About 5,000 men and women, some nursing infants, lined up under the hot sun in front of a school

building in the sprawling complex of makeshift huts and tin-roofed buildings that housed nearly 300,000 at its height last year.

"I'm very thirsty and tired and we've had little to eat, but I'm here to vote. I'm voting for a new government," Vijaya Letchchami, 60, told AFP after waiting for four hours to have her say at the ballot box.

She, like the vast majority of Tamils that AFP spoke to in the highly militarised Tamildominated north, said she was voting for Fonseka, who she saw as better for ethnic minorities.

An estimated 80,000 people remain in camps, which are strictly restricted for the media.

About 200,000 were freed at the end of last year under pressure from the United Nations, which described conditions in them as "appalling."

Rajapakse cast his ballot in his southern home constituency of Mulkirigala and told reporters he was confident of securing a second term.

"We must be ready to face the challenges of reaching new heights after this vote," said the 64-year-old, who called the election only four years into his six-year term to seize on the victory over the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE).

Opposition leader Ranil Wickremesinghe said after polling closed that it had been "by and large" peaceful despite some incidents in the north.

Day amid alert

India has stepped up security in all its state capitals and major cities as the country holds its 60th Republic Day celebrations.

At least 15,000 police and soldiers have been deployed in New Delhi to secure the 8km route of the main parade along with anti-aircraft guns, snipers and mobile hit squads, officials said.

"We are not taking any chances," Rajan Bhagat, a police spokesman, said as officials effectively sealed off the central site of the annual event in the city.

Security was also tightened at all major government telecommunications and power installations, with frequent patrols and body checks for employees.

Checkpoints were set up to search vehicles on access roads to the capital ahead of the celebration, which marks the date when independent India's constitution came into effect.

Lee Myung-bak, the South Korean president, in India on a four-day state visit, is attending the New Delhi parade.

The display is a showcase of the Indian military's latest hardware, acquired as part of a massive modernisation drive costing tens of billions of dollars.

Rail stations, power and communications hubs and other key landmarks across the country have been placed under increased security for the holiday, while naval and coast guard forces have also been placed on alert.

In the financial capital, Mumbai, some 42,000 police have been placed at key locations across the city. "There is no specific alert from intelligence agencies but

we are on high alert anyway," D Sivanandan, the Mumbai Police Commissioner, told Reuters.

Security concerns have even seen federal troops deployed at the Taj Mahal memorial in Agra, the city's police chief said.

The security crackdown comes after Indian authorities put airports across the country on high alert last week, following western intelligence tip-offs that al-Qaeda-linked fighters planned to hijack an aeroplane.

Pakistan ready to hold talks with Taliban Says Zardari

In a bid to make truce with the Taliban extremists, Pakistan President Asif Ali Zardari has announced that the government is willing to hold talks with those extremists who lay down arms and agree to reconcile.

Interacting with media persons during a joint press conference with his Turkey and Afghan counterparts, Abdullah Gul and Abdul Hamid Karzai, on the sidelines of the fourth trilateral summit, Zardari talked about Pakistan's '3-D' policy.

"Dialogue, development and deterrence were the three pillars of Pakistan's 3-D policy," Zardari said.

When asked that whether Islamabad would enter into a dialogue with the extremists, who have been striking in the raging 'war' against the militants would not resolve issues.

4 policemen killed at Afghan checkpoint

Suicide car bomber injures five Afghans

Gunmen killed four Afghan policemen in a predawn attack yesterday in southern Afghanistan, an official said.

The attack occurred about 2 am at a checkpoint near the Information and Cultural Affairs Ministry's directorate in Lashkar Gah, the capital of Helmand province, an area expected to be a major focus of fighting with the influx of 37,000 additional US and Nato forces.

Daoud Ahmadi, a spokesman for the provincial governor, said it's not clear who killed the officers. He said the policemen apparently had visitors and an investigation was under way into whether the attack was political or personal.

In a separate development, a suicide bomber in a car laden with explosives struck near a foreign military base in Kabul on Tuesday, injuring at least five Afghan civilians, an interior ministry spokesman told AFP.

"There was a suicide car bomb explosion

near Camp Phoenix. The target of the blast is not known yet. Five civilians have been injured so far," Zemarai Bashary said.

He was referring to a military base where US forces are based on the main road between Kabul and the eastern provinces. Meanwhile, Afghan security forces have

Karzai hits back at US envoy's criticism

Afghan President Hamid Karzai yesterday hit back at the US ambassador to Afghanistan, who reportedly described him as an inadequate partner, saying he would not kowtow to Washington.

"If partnership means submission to the American will, then, of course, it's not going to be the case," Karzai told reporters after a regional gathering in Istanbul.

"But if partnership means cooperation between two sovereign countries, one of course very poor and the other very rich,... then we are partners," he

Karzai highlighted the hardships his country faced in combatting Islamist insurgents, saying "Afghanistan is on the frontline of the war on terror" "massive casualties."
