## NGOs could not make public institutions accountable

Says Prof Wahiduddin Mahmud

The non-government organisations (NGOs) could not create massive social awareness to make public institutions accountable for providing basic rights like education and healthcare for the poor, noted economist Prof Wahiduddin Mahmud said yesterday.

"At personal and family level, there has been a silent revolution. Bangladesh did better than many other countries in the world in terms of school enrolment of the girls, population control and reducing mortality rate," he added.

The NGOs could not ensure if the children going to schools are getting quality education or people as a whole are getting good healthcare. The institutions concerned could not be made accountable, said Prof Mahmud.

The speakers said this at the inaugural ceremony of a two-day 'Citizens' Rights Fair' at Shilpakala Academy in the city organised by an alliance of 57 grassroots development organisations working across the country.

The fair includes exhibition of the activities the NGOs are operating to promote citizens' rights and their socioeconomic development by setting up stalls, organising cultural shows and discussions.

Prof Mahmud, also a former adviser to a caretaker government, said strong democratic institutions, citizens' awareness and quality of political leadership are essential for strong democracy.

Quality political leadership and strong democratic institutions are still absent, he said, suggesting that massive social awareness on citizens' rights be created.

"The prime minister, leader of the opposition and three important ministers are women. These are successes, but still acid is thrown on women, they are victims of torture in inhumane ways. It is like darkness under light," he said.

Former chief justice Rahman called for qualitative political leadership, which will strengthen local governments, to institutionalise democracy that ensures equal rights of all citizens. Brac Chairperson Fazle Hasan Abed

said the poor people, especially the

women, children and ethnic people of the country, are struggling for their existence, and they are deprived of their basic rights. "They have a misperception that all are not equal. But, through this fair, we

want to tell them that the constitution of Bangladesh has given equal rights to all and they have to realise their rights." Calling on all to work for citizens'

rights, Abed said they want to form an effective network to work for the cause. Brac will start a programme to file public interest litigation, he noted.

# Dhaka highly vulnerable to quake: Expert

### Adequate preparation needed to minimise casualties

Adequate preparations are needed to minimise casualties and the loss of property in case of any possible earthquake, as Dhaka is highly vulnerable to tremor tries. under Madhupur Fault.

ASM Maksud Kamal, national adviser on Tsunami, Cyclone and Earthquake Risk of the CDMP, told UNB that Dhaka is highly vulnerable to earthquake under Madhupur Fault, as the phenomenal urbanisation, density of population and high-rise structures are growing fast here.

"We can't even imagine how much causalities and economic losses will be there in the city in case of a powerful tremor originating from Madhupur Fault," he said. According to a government study, some

131,029 people will die instantly while another 32,948 will be injured if a 7.5 magnitude earthquake from Madhupur Fault jolts the city. In case of an 8 magnitude earthquake

from plate boundary Fault-2, the study says, there will be about 69,874 instant deaths while 81,916 others will need to be admitted to hospital. In this case, the casualties will be less despite stronger tremor because of distance of its epicentre.

Comprehensive Disaster Management Programme (CDMP) under Food and Disaster Management Ministry conducted the study with the help of Asian Disaster Preparedness Center (ADPC). The United Nations Development

Programme (UNDP), UK Department for International Development (DFID) and European Commission provided financial support for the research project conducted from February 2008 to August 2009.

The study reveals that at least 10 major hospitals in the capital will be destroyed completely and another 241 hospitals and clinics partially in case of a 7.5 magnitude quake, mounting pressure on the city's other hospitals and clinics to treat the possible huge injured people.

It shows that only 24,242 hospital beds will be available on the day the quake will jolt for the use of the already-admitted patients and earthquake-injured people after the 7.5 jolt, which is only 41 percent

of the demand. A week after the shake, only 54 percent

of the beds will be available for the use while 72 percent after a month, the study said.

About 37,625 hospital beds, which are only 63 percent of requirement, will be available for the treatment of injured people on the day of an 8 magnitude earthquake. About 76 percent of the beds will be back in service after a week while about 87 percent will be fully operational after a month.

Citing four low to moderate tremors, the study apprehended that moderate to strong earthquakes may hit three major cities -- Dhaka, Chittagong and Sylhet -as those are situated in three separate risky earthquake zones. "Millions of people will die if a strong earthquake jolts the regions."

Maksud Kamal, also a professor of geological sciences of Dhaka University, said most of the healthcare centres in the capital have been set up for just making money, not for providing healthcare services, as no contingency plan taken for recovery from earthquakes.

"The highly vulnerable healthcare centres were constructed without any plan or maintaining the Bangladesh National Building Code (BNBC)," he said.


fied as Tilakananda Bhixmu, 25, son of Lokananda Bhixmu, of Miani Barua Para village. The accident took place
