

Shakib not downbeat

One might !dea CUP2000 have thought that there would be little left to say for a captain after his side had suffered a massive ninewicket defeat but Bangladesh's Shakib Al Hasan had no shortage of words in explained. the press conference at the end of the game, except when it came to his bowlers.

The 22-year old Tigers skipper found no reason to be disappointed after his team's humiliating defeat against Sri Lanka in their third match of the Idea Cup tri-nation tournament at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur yesterday, rather he painted the bright signs of his team's

"It is something rare in Bangladesh cricket that the national team has scored 250plus runs in three consecutive matches and I think it shows that we have been playing good cricket," said Shakib reflecting on his team's 249run score in the third game which Sri Lanka overtook with 7.1 overs to spare riding on twin tons from Mahela Jayawardene and Upul Tharanga.

"We were however 30 runs short as we didn't play smart cricket in the batting powerplay and lost too many wickets at a crucial time," he added.

The Bangladesh bowling was helpless against the master class batting of the two Sri Lankan openers and when asked about the matter, Shakib said: "I don't want to

He was however quick to explain the reason behind the poor bowling effort. "Actually our bowlers gave too much room to the two opening batsmen and you know you can't survive at this level if you give too many chances," he

He also believed that even the presence of leading paceman Mashrafe Bin Mortaza would not have made any difference in this surface.

"He (Mashrafe) is a very good leader but I don't think his presence would have made any difference in this kind of surface," Shakib observed.

The young Bangladesh skipper however was a little bit unhappy with the fact that none of his batsmen could make the three-digit figure although almost all got starts towards making a big one.

"It's little bit disappointing and we definitely need to work on this area," he promised.

Shakib got back amongst the runs after two abortive efforts in the competition as he made 47 although it came off 75 balls. The left-hander however said that he was never under pressure.

"I enjoyed the time in the dressing room with my colleagues and passed the times in gossiping (adda) and I went to bed at 1.30am and walked in the morning as usual. I never felt any pressure on me," he

Shakib also talked about the poor turn out in the competition and blamed the high rates of the tickets.

Nadal's lost confidence

Rafael Nadal, seeking his first ATP World Tour title in eight months, admitted after reaching the semifinals of the Qatar Open that he has been suffering from a crisis of confidence. "I have had a lot of problems in the head,"

the former world number one said after winning 6-1, 2-0 when his opponent, the Belgian qualifier Steve Darcis, retired after only 35 minutes of very one-sided action.

"I have had under-confidence and things in the head -- but that's life. You have to accept problems and you have to come back. I am trying. We will see what happens in the next six months.'

For someone who has been conspicuously stable while closing out matches, rarely letting slip opportunities to win when they present themselves, Nadal's words superficially contained an element of surprise.

However, he has had increasing problems with arthritic knees, suffered from a stomach ailment, and reportedly been affected by the recent break-up of his parents' marriage.

The 24-year-old Majorcan took only two days' break over Christmas before returning to training and is here in Doha with his mother, though not his uncle-coach Toni. Apparently he will link up in Melbourne for Nadal's defence of the Australian Open title the week after next.

Nadal was asked whether the media has been too impatient with him -- suggesting that he is not the player he was, for having reached just one final since returning from a three-

month absence in August. "We will see in a few months," Nadal replied amicably. "Everyone is free to talk. I can say nothing against them. I didn't win against the

best players. "But that's tennis -- you can't be all the time one hundred percent. I am ready to try and win

tournaments, but you never know what will happen. You have to work every day, every week, and wait your moment."

During the very short time Nadal was on court it was apparent that he was trying to be more forceful with his first serve, later volunteering to having made small improvements identified after many hours of watching videos with his uncle.

He also put plenty of energy into his pumping topspin drives, applying plenty of pressure without waiting for opportunities for his more characteristic counter-attacks. The highlight though was an inventive winning lob, played off his body like a cricket shot.

Nadal's semifinal opponent is Viktor Troicki, the tenacious Serbian, who came from 2-5 down in the final set to win 4-6, 6-4, 7-6 (7/1) against Lukasz Kubot, the first Pole to break into the world's top 100 since Wojtek Fibak a quarter of a century ago.

Nadal is now just one win from a 21st encounter with his great rival, Roger Federer, who reached the semi-finals only after a tough middle spell against the hard-hitting and talented but erratic Ernests Gulbis, whom he beat 6-2, 4-6, 6-4.

Federer looked comfortable at the start, but found the going much harder when the 21year-old Latvian began to land a high percentage of very high speed first serves during the second set, and to find his range with some ripping follow-up ground strokes.

Gulbis even broke back to lead 4-3 in the final set, but lacked the consistency to win the big points against the world number one when it really mattered. He had done enough though to suggest, not for the first time, that he ought to be pushing towards the top 20 rather than

languishing at world number 90. Federer now has a re-match with Nikolay Davydenko, the Russian who beat him in the semi-finals of the ATPWorld Tour Masters finals

Shakib 5th best Trophy unveiling today Test all-rounder

Bangladesh interim captain Shakib Al Hasan has made progress in the ICC Test allrounders ranking by stepping into the fifth position, said an ICC press release yesterday.

