Pointing out that Islam is a religion of peace and does not allow any kind of terror, Hasina said those who are indulging in terror activities in the name of religion are bringing a bad name to it. "Terrorists have no religion," she

She said she had clearly stated that Bangladesh will not allow its territory to be used for any kind of terror activities against any country. "Our two countries should cooperate with each other to tackle terror."

Asked about Bangladesh allowing India to use Chittagong and Mongla ports and also transit, Hasina said, "In the present day world you cannot live with doors closed," and that the issue of transit should be seen in the context of regional cooperation in connectivity. She also said, "We will allow

Nepal and Bhutan to use those

When asked, what assurance she has got from India on Tipaimukh dam on the Barak river, Hasina said, "The Indian prime minister has repeatedly said that India would not do anything that harms Bangladesh's interest. And if he is repeatedly saying that, I have to believe in that.'

Then she went on to add, 'What can I say on a project when there is noting on the ground? I don't understand why there is such a storm over something which does not exist there.

On Bangladesh's concerns over trade gap with India, she said discussions were held on how to increase Bangladesh's exports to India.

When an Indian journalist said there are 'anti-India sentiments in certain quarters' in Bangladesh, Hasina replied, "There will be anti-India sentiments. I cannot change that. But if the common people are benefiting from relations with India, then this anti-India sentiment would not work."

"Some quarters will continue to use anti-India sentiments. You cannot do anything about it. It will con-

tinue," she said. Asked about sharing the water of common rivers, Hasina said there had been no talk between Bangladesh and India on the matter since 2002, and things started to move forward only after her government had come back to power

between Bangladesh and India during her visit will benefit not only the people of the two countries, but also of Bhutan, Nepal and the rest of the region, she said. "We signed the agreements

so the poor people of this region, not only of Bangladesh and India, may overcome poverty," Hasina said.

"We want peace to prevail in this region at all times, and for that reason our position against terrorism will be tough. We want the people of this region to live in peace. Peace, security and economic development is our target,' she said adding that establishing peace in South Asia was her party Awami League's (AL) one of the electoral pledges.

She said trafficking of children, women, drugs and arms should be stopped immediately in South Asia and that is why Bangladesh signed the treaties with India.

Tens of thousands of activists and supporters of ruling AL and its associated organisations lined the airport road since afternoon to welcome the premier back home, as AI on Tuesday had decided to accord a grand reception to Hasina on her arrival. Incumbent ministers
