Bangladesh Institute of Development Studies (BIDS) organised the workshop on a study titled 'Gender, Social Capital, Local Government and Climate Change Adaptation in Bangladesh' at a in their indigenous knowlcity hotel.

Speaking as the chief guest, State Minister for

Environment and Forest Hasan Mahmud said women are more vulnerable to natural disasters, which are more frequent now due to climate

change. It is the local government that can address the needs of the people during a disaster promptly. So, the local government should be strengthened, he added.

Hasan said, "Though it is found that people use their indigenous knowledge during natural disasters, we must have to incorporate science and technological innovations

variables is also important. Besides the government, the community has collective responsibility, he noted.

"The well-off people in disaster-prone localities can build themselves an infrastructure which could be used as a cyclone shelter. Even the mosques and temples built by the community people can be designed in such a way so that these can be used during natural disasters."

Hasan further said that the people of Bangladesh have created an example of climate change adaptation in front of the global community in Denmark.

"In the Copenhagen conference, we could place the

vulnerability of the people of Bangladesh to the global community. The fate of the climate vulnerable people now depends on our next steps regarding climate change," he said.

"It is yet to be made clear to us how the amount that Bangladesh will receive from the climate fund will be used," said Nilufar Ahmed, representative from the World Bank.

Court asks IO to submit probe report by Jan 27

A Dhaka court yesterday directed the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) to submit its probe report in the Pilkhana carnage case by January 27 next year.

Chief Metropolitan Magistrate AKM Enamul Haque passed the order as Additional Superintendent of CID Abdul Kahar Akond, also investigation officer (IO) of the case, failed to submit probe report yesterday (December 23).

A total of 2161 jawans of the Bangladesh Rifles (BDR), including 29 civilians, have

been arrested in this case so far. Of the accused, 2143 have been remanded and 507 confessed to their involvement with the February 25-26 BDR mutiny.

Meantime, a total of 114 BDR jawans had earlier submitted petitions to different courts to let them retract their confessional statements.

2 Wasa staffs suspended for taking bribe

Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) has suspended its two employees for their alleged involvement in taking bribe.

Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) on December 20 caught redhanded them identified as revenue inspector of zone-1 Md Mizanur Rahman and assistant pump operator zone-6 Md Boshir Ahmed Talukdar.

According to the employee rules 1990 of Dhaka Wasa, taking bribe or taking bribe in connivance with others will be considered as cheating for which Wasa can punish, said a press release.

The employees were suspended following two separate office order signed by Wasa Managing Director Taksim A Khan on December 22.

The authorities also dismissed revenue inspector Wares Hossain Munshi who was suspended earlier.