Shakib, who is number one in the ODI all-rounders ranking, has now 282 points to topple England's all-rounder Stuart Broad and grab the fifth position following his brilliant performance in the West Indies last year.

South African all-rounder Jacques Kallis and New Zealand captain Daniel Vettori, both lost points in the new publication though both are still maintaining the top two positions respectively. Australian Mitchell Johnson (339) and England's Graeme Swann (304) followed Kallis and Vettori in the rankings.

Meanwhile, Graeme Smith, Jacques Kallis and Mike Hussey are the main movers in the rankings for Test batsmen while bowlers Mohammad Asif, Morne Morkel and James Anderson also made progress.

Indian opener Gautam Ghambir, Sri Lankan Mahela Jayawardene and Kumar Sangakkara are in top three positions respectively in the Test batsmen ranking while South African Dale Steyn and Australian Mitchell Johnson are in the top two places in the Test bowlers ranking followed by Pakistan seamer Mohammad Asif and Sri Lanka spinner Muttiah Muralidaran.

State-run Bangladesh Television will telecast the unveiling programme live from the venue at 6:45 pm. Besides, fans across the country will have a

chance to glimpse the ceremony on big screens in Dhaka, Chittagong and Cox's Bazar. In Dhaka, Uttara Friends Club, Banani Society Field, Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium, Kalabagan Club field, East End Club field, Shaheed Hazi Abdul Alim Eidgah field, Shiraz Mia Memorial Model School field, Dholaipur High School field, Dhaka University, and Shaheed Alauddin Park field will beam the action live. Fans in Chittagong will be able to catch the action live at the MA Aziz Stadium, while Laboni Point in Cox's Bazar will serve as another location for viewers.

World Cup 2011 in Bangladesh. In attendance will be, ICC vice president and chairman of the central organising committee Sharad Pawar, ICC chief executive officer Haroon Lorgat and tournament director Prof. Ratnakar Shetty This is the first COC meeting that will be held in Bangladesh. Smith rues missed chance

Number 11 batsman Graham Onions batted out the last over for the second time in the series as England escaped with a draw on the fifth day of the third Test against South Africa at Newlands on Thursday.

South African captain Graeme Smith bemoaned his side's inability to finish off the opposition, which means England go into the fourth and final Test in Johannesburg next Thursday with an unbeatable 1-0 lead despite South Africa twice getting within one wicket of victory.

"It's hugely frustrating not being able to land the knockout blow," said Smith.

"We arrived in this Test match under a lot of pressure with a lot of questions being asked. We were put in to bat on a wicket that was doing a bit and the guys showed a lot of character. We played a lot of positive cricket."

England finished on 296 for nine after four needing five wickets to square the series. wickets fell in the last hour.

"Everyone gave 100 percent in that last 15 overs," said Smith.

England captain Andrew Strauss hailed Onions as 'a legend' but said the finish should not have been so close after an 'unbelievable partnership' between Paul Collingwood and Ian Bell, who batted together for almost four hours.

Strauss said England would not be satisfied with a share of the series.

"It's nice to know they can't win it but we came here to win the series," said the South

"We'll be pretty unhappy when we step on that plane if we let them back in. But we've got to be better than we were in this game."

A dramatic finish seemed unlikely after Collingwood and Bell saw off the second new ball and batted comfortably into the last hour.

But Collingwood was caught at slip off the part-time off-spinner JP Duminy with 13.3 overs remaining and as happened in the first Test at Centurion England found themselves in desperate trouble.

In Duminy's next over Matt Prior prodded a catch to AB de Villiers at short leg.

With up to seven fielders clustered around the bat, Stuart Broad survived without scoring a run for 22 balls before a ball from leftarm spinner Paul Harris bounced and popped off his glove for De Villiers to make another catch at short leg.

Fast bowler Morne Morkel was brought back into the South African attack and with his first ball had Bell caught at first slip by Graeme Smith after a 286-minute vigil in which he scored 78.

There were 17 balls left but Onions and Graeme Swann survived against Dale Steyn and Morkel, with Onions playing out a challenging

last over from Morkel with impressive calm. South African hopes were high when they took the second new ball one over after lunch,

But Collingwood survived a blistering spell of fast bowling from Dale Steyn, while the rest of the South African bowling attack made a minimal impression on a pitch which played easily under a warm sun.

"We had it well set up with five down and that new ball coming," said Smith.

"We bowled well with it. The first ten overs with that new ball was key. Collingwood and Bell stuck to their game plans and really showed a lot of strength of character.

"I really can't complain about the performance of our bowlers with the second new ball. We asked a lot of questions. I think Paul played 10 out of 18 balls at one stage.'

Strauss praised the two batsmen. "Colly used his experience again and Ian Bell has wanted to play an innings like that for a
