

## Can Mohammedan end drought?

Will it be Abahani once again to lift the supreme domestic trophy for the fourth time on a trot, or will Mohammedan be able to end their eight-year drought and bring it back to their Motijheel tent? Will it be the current stand-in skipper of national side Shakib Al Hasan to have the last laugh or will it be battle-hardened Khaled Mashud to have the last say?

We'll have to wait for a few more hours to learn all that when the perennial rivals of domestic cricket face off in the title-deciding Premier Super League clash at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium today.

Prospect of small battles within the big one are ensuing. One between the two captains, Abahani's skipper having the world on his feet while his Mohammedan counterpart looking perhaps for a perfect swansong after having been through all

these for years now.

It will be a battle of a very strong batting against a crafty spin attack, and vice versa. Personal performances are priorities too as the last chance to impress national selectors are at hand.

The two Pakistani all-rounders, Abdul Razzaq and Navedul Hasan, both ICL-ers and out of their national side, will have a chance to outshine the other in a battle of pride. So, whatever the end result, the match will be up to a mouth-watering prospect for the cricket-lovers.

The two sides are separated by a single point and a win or an unlikely tie in today's final round match can end eight years of title drought for the Motijheel outfit while a win will make sure of Abahani's fourth title in a row.

Mohammedan looked pretty indomitable winning their first ten matches in a row, including a six-wicket victory over Abahani in the first phase. But since then their performances have gone off the boil a bit as

they lost to an eventually relegated Khelaghar and then went down to a spirited Biman in the Super League stage. The sky-blues have pounced on those slip-ups from Mohammedan to turn the title race into a close affair. They have dropped just a single point in their last four matches, that drop came against Biman, and now find themselves a win away from holding the title.

Abahani's opening pair have been amongst runs throughout, but the inclusion of Pakistani all-rounder Abdul Razzaq has added the arrogance and flair that they lacked earlier. Mohammedan's batting has not stood up as they did in the first phase. The loss of explosive opener Tamim Iqbal to injury has no doubt been a huge blow to them. Mohammedan's Pakistani recruit Navedul Hasan has done ok with the ball but his performances with the bat disappointed the Mohammedan faithful. However, both teams have quality spinners in their side and the spin

## BOA assures 'em

The Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) has assured chef de missions from participating nations that all the venues would be ready much before the start of the 11th South Asian Games.

The regional Olympic jamboree will be held in Bangladesh from January 29 to February 9.

The renovation work at different venues and venues under construction like wooden-floor gymnasium, boxing stadium and handball stadium were scheduled to be completed in November.

But the National Sports Council is already running behind the schedule with the BOA announcing a fresh cutoff time to the high-profile dignitaries from eight out of the nine participating nations.

"We ensured them that all venues of the Games will be ready by January 15," said BOA vice-president and Bangladesh contingent's chef de mission Mizanur Rahman Manu after a meeting of chef de missions at Sheraton Hotel yesterday.

The chef de missions also visited Bangabandhu National Stadium, which will host the opening and closing ceremonies, Maulana Bhasani National Hockey Stadium, Volleyball Stadium, Kabaddi Court, Boxing

Stadium, Wooden-Floor Stadium and the NSC Gymnasium after the meeting.

They are also scheduled to visit the National Shooting Complex, Kurmitola Golf Club, Mirpur Indoor Stadium, National Swimming Complex in Mirpur and Bangladesh Krira Shikha Protishthan today.

The meeting also discussed the Games' technical aspects, accreditation, anti-doping and media related matters. Besides, some visiting officials also raised the issue of holding non-Olympic event like cricket. However, the meeting finally stuck to previous 23 disciplines for the 12-day spectacle.

The meeting also ensured the leaders that the final scheduled would be ready soon after the participating nations send their entries by December 30.

BOA president and Army chief General M Abdul Mubeen, who graced the meeting as the chief guest, said that the event would be an opportunity to intensify the bond among the South Asian countries. He also stressed that Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has been backing them tremendously to make the SA Games a success.

BOA secretary general Kutubuddin Ahmed, ceremonies sub-committee convenor Major General (retd) Amin Ahmed Chowdhury, accreditation sub-committee convenor Major General Rafiqul Islam and venue sub-committee convenor Major General Moiul Islam were among other present on the occasion.

