



40 Huji operatives still at large

Law enforcers searching for them

Around 40 operatives of outlawed Harkatul Jihad Al Islami (Huji) including convicted and charge-sheeted accused of different bomb attack cases are still on the run, posing a threat to the country.

Some of the absconding militants are holding secret meetings and were even training up members at a secluded place in Mohammadpur in the capital a few months ago.

However, the militants cancelled the training and abandoned the area after different intelligence and law-enforcement agencies started a hunt for them months after the present government assumed power, intelligence and Huji sources say.

The absconding Huji leaders include some of the top brasses like Mufti Shafiqur Rahman, Sheikh Farid, Maulana Abu Bakar, Abdul Hannan Sabbir, Maulana Liton, Abdul Hye, Abu Jehad, Abu Musa, Abdullah, Sagir Bin Emdad, Maulana Monir, Maulana Masum and Golam

Mostafa.

Most of them have training on sophisticated weapons and grenades.

Sources in the law-enforcement agencies believe the militants responsible for deadly bomb and grenade attacks and death of over 90 people since 1999 are still a threat.

However, top officials from Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) and Detective Branch (DB) say since the absconding militants are on the run, possibility of any attack by them is very slim.

"There is little chance of any attack by Huji men since we are always after them," Rab Director General Hassan Mahmood Khandkar told The Daily Star recently.

DB Deputy Commissioner Monirul Islam also expressed similar view on the issue.

The Rab DG said they have lists of the members of not only Huji but also other militant outfits including banned Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) and are always after them.

Escap to make plan for Asian connectivity Rail, road networks, energy cooperation

The Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (Escap) has been requested by Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean) to prepare necessary programme for establishing road and railway connectivity among the Asian countries.

Escap Executive Secretary Noeleen Heyzer apprised President Zillur Rahman of this latest initiative when she paid a courtesy call on him at Bangabhaban yesterday.

About socioeconomic impacts of interregional connectivity, Heyzer said "The connectivity would facilitate the transporting of

goods and services in this region."

The UN agency is also working to build energycooperation network in this region, she said.

Heyzer hoped that after formulating the programme, the Escap would be able to find the development partners for providing financial assistance to the programme.

The executive secretary also assured increased cooperation and financial assistance for the socioeconomic development in Bangladesh.



2 Pak nationals held with fake Indian notes

Detective Branch of police arrested three persons including two Pakistani nationals and seized fake Indian currencies worth about 10 lakh Indian rupees from their possession at a Mouchak hotel in the capital on Monday.


Danish lives at West Rampura with his wife Opi. The criminals were rounded up as they were waiting to handover 10 lakh forged Indian currencies to their clients.

Chaos hampers aid delivery to Haiti

The US military has begun airdropping food and water supplies into earthquake-hit Haiti. Some 14,000 ready-to-eat meals and 15,000

litres of water were dropped north-east of the capital Port-au-Prince, the US said. It had earlier said airdrops were too risky but congestion at the airport has hampered aid

distribution. The US is now considering airdrops across Haiti. More than 2,000 US Marines are set to join 1,000 US troops in Haiti.

Relief workers say pockets of violence in Haiti's devastated capital are hindering a slow increase in much-needed aid delivery, and some residents have banded together to protect the few possessions they have left.

As thousands of others head to the countryside, people in one hillside Port-au-Prince district blocked off access to their street with cars and asked local young men to patrol for

looters. "We never count on the government here,"

said Tatony Vieux, 29. "Never."

But the scope of catastrophe had widened dramatically. The latest casualty report, from the European Commission citing Haitian government figures, doubled previous estimates of the dead to approximately 200,000, with some 70,000 bodies recovered and trucked off to mass graves. The port remains blocked. Distribution of

food, water and supplies from the city's lone airport to the needy are increasing but still remained a work in progress, frustrating many survivors who sleep in the streets and outdoor camps of tens of thousands. European Commission analysts estimate 250,000 were injured and 1.5 million were made homeless.

US troops are equipped with heavy-lifting and earth-moving equipment, a dozen helicopters and medical support facilities.

Their arrival comes amid widespread violence and looting. However, UN humanitarian chief John

Holmes played down worries over security, saying that despite incidents of violence, the overall situation was calm.
