

Zoran arrives here tonight

Serbian coach Zoran Djordjevic is scheduled to arrive here tonight to take charge of the Bangladesh U-23 football team for the upcoming South Asian Games to be held in Bangladesh from January 29 to February 9.

Hosts Bangladesh have been drawn in Group A along with two-time champions Nepal, Maldives and Bhutan.

The Serbian coach will also

be given the responsibility to guide the senior team for the AFC Challenge Cup finals to be held in Sri Lanka from February 16 to 27. Bangladesh will play against Tajikistan, Myanmar and hosts Sri Lanka in Group A while Group B consists of defending champions India, North Korea, Turkmenistan and Kyrgyzstan. The champions of the tournament will earn direct entry to the Asia Cup.

Djordjevic's two assistants are also scheduled to arrive with him, but Zoran Kraljedic, one of the assistants, is expected to arrive on Wednesday while the arrival of the other assistant, Berber Dabor, who is coming in place of Sasa Nikolic, who can't come following his family problem, depends on the receipt of his air-ticket which will be sent by Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF).

India had a pretty good 2009 if one doesn't take into account the two ICC tournaments that were played in the year. The defending champions in the T20 format did not even qualify for the knockout stage of the tournament in England and then in South Africa they again struggled to get through the first round. Apart from these hiccups they had a very good year in the bilateral tours and dominated those tours. They will thus be looking to begin 2010 in a similar fashion and winning the tri-nation tournament would be a good way to get the year off to a rocking start. Having just played Sri Lanka they know that even without the two J's, Jayasuriya and Jayawardene, the Lankans are a good outfit and are always tough opponents. The youngsters in the Lankan team especially the bowlers have shown in the oneday series in India that with a bit of experience they will be hard to get away. Lakmal, Welegedera, Randiv have bowled well in patches in the just concluded series in India and Sangakkara will be hoping that another confrontation with the Indians will give the finishing touches and make them better bowlers for the future. With Muralitharan not looking to go beyond 2011 the Lankans will need to look for bowlers who can pick wickets on any surface as the magician Murali used to do. They also are missing the canny bowling of Chaminda Vaas who swung the new ball and also used the slower delivery well in the limited overs format and was also pretty handy with the bat.

Like the Lankans the Indians too are without their most experienced player in limited overs cricket, Sachin Tendulkar, but they have the services of Yuvraj who was not fully fit for the series against Sri Lanka. The Indians still have a formidable batting line-up and in the bowling too they have lots of experience and wickets behind them in Zaheer, Nehra and Harbhajan Singh. It is their fielding that is the worry though with the likes of Yuvraj, Raina and Rohit Sharma in the squad it can be electrifying too.

The pitch at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium has some grass on it and with the winter having settled in there is scope for the new-ball bowlers to use the seam well whether it is bowling first or later under the lights. It won't be the flat

The eagerly !dea CUP2010 anticipated Idea Cup trination series kicked off yesterday at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium with hosts Bangladesh taking on Sri Lanka. But the amount of enthusiasm expected to be generated was not reflected in the crowd turnout. It was not a desired attendance, considering an international match.

There might be one good reason that it was a weekday and more importantly cricket fans might have opted to stay indoors to avoid the bite of the cold that has crippled the country.

However, the crowd that braved the chilly weather found reasons to cheer about in only a few phases of the Bangladesh innings.

It was surprising to see the stadium less-than-half full when the Tigers took to the field. It becomes more puzzling for the fact that Bangladesh is launching a New Year on a high after a very successful last season. Enthusiasm for the game is on such a high that the recently concluded Premier League and the T20 Leagues have drawn packed audiences at this very ground on a number of occasions.

Can the cold be the only reason behind this low turnout? Or the high price of gallery tickets would be attributed for this apparent apathy? It must be mentioned here that the ticket price has been a little too high for this tournament according to enthusiastic fans. This time the lowest

ticket price has been set at Tk. 200 which may ward off many school or college going cricket fans from watching the matches inside the stadium. Bangladesh Cricket Board, however, thinks the price of tickets are reasonable, rather

the cold is to be blamed for this low turnout.

