'Bronchiolitis curable without antibiotics'

Though bronchiolitis is curable without antibiotics, most of the children suffering from the disease are provided with antibiotics that make the treatment costly and facilitate bacterial resistance to the children.

Study revealed that the result is same for bronchiolitis patients whether they are provided with antibiotics or not. But doctors, mostly on the outskirts of the city, are prescribing antibiotics for bronchiolitis.

The study was conducted in 2007 by Institute of Mother and Child Health (ICMH) on 327 children.

In the study, the children suffering from bronchiolitis were divided into three groups. The first group was provided with antibiotic injections while the second group with oral antibiotics while the third group was not provided with any antibiotics.

But the result was same for them as all the children were cured and their staying period in the hospital on an average was four days

and a half.

"Bronchiolitis is the 2nd leading disease in the country causing children's suffering as 21.4 percent children aged 0-2 years suffer from it. Providing antibiotics for bronchiolitis make the treatment costly. At the same time, it creates drug resistance that means the chance of the children's responding to that drug reduces," said Prof ARM Lutful Kabir of Faridpur Medical College and Hospital.

Providing antibiotics to the children at early age also increases the risk of their getting Asthma, he added.

Prof Kabir, principal investigator, said: "But as the symptoms of pneumonia and bronchiolitis are almost the same, the doctors diagnose bronchiolitis as pneumonia and prescribe antibiotic like Ceftriaxone, Ampicilin and Amoxycilin in most cases."

While visiting different city pharmacies, it was found that per phial of Ceftriaxone injec-tion is sold at Tk 150 to Tk 160. Some seven vials are required for each course, said salesman of Shahreen Drugs at Aziz Supermarket in the city.

"It means without proper diagnosis, many doctors are prescribing Ceftriaxone that forces poor parents to spend Tk 1,100 more for nothing. We should think how many people really can afford this extra amount and why they should have to spend this when 50 percent children in this country live in poverty and 25 percent are deprived of their basic rights," said Prof Abid Hossain Mollah of Pediatrics department, Dhaka Medical College and Hospital.

Prescribing antibiotic drug where it is not needed actually goes beyond its rational use. Though the management of bronchiolitis is clearly mentioned at National Guideline of Management of Bronchiolitis, very few doctors are following it, he added.

Bronchiolitis is caused by respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) and it is a self-limiting disease that is cured within seven days with supportive treatment like nebulisation and

Antibiotic drug is not needed for this purpose, experts said.

EXCESSIVE USE OF GROUND WATER DURING BORO SEASON

Adverse effect on drinking water feared

Excessive use of underground water during the boro season may have an adverse effect on the country's drinking water, warned International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) yesterday.

"The potential recharge of the aquifer that could be extracted by shallow tube wells had almost been exploited by 1996. Since then, the use of shallow tube wells has expanded, which suggests that the groundwater resources have already been overexploited," it said referring to the National Commission on Agriculture.

All this was stated in the book "Millions Fed: Proven Success in Agricultural Development" launched jointly by IFPRI and Brac at the Brac auditorium in the capital yesterday. David J Spielman and Rajul Pandya-Lorch edited the book.

The book highlighted the successes in agriculture

development over the last 50 years through 20 case studies from around the world and documented programmes, policies and investments that had positive impacts on huger and poverty.

David J Spielman said in the 1950s, around one billion people suffered from malnutrition. The number is still the same but the difference is that in the 50's one-third of the people suffered while it has dropped down to onesixth now.

With such developments, Bangladesh's rice production has increased from 23 million metric tonnes in 1989-90 to 43 million metric tonnes in 2007-08, he said.

"Much of this progress stems from the development of high-yielding dry season irrigated boro rice and the proliferation of simple and affordable tube wells that have been essential to the crop's success," said economist Mahabub Hossain in his article published in the book.

Hossain, also executive director of Brac, said market liberalisation for agriculture technologies in the 1980's significantly contributed to the increased yield, mainly irrigated boro.

He said heavy use of pesticides during boro production is having an adverse impact on the quality of surface water and fish habitats.

In 2008, more than 80 percent of farmers who cultivated modern boro varieties used pesticides while only 9 percent of wheat producers used pesticides and about 16 percent of farmers for other traditional rice varieties, he said.

"Another concern is arsenic contamination, which has been shown a serious problem in Bangladesh, though its link with exploitation of groundwater for boro cultivation has yet to be established," Mahabub Hossain said.

Agriculture Secretary CQK Mustaq Ahmed said consid-

ering the depletion of underground water, the government has already taken up projects to dredge rivers and increase the use of surface and rainwater.

Moreover, boro cultivation in the northern region would be gradually shifted to the southern part of the country by developing saline tolerant varieties, he said.

IFPRI's former board member M Syeduzzaman, who chaired the programme, said despite considerable achievements, 40 percent people still live below poverty line with the country lagging behind many of the Millennium Development Goals targets. These matters need attention, he said.

Each of the convicts got 30 minutes' time to meet their family in presence of jail officials, said a high official, preferring anonymity. He told The Daily Star that

the relatives talked about family affairs and the convicts wanted to know about the develop ments of the case. Wives of the three convicts,

other family members and relatives broke into tears during the meeting, but the convicts shed no tears, jail sources said.

On January 9, Major Bazlul Huda and Major (lancer) AKM Mohiuddin Ahmed sought presidential mercy through the jail authority, which were rejected later.

Nagorik Forum Chairman Abdullahil Masud in a written statement said a total of 4,133 people were killed and 29,574 injured, and prices of essentials took place for 39 times and 1,59,551 cases were lodged during the first year of the government.

from 10 member countries will