## Aussies do it easily

Australia needed 21 balls on the last day to win the third and final Test and take the Frank Worrell Trophy with a 2-0 victory over West Indies at the WACA in Perth on Sunday. The result was virtually assured as soon as the day broke sunny, with the hosts wanting one wicket and it came when Kemar Roach was ruled caught behind via an umpiring review.

Roach and Gavin Tonge had added 15 when Doug Bollinger and the Australians were certain Roach had got an edge to Brad Haddin. The batsman immediately called for a review: there was a noise but no replay showed a clear nick and there was nothing on Hot Spot. Everyone was standing around for a couple of minutes before Billy Bowden finally raised his finger for a second time following consultation with Asad Rauf.

"He smashed it," Bollinger said. "He hit it, he was out." Bollinger finished with 3 for 71 and eight wickets for the game.

Roach (17) and Tonge (23 not out) started the last day chasing 51 to reach the victory target of 359 after putting on 29 from 30 balls on the fourth evening. Roach played and missed a couple of times in Shane Watson's first over before Bollinger was taken for five runs by the aggressive Tonge. Tonge then inside-edged Watson for four and drove over mid-off for two before the fielding mood changed when Roach sliced a four over gully. They were soon celebrating again in a mixture of relief and satisfaction.

The reason West Indies still had an outside chance on the final morning was due to the 128-run partnership between Narsingh Deonarine (82) and Brendan Nash (65), but their hopes diminished when they lost six wickets in the final session. Mitchell Johnson bowled through the discomfort of an illness to take three victims yesterday while Watson gained two.

The game will be remembered mostly for the man-of-the-match Chris Gayle's 70-ball century on the second day, his second hundred of a series which started with a three-day loss

## 'Dhoni factor may hurt India'

Sri Lanka captain Kumar Sangakkara believes the absence of his Indian counterpart Mahendra Singh Dhoni for the third ODI in Cuttack on Monday is likely to hurt the home side, as both teams look to take the upper hand in the five-match series.

Dhoni was banned with immediate effect for two ODIs following India's failure to maintain the over-rate during the second match against Sri Lanka in Nagpur, which they lost by three wickets. While Virender Sehwag will be leading the side for the games in Cuttack and Kolkata, Dhoni will return only for the final ODI in Delhi.

"I hope it [Dhoni's absence] is a factor. He has been one of the players who has been in form, so obviously it's a blow to lose him," Sangakkara said.

Dhoni been in great touch in the series scoring 72 and 107 in the first two matches, and the dual pressure on Sehwag as opener and captain is something Sri Lanka is hoping to cash in on. "The only edge we can take is if we get him out early," Sangakkara said. "We will go all out and make sure that he is out cheaply."

Not that Sri Lanka have less worries of their own. Sangakkara ruled the loss of his in-form all-rounder Angelo Mathews, who returned home on Sunday morning after straining his right quadricep muscle during the Nagpur game. "We too have received a setback. We lost out on Angelo Mathews. He has gone back home," Sangakkara said.

## INDIA V SRI LANKA, 3RD ODI

## Big guns absent

The build-up to today's third one-day international between India and Sri Lanka has been dominated by the two-match ban and the hosts parried Mohammedan till the 77th minute before national striker Emily gave Mohammedan a deserved lead. Three minutes later he struck his 11th goal of the season to make the result safe.

Arambagh, however, pulled one goal back in the stoppage time through a stunning goal by Nigerian striker Subair Mohammed.

Though Mohammedan appeared disorga-

nised right from the beginning, but they gradually gained in confidence to assert authority in the midfield against a side, who creditably snatched points against powerhouses like Sheikh Russel and Brothers Union.

The Motijheel-based outfit, Mohammedan, produced the first real scoring chance in the 13th minute when Nigerian striker Alamu Bukola Olalekan headed a Wali Faisal cross wide from close and three minutes later, he again frustrated all the tall striker having shrugged off his two markers advanced into the box, but saw his curling shot to the far post miss the target narrowly.

Arambagh mustered their first shot on target on the half-hour mark, but the country's number one goalkeeper Aminul Haque faced no problem to grab a header from Subair.

Though Arambagh appeared working hard in the first half to fight equally against their neighbouring club, they adopted a defensive strategy from the beginning of the second half in the face of tremendous pressure from Mohammedan, who went all-out and yielded