Ray Lindwall, Keith Miller, Bill O'Reilly, Victor Trumper and Waugh were formally inducted into the ICC Cricket Hall of Fame during the tea interval on the second day of the second Australia-Pakistan Test at the Sydney Cricket Ground.

Commemorative caps were presented by ICC director and Cricket Australia chairman Jack Clarke to the families of the deceased legends as well as Waugh.

Waugh was then driven around the outfield in an open-top car, accompanied by his three children, to allow the crowd to show its appreci-

Australia are praying their finalsession surge of seven wickets will motivate the batsmen into a significantly improved performance as they battle to avoid giving up their series lead. Pakistan have dominated the first two days against a struggling home side and hold a 204run advantage after finishing at a healthy 9 for 331.

Doug Bollinger, the leftarm fast bowler, led the Australian charge by snatching three victims with the second new ball in an actionpacked conclusion, but whether the hosts can remain in the game depends on the batsmen. "It was a good fightback by the guys," Bollinger said. "It was frustrating early, but they were two-for at tea and now they're nine down. We just need to try and get the last one tomorrow and then get our batting hats on for a certain amount of time and get something to bowl at in the second innings." **SEE PAGE 18 COL 1**

Dew's to blame Shakib's call to start matches early

Sri Lanka cruised to an easy idea Curzull sail when they handed a seven-wicket defeat to the Tigers chasing down the target of 261 runs in 44.5 overs in the opening match of the Idea Cup tri-nation one-day tournament at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur yesterday.

It was however not any brilliant batting effort from the Lankans rather the conditions that came to spotlight after the match as both skippers agreed that it was difficult for the fielding side to keep control of the match in heavy dew.

So, Bangladesh captain Shakib Al Hasan pointed his finger at his coin luck which he timing," the Tigers skipper joked. believed had actually made the difference.

Praising his team's batting effort which enabled them to put up a descent total of 260 runs on the board, Shakib laid all the blame on the conditions and suggested to bring forward the timing of the match in the greater interest of the game.

"I'm happy with our batting effort. We

were probably only 10 to 15 runs short. But I think it would've been difficult to defend even over 300 under these conditions. The dew factor is what made the difference, not our batting or bowling.

The obvious question then came up

"In the second half it was very difficult to grip the ball, the whole surface became unplayable."

whether winning the toss meant winning the game, Shakib emphatically said: "Yes, it all depends on the toss given the conditions. "I will have to practise winning tosses

if we want to win matches," mocked an ever-smiling Shakib.

"We may have to practise how to toss the coin rightly if we ultimately keep the same

About his team's chances against Sri Lanka, he said," We can beat this Sri Lanka side. If their first few batsmen who are in great form can be removed early, it will become an easy job."

Shakib said that he has spoken with his Sri Lanka opposite number, Kumar Sangakkara, and the umpires about the playing conditions and whether it was possible to start the games from 12pm instead of 2:30pm to reduce the impact of dew on deciding the outcome.

Sangakkara also echoed Shakib's sentiments about holding the matches early.

"Shakib made a very valid point. I do feel sorry for the team that fielded second. It is always difficult to play under lights with heavy dew around all over the surface.

"In this conditions, it is always a disadvantage to bowl second. So, the team winning the toss gets an unfair advantage.

"It would be good from the tournament's perspective if the games are brought forward."

The Sri Lanka skipper credited the Bangladesh team's batting effort. "They put on a great batting effort. Ashraful and Mahmudullah, in specific, batted brilliantly to set a challenging target. 260 was not a bad

total at all."

Despite the victory, one cause for concern for the Lankan skipper is the injury to Tillakaratne Dilshan which may rule him out of today's match against India.

MSC's hard-fought win

A second-half strike by forward Zahid Hasan Emily gave title contenders Mohammedan Sporting Club a hard-fought lone lgoal win over Farashganj Sporting Club in the Citycell Bangladesh

League at the Birshreshtha Shaheed Mostafa Kamal Stadium in Kamalapur yesterday.

