Jyoti Basu passes away

Veteran Marxist leader and India's longestserving chief minister Jyoti Basu died in Kolkata yesterday after battling for life for 16 days.

A beacon to Indian communist movement, Basu was 95 and is survived by his only son Chandan Basu.

The condition of the patriarch of Communist Party of India (CPI-M) at AMRI Hospital in Salt Lake locality was extremely critical for the last three days with all his vital organs--lungs, heart, kidney, brain and liver--turning dysfunctional. And an attending doctor said, "There is little hope of good result".

The news of his death was announced to the media by an emotional CPI(M) leader Biman Bose at around 12:30 hours.

Rajuk asks owner of Jamuna Future Park

Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk) has served a notice upon the authorities of Jamuna Future Park, asking them to demolish four unauthorised floors of the shopping complex in the capital within seven days.

Rajuk in the notice dated January 13 said the authorities of the shopping complex built a 10storey building, although they have an approved design for six storeys.

The notice is the third of its kind, meaning now Rajuk itself might move to demolish the unauthorised floors if the complex authorities

Chairman of Jamuna Group Nurul Islam Babul however told The Daily Star that he filed a writ petition yesterday against the notice, adding, although the notice is the third of its kind, he had not received the prior two notices.

Regarding unauthorised construction he said according to the design approval letter, he could build beyond six storeys with endorsement from Rajuk building inspector.

"Rajuk and the public works ministry are after me, as the Daily Jugantor belonging to Jamuna Group ran news items against them,"

Skipper Shakib Al Hasan and Shahadat Hossain equally shared eight wickets as Bangladesh pulled something special out of the ordinary on the first day of the opening Test against India at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium here yesterday.

The collective efforts of the two Tigers backed by some spirited fielding saw the vaunted Indian batting line-up collapse to 213-8 by stumps, an achievement Bangladesh would certainly relish especially after the harsh comment made by stand-in India captain Virender Sehwag who termed his opponents 'ordinary' the other day.

It could have been a complete dominance of the Tigers against the number one Test side had master batsman Sachin Tendulkar not stood in the way with a resolute 76 not out.

However Bangladesh could have finished the day with more
