# 'Bismillah' and Islam as state religion to stay

PM tells 14-party meet

The words "Bismillah-Ar-Rahman-Ar-Rahim" in the preamble to the constitution and declaration of Islam as state religion will remain as they are, since they reflect the beliefs of the people, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said yesterday.

She was meeting 14-party leaders at her official residence Jamuna. It was the first such meeting since the Awami League-led grand alliance came to office in January last year.

Hasina, also president of AL and chief of the 14-party combine, however said the spirit of the original constitution would be restored declared illegal the fifth amendment, said meeting sources.

On the issue of Bismillah and Islam in the

constitution, she told the leaders they must accept the reality.

The matter came up when an alliance leader suggested that the 1972 constitution be restored to uphold secularism.

The fifth amendment incorporated "Bismillah-Ar-Rahman-Ar-Rahim (In the name of Allah, the Beneficent, the Merciful) into the preamble and the eighth amendment gave Islam the status of state religion.

The Supreme Court on Sunday vacated its stay on the HC verdict on the fifth amendment, which legitimises the regimes between August 15, 1975, and April 9, 1979.

At yesterday's meeting, the prime minister with inclusion of the High Court verdict that stressed the need for strengthening the 14party coalition, formed during the BNP-Jamaat coalition rule.

The ministry in its clarification said it did not authorise the advertisement adding that

India were far more crafty and disciplined than Bangladesh the previous night and they also had a few more runs on the board. But all that failed to have a significant impact as Sri Lanka coasted to their second victory in successive days under lights at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium vesterday.

A top-heavy batting lineup, minus even the highestrated batsman in one-day cricket, batted with aplomb and guile to overtake India's score of 279 with 5-wickets and 12 balls to spare, albeit with the obvious advantage of batting second.

Kudos then to Kumar Sangakkara, for calling the coin correctly, the second time in a row.

The Indian bowlers bowled pretty well; the three seamers extracted whatever bounce was on offer, Harbhajan Singh used all his experience to make inroads into the Sri Lankan batting lineup, but a very well-compiled hundred from Thilan Samaraweera, a second consecutive fifty from skipper Sangakkara, and a cameo from Thissara Perera meant Sri Lanka reached home with half their batting intact and two overs unused.

Samaraweera remained not out on 105 while Perera blasted a whirlwind 36 off just 15 deliveries; the left-hander dealing in boundaries with his score made up of six fours and one six.

## Hasina's India visit awaits beefed up security

A multi-layer security system will be in place in and around Maurya Sheraton Hotel in New Delhi where Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will stay during her three-day state visit to India.

Hasina, who will be on her first visit to India since assuming power in January 2009, is due to reach the Indian capital Sunday evening.

She will be staying at the same suite where world leaders had stayed during their trips to India. Generally reserved for high-profile VVIPs, the Chandra Gupta Maurya suite is considered the best from the security standpoint. Former US presidents Bill Clinton and George W Bush too had stayed there. Former prime minister Khaleda Zia also stayed at the same suite during her state visit to India in March, 2006.

Highly placed sources said beefed up security measures will be in place for the Bangladesh prime minister following security threat that resulted in the cancellation of her trip to Visva Bharati Universality at Santiniketan in West Bengal as well as her meetings with former West Bengal chief minister Jyoti Basu and incumbent chief minister Buddhadev Bhattacharya on January 13.

Officials, however, said the prime minister dropped the West Bengal visit from her schedule, as she would be busy at home afterwards.

According to our New Delhi correspondent, two separate teams of special security personnel from Bangladesh have already been to India to survey the security arrangements for Sheikh Hasina and her entourage.

## Technical committee asked to prepare draft in 3 weeks

An inter-ministerial meeting vesterday formed a 17-member technical committee in the environment and forest ministry for preparing the draft policy on ship-breaking industry. The meeting chaired by State Minister for Environment and

Forest Hasan Mahmud directed the committee, headed by environment secretary, to submit its report within three weeks. In a briefing after the meeting, Hasan Mahmud said the prime minister in the light of the High Court order asked the

ministry to formulate a new rule for flourishing ship breaking industry without causing any damage to environment. The HC in an order on March 17, 2009, gave eight directives to

the government to make the ship breaking industry environment friendly and make all ships free from dangerous chemicals before import. In light of the order, the government has taken initiative for

making a policy named 'Ship Breaking and Dangerous Waste Management Rule' and amend the existing Environment Conservation Act to allow the ship breaking industry flourish under a conducive atmosphere. Hasan said the government has already decided to make a

## Iran bans contact with 60 bodies BBC, HR Watch, VOA on list

Iran has banned its citizens from having contact with 60 organisations including the BBC, Human Rights Watch and opposition website Rahesabz as well as US-funded broadcasters, state media have reported.

The deputy intelligence minister in charge of external affairs said that the 60 blacklisted groups were suspected of being involved in efforts by Western governments to topple the Islamic regime as part of a "soft war" and that it was an offence to communicate with them.

"Any kind of contact by individuals or legal entities with those groups involved in the soft war is illegal and prohibited," state media quoted the deputy minister as saying on Monday without giving his name. The blacklisted organisations also included US government-

funded Voice of America and Radio Farda as well as US-based pro-monarchist satellite channels, Israeli public radio and the outlawed rebel People's Mujahedeen. The deputy minister also called on the public to avoid "irreg-

ular contacts with embassies or foreign nationals or centres linked to them". "Citizens should be alert to the traps of the enemies and cooperate with the intelligence ministry in protecting the nation

and neutralising the plots of foreigners and the conspirators," he said in allusion to opposition sympathisers who have held repeated protests over the past seven months.
