Behind gas crisis

Neglect of nat'l companies causes short supply; local gas cos with more reserve produce less than IOCs with smaller reserve

The country would not have faced any gas crisis now if the government paid a little attention to capacity building and modernising the companies under Petrobangla instead of becoming overdependent on foreign oil companies to produce gas, experts say.

"International oil companies (IOCs) with fewer gas reserves are producing much higher volume of gas because they have installed bigger production wells. They have done so because they have detailed information about their gas fields," said a senior official of Petrobangla.

"In contrast, the wells of the big national companies like Bangladesh Gas Fields Company Ltd (BGFCL) or Sylhet Gas Field Ltd (SGFL) are old and much narrower. They never modernised their gas fields to increase production capacity, neither did they try to gather detailed information about the gas fields' health," he added.

This has not happened because the government did not have fund to run the

Bangladesh Petroleum Exploration Company (Bapex) is set to start for the first time three dimensional surveys in large national gas fields within a couple of months, completion of which will give a new understanding of the fields.

national gas companies. On the contrary, Petrobangla and its affiliates have been earning thousands of crore taka each year -- all of which goes to the national exchequer and for payment for gas produced by foreign oil companies.

Until recently, Bangladeshi companies possessed 78 percent of proven gas and foreign companies only 22 percent. In terms of reserve this means, national oil companies had 5.38 trillion cubic feet (TCF) gas and foreign companies 1.53 TCF. This estimate has drastically changed after Chevron submitted two studies on its Bibiyana gas field's reserve.

The Bibiyana field was initially estimated to have 2.4 TCF recoverable gas (with 952 billion cubic feet proven reserve). Following studies and reassessment, Petrobangla recently increased its recoverable reserve to 5.76 TCF with its proved and probable reserve estimated at 7.43 TCF.

Devotees pour in as Biswa Ijtema begins

The three-day Biswa Ijtema, the largest congregation of Muslims after hajj, started yesterday on the bank of the Turag in Tongi with participation of a large number of devotees from home and abroad.

Locals and witnesses claimed that the number of devotees on

the first day of this year's Ijtema surpassed that of previous years.

Tens of thousands of devotees started arriving at the Ijtema ground in the morning from different places across the country to offer Juma prayers. The area literally turned into a human sea.

Maulana Qwari Zobayer, imam of Kakrail Mosque, led the Juma prayers with rows of worshippers spilling out of the 150acre ground, around 20km off the capital. Meanwhile, three people including two devotees died in the

last two days. Nurul Biswas, 50, died around 12:30am yesterday. The identity of another deceased devotee could not be known immediately. A policeman had died in an accident on Wednesday.

The namaz-e-janaza of the two devotees was held after the Juma prayers.

An unidentified devotee aged around 55 was killed while crossing the road in front of the Farmgate police box around 2:30am yesterday, said Tejgaon police.

The Juma prayers witnessed a huge gathering of devotees stretching from Tongi station road to Abdullahpur bus stand. Not getting space on the Ijtema ground, many were seen offering

the prayers on Dhaka-Mymensingh Highway.

Vehicular movement on the Dhaka-Mymensingh and Dhaka-Gazipur roads were halted for a few hours during the prayers, creating a long queue of vehicles. Many people offered SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

Teesta talks likely in March

The minister-level talks of Joint Rivers Commission (JRC) between Bangladesh and India will be held in March, Bangladesh High Commissioner to India Tari Ahmed Karim said here yesterday.

The meet is an attempt to work out an interim water-sharing agreement of the river Teesta, he said during a press conference at Indian Women Press Corps on the state of India-Bangladesh relation-ship after Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's visit to India.

He said the ministeriallevel JRC meeting is likely to be held in the first week of March either in Dhaka or New Delhi.

Karim said if the political leadership of the two countries show the determination to solve the Teesta watersharing issue, it could be done.

Pointing out Bangladesh's stance in favour of an interim agreement, he said, "Given the political eagerness of the two countries, we can resolve the matter."

Investigators still in the dark about plot

Charge sheet in BDR carnage case in a month

Investigators of the BDR headquarters carnage case have not yet pinpointed any conspiracy behind the bloodbath although they are considering submitting the charge sheet in a month.

Sources in the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) say the investigation officer and his assistant investigators are working hard to submit the charge sheet by February 20. The sources add the investigators have yet to train enough

focus on tracing any conspiracy behind the mutiny as they are getting bogged down in probing offences like murder, arson and loot inside the BDR HQ.

Following the Pilkhana carnage that killed 74 people including 57 army officers, the investigators have detected 75 places of occurrence, while the number of witnesses is around 8,000. "We'll have the opportunity to submit a supplementary

charge sheet later if we find anything regarding conspiracy behind the February 25-26 mutiny," comments a CID investigator asking not to be identified. "There was certainly well-planned conspiracy behind such

carnage, but we've yet to make any headway to unveil it," he adds.

The national probe committee on the BDR mutiny could not establish beyond doubt the real cause and motive behind the barbaric incident.

The summery of the committee report however hints that the architects of the carnage might have used negative attitudes of

Work on counter intelligence unit underway

The government is working to set up counter intelligence unit for watching over the activities of the country's intelligence agencies and get advance intelligence on any future conspiracies or plot for unlawful activities.

To avoid recurrence of incidents like the Bangladesh Rifles mutiny last year, the government has already formed National Committee for Intelligence Coordination headed by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

In line with recommendations of the national enquiry committee on BDR mutiny, an inter-ministerial taskforce based in

the home ministry has also been formed to monitor implementation of the recommendations put forward by the retired bureaucrat Anis-Uzzaman Khan-led enquiry committee.

"The formation of a national crisis management committee headed by the prime minister is also underway. It will be formed to tackle future national crises," Home Secretary Abdus Sobhan Sikder told The Daily Starlast week.

The home minister, LGRD minister, cabinet secretary,

chiefs of the three defence services, chairman of the parliamentary standing committee on national security, opposition leader in parliament, IGP and director generals of NSI and DGFI will be members of the high-profile committee.

About formation of the much-talked-about counter intelligence unit, he said, "We are still working on it. We are discussing whether a single counter intelligence unit or separate units will be formed for each of the agencies."

National Security Intelligence (NSI), Special Branch (SB) of Police, Detective Branch (DB) of Police, Director General of Forces Intelligence (DGFI) and Rifles Security Unit (RSU) are the intelligence agencies.
