# Clinton appeals for donations to save Haitians

AFP, Washington

Former US president Bill Clinton urged Americans yesterday to make donations as small as 10 dollars urgently to help bring life-saving food and water to earthquake ravaged

"You've got unprecedented numbers of the people roaming the streets at night with no place to sleep. They haven't had any sleep in two days, they don't have water, they don't have food," Clinton said on CNN television.

So "the most immediate thing now is for people even to give small amounts of money, but we need large numbers of people giving small amounts of money so we can get food, water, medical supplies and shelter there," he said.

Clinton said people were urged to rush through tions clintonfoundation.Org/haiti earthquake, or to text "haiti" to 20222 to make 10-dollar dona-

"They can give ten bucks. We've got to do this. That's how we're going to avoid having the city erupt more," the former US president said.

President Barack Obama enlisted both Clinton, who is the UN special envoy for Haiti, and former president George W. Bush to lead private sector fund raising for Haiti.

After the immediate emergency situation "president Bush and I will do everything we can to make America a big part of this long-term partnership, and president Obama has tasked the secretary of state and the aid director to manage America's end of this," Blill Clinton added.

Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, who canceled a trip to Asia to address the humanitarian crisis, also made the rounds of six morning television news shows where she too urged Americans to make 10-dollar donations by cellular tele-

Bill Clinton, writing in The Washington Post, said aid should go to building a better future for the Western Hemisphere's poorest nation

including better buildings schools and health care.

"Establishing this foundation for a better Haitian future will require assistance from governments, businesses and private citizens. The people of Haiti deserve our support," he said.

The Clintons have a longrunning involvement with Haiti, where they spent their honeymoon.

Haitians were grasped for fading signs of life meanwhile Friday in the Looters raided UN food stores in Port-au-Prince in a sign of the desperate situation facing its homeless, scarred and traumatized residents after a 7.0 quake the Red Cross said may have killed 50,000 people. SECURITYSITUATION

The committee rejected two suggestions of the Jamaat-e-Islami, one of which was that the service chiefs should be appointed after parliamentary approval. The issue had soured relations between the PPP and the PML-N who had formed a coalition after their one-two finish in the February 2008 general elections that brought an elected government to power after nine years.

The PML-N had walked out of the coalition after President Asif Ali Zardari, who is also the PPP co-chair refused to budge on the issue.

Zardari has twice in the past promised the amendment would be repealed but has not set a deadline for this.

"We've already asked our national agricultural research system to go for varietal development of aman," Matia added. "In the upland we'll provide full support to farmers for aman expansion while we'll promote boro in the low lying regions," she said adding that farmers actually can ill-afford 55 days of irrigation and drawing up of 3,000 litres of water for producing one kilogram of boro.

She said the government wants to expand boro cultivation in the south rather than in the north, as cropping intensity has already reached to a record high of 300 percent in the north while it is 120 percent in the south.

Irrigation and other input (fertilisers, pesticides etc.) intensive boro, which has been a tertiary or secondary rice crop in Bangladesh until the late '90s, now contributes 60 percent to the country's annual staple contributions of rain-fed aman and aus varieties.

According to official statistics, a boro yield of 8.1 million metric tonne (MT) topped the 8 million MT yield of aman for the first time in 1997-'98, whereas during the period of 1971-'72, the first year of Bangladesh's independence, boro output had been only 1.7 million MT compared to 4.1 million MT of aman's.

Last year farmers in Bangladesh produced over 18 million MT of boro while aman was produced around 12 million MT. While cultivating boro is

expensive in terms of irrigation and input cost, growing aman, at times, is risky because of its nature-dependency. In the last aman season, the government had to provide farmers with free electricity for supplementary irrigation due to a delayed monsoon and erratic rainfall.

The government's plan of

letting the rain-fed rice varieties to have an upper hand over the

irrigated one, comes hard on the heels of international research findings showing accumulation of arsenic in croplands due to excessive groundwater irrigation.

A study carried out by leading arsenic researchers from home and abroad, and published in the January edition of scientific journal Nature Geoscience, reveals that monsoon flooding of 0.9 metre depth removes up to 62 percent of accumulated arsenic from cultivable lands, but the poisonous metalloids largely remain deposited on non-flooded farmlands posing threat to future crop production.

In Bangladesh, only 21 percent lands are annually flooded with depth of 0.9 metre. The agriculture minister laid

special emphasis on using surface water for irrigation, rather than over exploiting the depleting groundwater, and spoke of the government's plan to procure dredgers for dredging the rivers to facilitate surface irrigation.

Matia also underscored the need for judicious use of irrigaoutput, well surpassing the tion water in the farmlands. She favoured alternate wet and dry (AWD) irrigation instead of keeping the boro lands submerged all the time. Expansion of AWD, said Matia, can effectively reduce water use for growing dry season rice. A study by the Indian

Council of Agricultura Research (ICAR) shows, if croplands are kept alternatively wet and dry rather than submerged continuously, it increases grain yield by 20 percent, and reduces water requirements up to 70 percent.

stacked outside the city morgue, and limbs of the dead protruded from the rubble of crushed schools and homes. A few workers were able to free people who had been trapped under the rubble for days, but others attended to the grim task of using bulldozers to transport loads of bodies.

For the long-suffering peo ple of Haiti, the Western Hemisphere's poorest nation, shockwas giving way to despair.

"We need food. The people are suffering. My neighbours and friends are suffering," said Sylvain Angerlotte, 22. "We don't have money. We don't have nothing to eat. We need pure water." From Europe, Asia and the

Americas, more than 20 governments, the UN and private aid groups were sending planeloads of high-energy biscuits and other food, tons of water, tents, blankets, waterpurification gear, heavy equipment for removing debris, helicopters and other transport. Hundreds of search-andrescue, medical and other specialists also headed to Haiti.

The UN World Food Programme began organising distribution centres for food and water Thursday, said Kim Bolduc, acting chief of the large UN mission in this desperately poor country. She said it was remarkable there were no widespread reports of looting, but added that "the risk of having social unrest very soon made it important to move quickly.

Governments and government agencies have pledged about \$400 million worth of aid, including \$100 million from the United States.

But into the third day following the 7.0-magnitude quake, the global helping hand was slowed by a damaged seaport and an airport that turned away civilian aid planes for eight hours Thursday because of a lack of space and fuel. Aid workers have been blocked by debris on inadequate roads and by survivors gathered in the open out of fear of aftershocks and reentering unstable buildings.

Across the sprawling, hilly city, people milled about in open areas, hopeful for help, sometimes setting up camps amid piles of salvaged goods, including food scavenged from the rubble.

Small groups could be seen burying dead by roadsides. Other dust-covered bodies were being dragged down streets, toward hospitals where relatives hoped to leave them. Countless dead remained unburied, some in piles. Outside one pharmacy, the body of a woman was covered by a sheet, a small bundle atop her, a tiny foot poking from its covering. Aid worker Fevil Dubien said
