Poor must get full cost of adaptation

Hasina demands at climate summit; urges rich nations to rise above petty interests

UNB, Copenhagen

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has said Bangladesh and other most vulnerable countries (MVCs) must be provided with compensatory grant and easily accessible adequate fund to meet the full cost of adaptation to climate change.

Addressing the UN Climate Change Conference yesterday afternoon (local time), the PM also urged the world nations to rise above perceived and petty national interests in the greater interest of



the existence of this mother planet.

She said representatives from Bangladesh and other countries have come to this beautiful city of Copenhagen with hopes of justice, equity, and for a fresh start to ensure the common safety of mankind.

"We've come to see a world united for once, with a single vision of saving our frail mother planet indeed, our futures are intertwined, and depend on the choices we make here," Hasina said.

Climate summit chief resigns amid protests

Negotiators from both coalitions of developed and developing countries stuck to their stances and bracketed some texts on curbing emission of carbon dioxide, saying there was no progress on that point at the ongoing summit on climate change.

"Bracketing texts means there will be no further discussion on that issue until the brackets are withdrawn," said one of the negotiators from Bangladesh who attended a meeting between the G77 and China.

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BANGABANDHU CASE VERDICT Convicts may get copy today

The death row convicts in Bangabandhu murder case are likely to get copy of the Supreme Court verdict today, 27 days after it was delivered.

The full text of the historic judgement is to be released today, sources said.

The condemned killers will get 30 days to file review petitions upon receiving the copy.

A five-member bench of the apex court that heard appeals against the High Court (HC) verdict in the case has completed writing the judgement, sources added.

On November 19, the SC bench headed by Justice Md Tafazzul Islam dismissed the appeal petitions of five convicts against the third judgment of the High Court that handed them and seven others death penalty.

These five-- Syed Farooq Rahman, Sultan Shahriar Rashid Khan, Bazlul Huda, AKM Mohiuddin Ahmed and Muhimuddin

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Woman beaten by fraud manpower agent dies

A middle-aged woman severely beaten up by a manpower agent and his henchmen succumbed to her injuries at Dhaka Medical College Hospital yesterday after fighting for her life for 19 days.

The deceased was Shahana Begum, 48, wife of Abdul Barez of Hizla Kanargao in Keraniganj and mother of Mohammad Selim.

Manpower agent Iqbal of neighbouring village Bhawal Manoharia and his gang ruthlessly beat Shahana Begum at her house on November 27 as her son Selim tried to recover Tk 6.5 lakh from the agent after he [Iqbal] failed to send him to Italy.

Freedom fighter Rezaul Karim, brother of the deceased, said, "Around eight cadres led by Iqbal reached Selim's house in a microbus and started beating him. They later turned to his mother as she tried to resist their attempt to kidnap Selim."

The attackers escaped the scene when locals thronged there responding to the victims' scream.

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YOUTH FORCE OF PALASH DANGA

Indomitable spirit of 1971 still vivid

Against the Pakistani force's modern weapons and ammunition, the freedom-loving youths of Palash Danga Jubo Shibir in Sirajganj had almost nothing except the unrelenting urge to liberate the motherland from occupying forces, autocracy and repression.

They, however, had the advantage of local knowledge and tactics they could use. They used to take shelter on boats in wetlands and rivers.

Their struggle for an independent land, though little documented in history, paid off. The heroism of the laymen-turned guerrillas of Jubo Shibir in Sirajganj can still be an inspiration to the people who have not seen the

Liberation War with their own eyes.

Palash Danga Jubo Shibir was formed by some student leaders who did not go to India for training to fight against the Pakistani forces. They had only one two-inch mortar but the shells never missed the targets.

The guerrilla force, which started exercise in February, 1971 with sticks, fought around 100 battles in around 1,200 square miles including Sirajganj, parts of Tangail, Vangura, Chatmohor, Santhia, Bera, Bunari Nagar and Faridpur in Pabna, remote areas of Gurudaspur in Natore and Sherpur and Dhunat in Bogra. During the battles none of the Jubo Shibir members were killed. Only a few got injured.
