FIFTH AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION

High Court verdict beyond jurisdiction: TH Khan

Advocate TH Khan yesterday told the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court (SC) that the High Court (HC) verdict that nullified the fifth amendment to the constitution of Bangladesh was beyond its (HC) jurisdiction, since the Appellate Division had earlier in different verdicts legitimised this amendment.

The amendment had legitimised all governments that had been in power following the coup of August 15, 1975 till April 9, 1979 including late president Ziaur Rahman's ascension to the presi-

Upon a writ petition, on August 29, 2005 the HC in a landmark verdict declared illegal and void this amendment, rendering illegal the regimes of Khandaker Moshtaque Ahmed, Abu Sadaat Mohammad Sayem, and Maj Gen Ziaur Rahman between August 15, 1975 and April 9, 1979.

TH Khan argued that as per article 111 of the constitution, any decision of the Appellate Division is a binding order for all the courts including the HC, and that is republic, he added.

The six-member full bench of the Appellate Division, headed by Chief Justice Md Tafazzul Islam, yesterday adjourned the first day's hearing on leave-to-appeal petitions, and fixed January 21 for further hearing.

BNP Secretary General Khandaker Delwar Hossain and three SC lawyers Tajul Islam, Kamruzzaman Bhuiyan, and Munshi Ahsan Kabir filed the petitions with the SC in May last year.

On January 3 this year, the Appellate Division lifted its four-year old stay order on the HC verdict and also allowed withdrawal by the incumbent government and Muktijoddha Kalyan Trust of two leave-to-appeal petitions against the HC The executive, judiciary, legislative verdict.




