PM to head committee on Rooppur nuke power plant

The government is considering formation of a highpowered cabinet committee headed by the prime minister to supervise Rooppur nuclear power plant and give directives for implementation of the project.

State Minister for Science and ICT Yeafesh Osman said this in parliament yesterday.

Citing that setting up a nuclear power plant is very expensive, complicated and sensitive, he said the government is also thinking of forming a high-level technical committee.

Upazila parishads to be made effective

Syed Ashraf says govt to amend law to ensure their independence

LGRD and Cooperatives Minister Syed Ashraful Islam said yesterday the government has taken initiatives to make upazila parishads effective and independent.

The Upazila Parishad Act will be amended soon to enable elected representatives of people in upazila parishads to work independently, he said.

And parliament members will remain advisers to upazila parishads for a short period, the minister added.

Ashraf, who is also general secretary of the ruling Awami League, was speaking as chief guest at a meeting of chairmen and vicechairmen of upazila parishads from across the country, held at the Jatiya Press Club in the capital.

The meeting, organised by Bangladesh

Upazila Parishad Association and chaired by its Convener Harun-Or-Rashid, was also addressed by a number of chairmen and vicechairmen. They include Gias Uddin, Abdur Rouf, ABM Abdus Sattar, Mushfiqur Rahman and Abdul Halim.

The speakers alleged that they are not being allowed to discharge their functions properly, and expressed dissatisfaction that parliament members have been made advisers to upazila parishads

The minister said a vested quarter is out to provoke upazila chairmen and vice-chairmen against the government.

The same quarter is also trying to foment communalism and fundamentalism in the country following the prime minister's successful visit to India, he said.

and spiritual selves and become good citizens. Often they get injured while performing the challenging tasks, find it difficult to sleep in tents amid this shivering cold, but nothing can defeat their enthusiasm about the jamboree and the fun it holds.

Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) has requested the Rajuk chairman to take action against Jamuna Future Park Shopping Complex in Kuril of the capital, for its construction without a clearance for the vehicular traffic it will generate.

DMP also asked in the letter dated January 18, how could Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk) approve the complex's design without the DMP clearance for vehicular traffic.

The project will generate heavy vehicular traffic in the area leading to tailbacks, the letter said.

The letter also mentioned that Jamuna Future Park authorities applied to DMP for a clearance for implementation of the project that comprises a park, a shopping complex, a hotel, a hospital, and other related structures.

But the police department told the project authorities to resubmit the application indicating compliance with a number of recommendations including construction of an alternative access road to the project directly from Airport Road, the letter

The recommendations also included having two other entrances to the project, one from Pragati Sharani-Rampura Road according to the proposed project design, and another

Haitians panic clashes between two

AP, AFP, Port-au-Prince factions of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal at Dhaka A powerful aftershock struck Haiti yesterday, shaking buildings and sending screaming people running into the streets only University? eight days after the country's capital was devastated by a major earthquake.

The magnitude-6.1 temblor was the largest aftershock yet to the apocalyptic January 12 quake that shattered Haiti's capital. It was not immediately clear if it caused additional damage or injuries. The new quake hit at 6:03 am (1103 GMT) about 56km north-

west of the capital of Port-au-Prince and 22km below the surface. Wails of terror rose from frightened survivors as the earth

shuddered at 6:03 am. Last week's magnitude-7 quake killed an estimated 200,000 people in Haiti, left 250,000 injured and made 1.5 million homeless, according to the European Union Commission. A massive international aid effort has been launched, but is struggling with overwhelming logistical problems.

Still, search-and-rescue teams have emerged from the ruins with some improbable success stories including the rescue of SEE PAGE 15 COL 7

Fresh earthquake, 300 killed as riot spreads in Nigeria

Nigeria sent more troops to the troubled city of Jos as clashes between Muslim and Christian mobs, that have left about 300 people dead, spread to new districts.

Vice President Goodluck Jonathan ordered extra soldiers to Jos late Tuesday to clamp down on the violence as authorities enforced a 24hour curfew.

The unrest erupted on Sunday over plans to build a mosque in a mainly Christian district of the city, which has riven by sectarian tensions for many years.

Mobs have set fire to buildings while many of the fatalities were just shot dead. Muslim leaders said about 200 bodies had been taken to the central mosque in Jos.

Several hundred have been reported wounded and casualties have filled hospitals. Some clinics were reportedly running out of

Idris Sarki, who fled into Jos from the nearby town of Kuru Karama, said "attacks are still going on in areas in the southern parts of the city including Kuru Karama, Bisiji, Sabongidan and Kanar.

"The area I came from has been sacked, all residents like me who are fortunate have left, but many, many have been killed," he told AFP. Other residents said they had seen the army
