Redesign varsity curriculum

Says Prof Gowher Rizvi

Bangladesh has to redesign the curriculum and teaching approaches in the universities to help students become worthy citizens in pluralistic societies and learn skills to face the daunting global challenges, eminent educationist Prof Gowher Rizvi said yesterday.

"We have to design a curriculum that is innovative and in which the pedagogic choices are studentcentred," he said while delivering a lecture on 'Reinventing Universities: Higher Education in a Global Society'.

The Asiatic Society of Bangladesh

organised the lecture at its auditorium in the city to mark its 58th anniversary.

Prof Rizvi, an adviser to the prime minister on international affairs, said single disciplinary training is an inadequate preparation for students to face the complexity of today's world. Inclusion of multi-disciplinary insights, therefore, is of utmost impor-

Compulsory participation in civic and voluntary activities will be partial requirement for successful completion of a degree, he said.

Teachers must encourage students to volunteer in rural areas. By such

activities, students will be exposed to the real life problems and be able to address problems, said Prof Rizvi, also a former vice provost for International Virginia, USA.

Corruption at court starts from the listing of cases

Says attorney general

Bench officers of courts indulge in corruption due to inefficiency and carelessness of judges concerned, said Attorney General Mahbubey Alam yesterday.

Corruption at court starts from the listing of cases on the cause lists (cases that are due to be dealt with on a particular day) and it continues until files are sent to the section concerned of the court, he said.

"I believe that if a judge remains cautious, the court officials or staff will not be able to indulge in corruption," the attorney general said.

Mahbubey Alam said this at a function held to felicitate new Chief Justice Md Tafazzul Islam

at the Supreme Court yesterday morning.

He urged the chief justice to take some steps to protect the image and dignity of the court.

The attorney general and Supreme Court Bar Association president AFM Mesbahuddin hosted the felicitation programme for the new chiefjustice.

Chief Justice Tafazzul said collective and coherent effort and commitment of judges and advocates are absolutely imperative to making the independence of the judiciary meaningful.

He said, "I would like to ensure justice for a significant number of poor people who have been waiting for justice for long and failed to get it due to obstacles created by a vested quarter who use loopholes in the laws."

Freedom Party's EC registration at stake

Freedom Party, formed by some convicted killers of Bangabandhu, may lose its registration with the Election Commission (EC) as it informed the EC about its inability to submit its ratified charter before the deadline.

If a party fails to ratify its constitution by holding council and submit it to the EC on or before January 24, its registration will be cancelled as per the provision stipulated in the Representation of the People Order (RPO).

The EC earlier informed the Freedom Party about the deadline and the consequence if it fails to meet the time frame.

Syed Tareque Rahman, son of Syed Farooq Rahman, a convicted killer of Bangabandhu, last week in a letter informed the EC that it is not possible for his party to hold the council to ratify the party charter by January 24 deadline.

In the letter he sought an extension of the deadline. **Election Commissioner Brig**

Gen (retd) M Sakhawat Hossain vesterday told reporters that further extension of deadline is not possible. If any political party fails to submit its ratified constitution to the EC within the timeframe its registration will be cancelled, he added.

With the support and blessings of HM Ershad the coup leaders of Aug 15 Farooq Rahman, Khandaker Abdur Rashid and Bazlul Huda -floated the "Freedom Party" on November 7, 1987.

Dubai ruler's global vision reaches skywards

Sheikh Mohammad bin Rashed al-Maktoum, who on Monday inaugurates the world's tallest tower to mark his fourth year in power, appears determined not to let debt woes dampen his vision for Dubai's future.

The emirate's British-educated ruler has been the driving force behind the spectacular rise of the Gulf emirate into a boom town, and strives to project the image of a modern Arab leader. An avid horse-racing fan, Sheikh Mohammad has placed

little Dubai firmly on the world map as a business, IT, leisure and tourism hub, creating a modern city where 50 years ago there was mostly sand. Monday's official opening of Burj Dubai is on the fourth

anniversary of his accession following the death of his elder brother Sheikh Maktoum on January 4, 2006. Sheikh Mohammad, 60, has long pushed his vision of elevating Dubai to the status of global city, but the opening of the world record-breaking skyscraper comes amid a slump in

investor confidence over the emirate's debt problems. Hundreds of other building projects are in mothballs, and plunging property prices and weak demand had already put a dampener on new schemes even before November's shock announcement by state-owned giant Dubai World that it wants

to halt debt payments for six months. Despite the emirate's financial problems, Sheikh Mohammad has kept both his cool and his confidence in Dubai's future.

"I'm a Bedouin, and the Bedouins like to accept challenges," he told journalists recently inside his marbled Dubai

palace.

Sheikh Mohammad carefully crafted his role as national leader after also succeeding his brother as vice president and prime minister of the seven-member United Arab Emirates federation that includes Dubai.

In February 2007, he unveiled an economic plan for Dubai

aimed at maintaining double-digit growth, achieving a gross domestic product of 108 billion dollars and increasing per capita GDP to 44,000 dollars by 2015. Economic aims set out in 2000 for the next 10 years "have been realised in half the time," with GDP reaching 37 billion

dollars in 2005, he boasted. Over the course of 20 years, Sheikh Mohammad transformed Dubai, an emirate of 1.4 million inhabitants where natives form just around 20 percent of the population, into a

popular tourist destination, particularly with Europeans.

His decision in 1985 to arm Dubai with an airline, Emirates, was the first crucial move in a strategy to develop the desert city state into a business and tourism centre. In the following years, countless mega projects -- ranging from the Burj Dubai tower to the three-kilometre (two mile)

long Palm Jumeirah artificial island -- were launched and specialised free zones were created. Even with the current debt crisis, Dubai remains a bustling

city full of eye-catching sights. Grandiose ventures, including a "Dubailand" planned as a Middle East version of Orlando and an indoor ski resort, have ensured a steady stream of visitors.

Sheikh Mohammad has led the charge to model Dubai -where Asians are by far the largest group of expatriates, followed by Arabs and Westerners -- as a haven of tolerance.
