will have to hand a first cap to all-rounder Luke Wright at the expense of a specialist batsman.

The preparation of both teams, and the opportunity to provide a workout for players whose places are up for debate, was frustrated by heavy rain on Monday which cut short England's net practice

and prevented the South Africans from going outdoors.

Rain has been a major factor in all three Test matches between South Africa and England at Centurion, with two matches drawn, with the only exception coming in 1999-2000 after then-South African captain Hansie Cronje engineered a contrived result in dubious circumstances after three days of play were washed out.

The three matches against England - who won after Cronje's controversial agreement to forego a second innings and set England a generous target- are the only Tests at Centurion not won by South Africa, who have achieved 11 victories at the ground.

The weather forecast for the days of the coming Test is largely favourable, however.

Pace bowlers usually get some assistance at Centurion, while spin bowlers can rely on reasonable bounce.

England will go into the Tests with confidence high after winning a one-day series and performing well in warm-up matches, while South Africa have been jolted by some sub-standard performances.

Both teams have reasonably solid top order batting but potentially vulnerable

tails, so the bowlers will have a vital role. South African fast bowlers Dale Steyn and Morne Morkel are potential match-winners but Steyn has been struggling with a hamstring injury, while Morkel was dropped last season after bowling inconsistently. Morkel, however, has shown good form in the current season.

England's key bowler is likely to be Anderson, who has been outstanding for his country recently, while Stuart Broad is a potential match-winner who has yet to hit top form on tour.