Mohammedan had to wait for their seventh straight win until the 47th minute when Emily, who has been involved in a healthy battle with Abahani striker Enamul Haque for the golden boot, fired home a grounder from inside the box. The ball kissed the side post before entering the net much to the relief of the Motijheel outfit.

With this win Mohammedan joined holders Abahani at the top of the table, both having maximum 21 points.

Incidentally it was Emily's sixth goal that also put him at the top with Enamul, who struck twice in Abahani's 3-1 win against Rahmatganj the other day.

For Farashganj the defeat, their third in a row, meant that they have lost their way a bit

after four match unbeaten run in the league. Mohammedan looked lacklustre without their fever-hit Nigerian striker Alamu Bukola Olaleken although their other Nigerian recruit Emeka Christian did play the match after serving a two-match red card ban.

The first 45 minutes was listless with both

sides hitting one shot each on target. Emily and his striking partner Abdul Baten Komol's hesitation to pounce on an Emeka back header off a Mamun freekick inside the eight-yard box saw a chance go begging in the 16th minute.

On the half-hour mark, Farashganj almost took a lead when Imtiaz Sultan Zitu fired a sudden thunderous shot, but the ball flew inches over the crossbar much to the relief of Mohammedan goalkeeper Aminul Haque.

Pakistan take big lead

An attritional first two sessions gave way to an explosive finale as first Mohammad Yousuf and later Umar Akmal helped propel Pakistan to an imposing 204-run first innings lead on the second day of the second Test against Australia at the SCG on Monday.

Their frenetic efforts capitalised on the 109run opening stand of Imran Farhat and Salman Butt as Pakistan advanced to 331 for 9 at stumps, having displayed greater discipline and matchawareness than their Australian counterparts the previous day.

The tourists endured a testing opening to the day in gloomy, seaming conditions, but brightened in line with the weather over the course of the afternoon. Yousuf provided an immediate lift to proceedings by adding 27 runs in the space of 28 deliveries in the period

look relatively pedestrian by striking five boundaries from his first seven deliveries faced en route to a 48-ball innings of 49.

That Yousuf and Umar fell short of halfcenturies was due partly to Pakistan's penchant for attacking strokeplay in the final session and partly to the persistence of the Australian bowlers. Having been provided little to work with by their batsmen, Australia's attack stuck to their task admirably and were rewarded with seven final-session wickets, many caught in the deep as Pakistan sought quick runs.

Pakistan could be accused of taking their foot from the throats of the Australians in the lead-up to stumps, having at one stage thrust to 205 for the loss of two wickets on a surface drying by the hour. That may be so, but the tourists nonetheless outplayed their rivals in four of the five sessions through Monday, and are ideally positioned to break their ten-game losing streak to the Australians at the very venue where they last

Sanath has to force his way back to team

Trevor Bayliss, the Sri Lanka coach, has said Sanath Jayasuriya is unlikely to be picked as a specialist opener and will have to force his way in as a spinning all-rounder if he

is to play the 2011 World Cup. "As Jayasuriya has himself said on record, he is a spinning all-rounder now," Bayliss said. "If he keeps performing and putting pressure on others, he can always get in. It's up to him and what pressure he can

put on the others in the team." Jayasuriya didn't make the cut for the tri-nation tournament in Bangladesh, beginning Monday, and in a recent interview to Cricinfo, he said the team management should send a clear message to him

about his future. "The biggest challenge is to play the 2011 World Cup,' Jayasuriya said. "Obviously if the team management wants to send me a message they should be clear about that to me, as they have been in the past.

"I am only thinking of five ODIs at a time, and if I can perform in three out those five, I'm right on track for the nextWorld Cup."

The re-emergence of opener Upul Tharanga, it appears, has helped Sri Lanka firm up their plans for the World Cup. "Tharanga has played really well in the last series against India," Bayliss said. "His and Dilshan's opening partnership looks good for the World Cup."

Like Jayasuriya, Mahela Jayawardene too, hasn't been in great form in the ODIs, but Bayliss said it wasn't a big
