

## Beauty, Al Amin earn pass mark

Sprinter Nazmun Nahar Beauty and long jumper Al Amin have been finally declared fit for the upcoming 11th South Asian Games as both passed their fitness tests at Bangladesh Krira Shikkha Protishthan yesterday.

After missing the final trial on January 15 due to injuries, a special trial was arranged for Beauty and Al Amin and both of them came out successful to compete in the regional extravaganza, beginning on January 29.

Four times a fastest woman of the country Beauty, however, will compete in the 200m instead of her favourite event of 100m sprint in which she finished just ahead of bottomplaced Nepalese Chandrakala Thapa in the last SA Games in Colombo.

Beauty was given a target of 25.25 seconds to run 200 metres and she reached the finish line, though she took a little longer, said coach Kitab Ali after the test.

Jasmin Akhter Chumki and Israt Jahan Iva will compete in the women's 100m sprint. In the trial, Al Amin was

asked to jump 6.25 metres and he jumped it successfully though his best performance was recorded at 6.60m in the National Championships. Bangladesh Athletics

Federation general secretary believes if Al Amin can jump in between 6.40 to 6.50 metres, he can win a medal in the meet.

Both Beauty and Al Amin suffered injuries after returning from Malaysia where they took a three-month higher training. They had earlier missed two trials at BKSP.

#### Bhutan booters arrive in Dhaka

Bhutan's Under-23 footbal squad became the first official foreign team to arrive in Dhaka for the 11th South Asian Games beginning on January 29.

The eight-team football event gets underway on January 30 with four matches scheduled for the opening day in Dhaka and Chittagong. Bhutan will face champi-

ons Maldives in the opening match of Group A at the Bangabandhu National Stadium while Bangladesh will take on Nepal in the same group later at the same venue.

India, Pakistan, Afghanistan and Sri Lanka, who are in Group B, will play at the MA Aziz Stadium in Chittagong.

Meanwhile, 13 swimmers and officials of the Nepal swimming team had earlier arrived in Dhaka last week to prepare themselves in Bangladesh following the chilly weather in

# Centurion Tendulkar praises BD bowlers

Bangladesh finished the second day's play of the second and final Test against India on a positive

note as the stumps were drawn after young paceman Shafiul Islam had got an edge off Harbhajan Singh at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur yesterday.

But the day actually belonged to the Indian batsmen as the twin tons from Sachin Tendulkar and Rahul Dravid established the visitors' supremacy by taking a 226-run lead with five wickets in hand. But considering the conditions and the strength of the Indian batting line-up, the local bowlers, especially the three-pronged pace attack, however deserved some credit as they consistently bowled in good areas and showed some aggression which even sent a batsman like Dravid to hospital after he was hit by a bouncer from Shahadat Hossain in his jaw.

More celebrations might have come the Tigers' way had they not missed some good chances. And dropping Tendulkar twice in the end proved costly as the batting maestro capitalised on those by hitting his 45th hundred. Rokibul Hasan was the main culprit to frustrate the bowlers in a condition where bowlers had to toil hard for a wicket and where one must make the half-chances into a successful one.

And the bowlers were duly praised by the little master, who worked hard for his 143 off 182 balls before he was caught at midwicket off left-arm spinner Shakib Al Hasan.

"In the last match I said, they [Bangladeshi bowlers] bowled well. They also bowled well today. They had a specific plan and they stuck to it. At certain stages they bowled well in partnerships. There were a few overs in between when we had chances to hit boundaries," said Tendulkar, who hit his second hundred in the series after his face-saving century in the first innings of the Chittagong Test.

"Runs don't come easy. You have to still go out there and score those runs. That's when it happens. I am of this opinion that no attack can be underestimated. And I've always applied myself whether we play against Australia or South Africa or Bangladesh or Zimbabwe. From my side, what I need is to focus on that," he responded when asked whether scoring centuries against an attack like Bangladesh was easier for him.

Was it luck that favoured him to make the hundred, Tendulkar smilingly said: "Every century I score, I can't go without having any luck on my side. It's part and parcel of the game. When I don't get that, you would also say the same thing." Tendulkar also informed that it was not an

easy task for them to score runs at a certain rate. What the batting maestro said could be a

good lesson for the Bangladesh batsmen, especially when they come out to bat in the second innings with a huge burden of India's first innings total.

"It's a two paced wicket. The bounce was also inconsistent. It's not an easy track to bat on. It has variable bounce. They [Bangladesh]

### Dravid sent to hospital

Rahul Dravid has been admitted to hospital with a suspected fractured jaw after being struck on the side of his face by a bouncer from Shahadat Hossain on the second day of the second and final Test against hosts Bangladesh on Monday.

Dravid has been kept in the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) of the Square Hospital in Dhaka under observation as a precautionary measure. "He is comparatively better

than before," Fazlul Haq, the attending doctor in the hospital, told Cricinfo. "He will be here for a night and he is likely to be discharged tomorrow." Asked whether it was a

fracture, Haq said: "It's not exactly a fracture, more a sort of severe sprain. We are just keeping him here as a precau-However, Mostafa Kamal,

the BCB president, who visited the hosptial, said Dravid had sustained "light fractures".

"I just met Rahul, he is feeling fine and is having his meal," Kamal said. "My doctors have told me that there are couple of light fractures, nothing serious. He will be fine."

Kamal was quoted by Bangladesh TV channels as saying Dravid would be returning to India but he sought to clarify that statement. "I meant my doctors have told me he can go back tomorrow if he wants to. It's a decision for Rahul and the **SEE PAGE 18 COL 1** 

### Harbhajan warned

Indian off-spinner Harbhajan Singh has been officially reprimanded by the ICC match referee Andy Pycroft for kicking and damaging an advertising board after a misfield near the boundary during the first day

of the second Test in Mirpur. Harbhajan pleaded guilty to the Level 1 offence of the Code of Conduct which relates to "abuse of cricket equipment or clothing, ground equipment or fixtures and fittings". Since he didn't challenge the verdict, there was no

need for a hearing. "While giving my verdict, I took into account that Harbhajan admitted his mistake and apologised for his actions," Pycroft said. "I also accepted Harbhajan's explanation that he had kicked the advertising board in frustration. Professional cricketers try to give their best effort when they are on the field and whenever they don't live up to the standards they have set for themselves, they feel disappointed. However, venting their frustrations in this manner is unacceptable.

A dominant Roger Federer joined the Williams sisters in the Australian Open quarterfinals Monday while Li Na ensured China has two players in a Grand Slam last eight for the first time.

The world number one Swiss shattered the hopes of local fans by crushing Lleyton Hewitt 6-2, 6-3, 6-4 for his 15th consecutive win over the Australian 22nd seed.

It was an imperious display which set up the 15-time Grand Slam champion with an intruiging last eight showdown with the inform Nikolay Davydenko, who has won their last two meetings. The Russian sixth seed ensured he stayed

alive by coming through a marathon five-setter against Spanish ninth seed Fernando Verdasco, prevailing 6-2, 7-5, 4-6, 6-7 (5/7), 6-3. "He's beaten me the last two times but I'm hoping with the best of five sets play I can get
