

# 50pc adult population carry TB germs

Says expert

About 50 percent of the country's adult population carry tuberculosis bacteria, but very few of them carry active germs as the bacteria remain in hidden form.

Dr Fahim Ahmed Chowdhury of Brac Health Programme revealed this yesterday, urging the government to step up preventive measures to control the disease.

"Bangladesh ranks sixth among the 22 high burden countries of TB, which infects 93 lakh people and claims 23 lakh lives every year across the globe," Fahim said at a roundtable on TB control programme in Bangladesh at the National Press Club.

The Health and Environment Journalists Forum, the National Tuberculosis Programme (NTP) and Brac Health

Programme jointly organised the roundtable moderated by Forum President Mustafiz Shafi.

Line Director of TB, Leprosy Control Programme Dr Provat Chandra Barua, Forum General Secretary Saiful Islam Shameem, Dr Mahfuza Rifat and Dr Jalal Uddin Ahmed of Brac, Dr K Zaman of ICDDR,B, Probir Kanti Das of BGMEA, Dr Wahiduzzaman of Chest Disease Hospital, Dr Lutfar Rahman of Urban TB Control Programme and journalists Masud Kamal and Shishir Moral also spoke.

Dr Fahim said TB detection and cure rates in the country have reached to 73 percent and 92 percent respectively, well above the target of millennium development goal -- 70 percent for case detection rate and 85 percent for cure rate.

"But much more needs to be done to

control multi-drug resistant (MDR) and extremely drug resistant (XDR) tuberculosis," he said, adding that the cases of MDR TB is on the rise due to non-compliance with medicines.

Some doctors are also responsible for MDR and XDR cases in the country, said Programme Manager of NTP Dr Nazrul Islam.

Making inappropriate prescriptions ignoring proper doses of drug, drug combination and duration could also lead to drug resistance, he added.

Dr Nazrul said a total of 283 MDR tuberculosis cases have been recorded in the country so far and 19 of them died and 22 became defaulter, a rate which is growing due to high toxicity of drugs. The MDR drugs are generally 100 times expensive than the normal drugs.

# '97pc accidents occur due to drivers' carelessness'

Around 97 percent road accidents occur due to drivers' carelessness, said Dhaka Metropolitan Police Commissioner AKM Shahidul Haque yesterday.

He made the comment at a workshop on traffic rules for motor vehicle drivers held at Pallabi Community Centre at Pallabi in the city.

Around 300 drivers of different modes of vehicles took part at the workshop.

Dhaka Sarak Paribahan Samity general secretary Khandaker Enayet Ullah, Bangladesh Sarak Paribahan Federation acting general secretary and high police officials spoke at the workshop.

The commissioner said police would help drivers

willing to have real driving licenses and for having such licenses traffic police will not file criminal cases against the fake license holders till March 31, 2010.

He warned that after the deadline police would go tough against the fake driving license holders.

He said they are trying to form a culture among commuters to follow traffic rules spontaneously instead of compelling them to follow.

Citing statistics of road accidents happened between January to November, he said carelessness of drivers were responsible for 97 percent road accidents.

He urged the leaders of transport owners and workers association to find out corrupt leaders and suspend them from their organisations.

Work abstention of diploma nurses following quarrel with college staff

A squabble between the diploma student nurses and 4th class employees reached stalemate at Dhaka Nursing College, adjacent to Dhaka Medical College and Hospital (DMCH), yesterday.

Under the circumstances, the diploma nurses of the college have started work abstention at DMCH.

Following an objectionable remark by a security guard on Saturday night, a group of diploma nurses attacked the guard and injured him severely.

Security guard Nurul Islam Musa made the remark as one of the nurses entered the college hostel around 11:00pm.

Eyewitnesses said as the news spread to the hostel, more than 50 student diploma nurses came and beat up him severely. Later, he was taken to DMCH.

Protesting the incident, the 4th class employees withdrew other employees from the college and threatened the principal and student nurses.

Talking to The Daily Star, Principal of the college Tahatun Nahar admitted that the employees have threatened her.

A five-member committee, led by Laily Begum, has been formed to investigate the issue. The probe body will submit its report within five workdays.

With withdrawal of the employees from the college hostel has virtually collapsed the security, dining and administration of the college while services to patients are hindered at DMCH for work abstention.

# Food for work not enough to fight poverty

Prof Barakat tells seminar

Janata Bank (JB) Chairman Prof Abul Barakat at a seminar yesterday said food for work or relief programme would not be able to eradicate poverty completely.

These programmes of the government might help reduce poverty temporarily, he added.

The economist said the government should take long term plans to reduce the eradication instead of short term programme like relief or food for work, etc.

Prof Barakat said this at the seminar titled 'Poverty reduction in spirit of Bangladesh Liberation War' at Cirdap auditorium in the city.

He suggested proper distribution of resources among the ultra-poor people to reduce poverty.

The JB chairman, also professor of Economics department, read out a keynote paper at the seminar which was presided over by Proshika Executive Director Mahbub-Ul-Karim.

Mohiuddin Khan Alamgir, chairman of parliamentary standing committee on public undertakings, was present at the event as the chief guest while Whip Sagutta Yasmin was present as the special guest.

The government has already started working

to eradicate poverty with long-term vision and plans as well, said Mohiuddin. "Growing number of population is our main challenge and ultra-poor section is mostly affected by the bad impact of poverty."

Senior Assistant Editor of the daily Sangbad Moniruzzaman moderated the seminar while Editor of the Shamakal Golam Sarwar, Brac University Pro-VC Golam Samdani Fakir, Managing Editor of BSS Azizul Islam Bhuiyan, Prof MM Akash, Prof ABM Nasir, Fahmida Khutun of CPD and Muhammad A Rafat of Independent University of Bangladesh also spoke.

Politicians, economists and development activists at the seminar suggested structural change in the country's economic management to ensure equal opportunities for all and fair distribution of resources.

Organised social insurance systems, including well-covered safety net and establishment of pro-people administrative and political culture, have also been recommended.

Prof Akash stressed the need for a discussion in the parliament for a structural change in economy. "Bangladesh is mired in economic plundering and the politicians are blamed for the situation."
