PM's India visit to help improve relations

Speakers tell BBC dialogue

Speakers at a BBC dialogue yesterday said prime minister's visit to India was a successful one and longstanding issues, including acute shortage of electricity and terrorism, will be solved through the treaties and memorandums of understanding signed by the two countries.

The PM's visit has developed a friendly relationship between the two neighbouring countries which would make easy the way of working together on any issue, they added.

The speakers said this at the BBC Bangladesh Sanglap on 'Different contemporary issues' of the CHT region organised by BBC Bangla Rangamati.

Dipankar Talukder, Chakma Circle Chief Raja Devasish Roy, HR activists advocate Sushmita Chakma and columnist Maj (retd) Mohammed Emdadul Islam were the panellists at the dialogue.

Civil society members, political leaders, businessmen, NGO representatives, journalists and government officials participated in the dialogue moderated by BBC journalist Mithila Farzana.

Underscoring the need for full implementation of the CHT Peace Accord, the speakers said the people living in the CHT areas want to see a 'roadmap' for completion of the remaining tasks.

A decade elapsed after singing of the peace deal, but the main prob-

list for holding elections to three hill district councils still did not hold water.

Replying to a query, Raja Devasish Roy said, "Everybody, irrespective of party affiliation, has to work together and assist the government for full implementation of the peace deal," adding that a 'roadmap' should be declared immediately by the PM.

Dipankar Talukder said, "Prime minister is committed to executing the deed fully. I hope we would be able to complete the remaining tasks within here. the tenure of the government."

"A vested quarter is trying to destroy the existing communal harmony in the areas creating false propagandas against the peace State Minister for CHT Affairs and preparation for a separate voter Committee, CHT Refugee Affairs

Taskforce and Land Commission."

About withdrawing of makeshift security camps from CHT in line with the peace deal, the speakers said military presence in hills is not necessary. Only mutual understanding is necessary to bring permanent peace in hills, not army.

Stressing the need for handover of power into three Hill District Councils State Minister for CHT Affairs to recruit mixed local police forces as per the deal, Devasish said mixed local police force is necessary for maintaining law and order situation

There has been some decrease in killings, abductions and extortions in the hilly areas remarkably comparing the past, he added.

22,000 health workers to be appointed in rural areas

Some 22,000 health workers will be appointed this year to expand health care facilities in rural areas through the community clinics, said State Minister for Health Mujibur Rahman Fakir yesterday.

He was speaking at a function marking the opening of Diabetic Samity Bhaban in Sherpur

Fakir, a former captain of the army, said 4,000

doctors and 5,000 nurses are being appointed by February. The health workers will be appointed in

three phases this year. He said the BNP-led alliance government had closed down 9,000 community clinics across the country overnight. But the present government has

already reopened 8,000 of those clinics.

The state minister said they have a plan for reaching health care to the doorsteps of the people. One community clinic will be set up for each 6,000 people. The plan will be implemented in phases.

Sweet water on decline in Rajshahi city

Study finds presence of iron, hardness, alkalinity

There has been some decrease at sweet water level in Rajshahi City Corporation (RCC) area resulting in the scarcity of drinking water, said a geographical study at the concluding session of the two-day international seminar at Rajshahi University yesterday.

The study said though the earth's surface contains 73 percent of water, sweet water accounts for only 2.53 percent. Due to the increasing pressure of population,

contamination in the sweet water reservoirs and anthropogenic interference, the reservoirs are being degraded resulting in the scarcity of drinkingwater. The groundwater level continues to decrease

in the RCC area due to the impact of Farakka Barrage over the river Padma. As a result, the increasing demand for water and its deficit is being observed, it said.

The study highlighted that the presence of higher amount of iron in the underground water, hardness and alkalinity have created problems for water-related activities in the area.

Institute of Bangladesh Studies (IBS) organised the seminar on 'Past and Present of Rajshahi' at IBS gallery where Vice Chancellor Prof Abdus Sobhan was present as the chief guest.

Chaired by IBS Director Prof Mahbubur Rahman, Prof Rafiqul Alam Rumi, Prof M Mostofa Kamal, Prof AKM Hossain, Prof Sahanara Hossain and Dr Ranjit Sen from India addressed the programme.

A total of 30 keynote papers were presented at the concluding ceremony which was followed by a cultural programme.
