## Shibir, BCL clash in Bogra college 2 bullet-hit, college shut

The authorities closed Government Azizul Haque University College in Bogra for an indefinite period following a clash between Islami Chhatra Shibir and Bangladesh Chhatra League yesterday.

At least 18 students were injured in the clash with two sustaining bullet wounds. One student was hurt as a locally made bomb was hurled at him, our staff correspondent at Bogra reports.

Mahtab Uddin, secretary of the college's academic council, said classes were suspended and dormitories were vacated after the fight.

Female students were asked to vacate halls by today 10:00am. The academic council however decided that the admission process and examinations under the National University would continue, Mahtab said.

## SC slams the way killers treated

Terms sheltering, protecting murderers great crime; comes down hard on 'embarrassed' judges

The Supreme Court in its full judgement of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and most of his family members a great crime against humanity, mankind and civilisation.

"A murderer is always a murderer and a terrorist is always a terrorist and is enemy to mankind and humanity and an

offender in the eye of the law. To protect and shelter such killers is a great crime, a great sin and sin spares none," said Justice Md Abdul Aziz of the five-member SC bench, which dealt the historic criminal case, in his portion of the 412-page judgment.

Zardari won't resign, vows to fight back

Pakistan's President Asif Ali Zardari yesterday pledged to fight back following the announcement of a graft amnesty by the Supreme Court even as the ruling Pakistan People's Party said it had "complete confidence" in his leadership.

The beleaguered president made a vow "to fight back" while chairing a meeting of the PPP's central executive committee to review the fallout of the apex court's decision to strike down the National Reconciliation Ordinance.

## AL amends its constitution

Modifies provisions in conflict with RPO

Awami League has amended its constitution again, scrapping Swadhinata Chikitsak Parishad's status as associated body and modifying a provision on foreign chapters to make the charter comply with the Representation of the People Order.

However, the way it has brought the changes does not seem to conform to its charter that says only the party's national council shall amend the constitution.

In a letter submitted to Chief Election Commissioner ATM Shamsul Huda yesterday, AL said, "On consent of the Awami League president, two provisions have been amended so the charter is more in keeping with the RPO provisions."

## Climate accord best possible

Claim world leaders; int'l media terms it a failure

World leaders yesterday insisted that the climate deal clinched in desperation at the UN summit was the best that can be done as they returned home to a lashing from critics.

Newspapers widely called the summit accord a failure and experts such as the head of a Nobel Peace prize winning climate panel said "urgent" action was now needed.

US President Barack Obama acknowledged that all of the world's polluters would quickly have to do more, but German Chancellor Angela Merkel said the critics would only hold up the battle against rising temperatures that threaten devastating floods, storms and drought.

Obama returned to the White House and said "extremely difficult and complex negotiations" had been needed in Copenhagen.


