Canals left out of recovery drive

Dozens of canals in and around Dhaka dying due to encroachment, pollution

Canals in Dhaka, Narayanganj, Gazipur and Munshiganj will soon become non-existent unless the authorities concerned immediately bring them under the ongoing river-saving drive, said district administration officials and environmentalists of the four districts.

Without these canals, rivers of the districts would drastically lose navigability creating more pressure on roadways. For years these canals have been used for transportation of farm and dairy products from peripheral vil-

lages of the city.

According to Prof Muzaffer Ahmad, president of Bangladesh Paribesh Andolon (BAPA), these canals are as important as the rivers since the ecology of Dhaka depends on them.

"We have always been vocal about saving these canals along with the rivers in order to ensure a sound ecology and being well of the people living around them, Ahmad said.

The authorities declared the rivers Buriganga, Turag, Balu and Shitalakhya ecologically critical areas (ECA), but did not mention SEE PAGE 15 COL 1

Bangladeshi to lead UN peacekeepers in Ivory Coast

The United Nations is going to appoint a major general from Bangladesh Army as the commander of its peacekeeping mission in Ivory Coast.

Chairman of parliamentary standing committee on defence ministry M Idris Ali said this to reporters at the Zia International Airport on his arrival after a 14-day official visit to the peacekeeping missions in the African states of Ivory Coast and Congo.

A number of members of Bangladesh armed forces and police are engaged in the UN missions there.

Talking to the press, Idris Ali also pointed out that there are some problems Bangladeshi peacekeepers are facing abroad.

The standing committee will submit recommendations to the government in this regard like taking initiatives to provide Bangladeshi soldiers with cheap phone call rates for talking to their relatives back in the country and chartering aircraft to fly them home on annual holidays, he said.

1.5 lakh bags of fertiliser lying on streets for 6yrs

Importer didn't take delivery as test found those mixed with ground stones, brick chips

A huge amount of imported fertiliser stockpiled at different places in the port city's Sadarghat and Bangla Bazar areas over the last six years is causing serious environmental pollution. Sources said around 1.5 lakh bags of fused magnesium phos-

phate (FMP) fertiliser worth about Tk 20 crore have been kept on the government and private land occupying huge space along Sadarghat Strand Road in the city since 2003.

The importer avoided taking delivery as chemical tests showed that the fertiliser was mixed with ground stones and brick chips.

A portion of the imported FMP, kept under the open sky, is getting damaged and harming the environment as it regularly gets rainwater. Chittagong Port Authority (CPA) and Department of Environment (DoE) are issuing warnings to the people concerned but nothing happens, local sources said.

Non-delivery of fertiliser bags has left huge amount of dues unpaid for years and deepened the crisis of storage space, sources said.

Ripon Group of Industries at Bijoynagar, Dhaka imported 1,48,397 bags of fertiliser, each weighing 50 kg, from China in

The importer with bank liabilities abstained from responding to the repeated calls of contractor and commission agents for taking delivery of the fertiliser and paying the space charge worth over Tk 1.5 crore.

Buriganga cleaning drive starts in Jan

Authorities plan massive excavation to free riverbed from dumped polythene, other waste

Rampant and mindless dumping of polythene bags, plastics, coconut shells and other waste materials especially from the kitchen markets has produced millions of tonnes of sludge on the bed of the river Buriganga, said a BIWTA

The highest concentration of such waste has settled on the bed of the river near Sadarghat launch terminal in the capital, prompting Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority

to take up a cleaning drive from the first week of January 2010.

"Initially we will remove the garbage from one kilometre area of the Buriganga bed stretching from Badamtoli Bridge to Simpson Ghat near Sadarghat," said another official of BIWTA, adding that the drive will go on for three months.

The target of the drive is to clear up around three lakh cubic metre of sludge from the Buriganga.
