Move to make Karnaphuli pollution-free

Department of Environment (DoE) has taken initiative to save the river Karnaphuli from pollution and keep it navigable.

To that end, DoE started issuing notice from Monday to 40 industrial units and establishments on both the banks of the river that are apparently polluting and creating barriers to its navigability. The department asked them to submit their documents in support of their ownership.

The DoE identified the units during a recent survey to measure pollution in the river water and ensure environmental clearance by the industrial units.

The authorities served notices last year to over 300 industries which are contributing to the river pollution to a great extent at Sagarika, EPZ, Kalurghat, Roufabad, Aturer Depot, Bayezid Bostami, Chaktai, Khatunganj and Sadarghat in the port city, sources said.

The recent survey also revealed serious pollution in the river water due to the industrial wastage and sewerage that find their ways to the river through eight canals every-

The canals included Noakhali Khal (canal), Chaktai Khal, Majhirghat Khal, Gupta Khal, Mohesh Khal, Sundari Khal, Shikalbaha Khal and Ferry Ghat Khal.

The quantity of dissolved oxygen (DO) was found minimum 0.1 milligram per litre (mg/l) against the standard level of 4.5 to 8.5 mg/l while chloride highest 4010 mg/l against the standard level of 150 to 600 mg/l, suspended solid (SS) highest 243 mg/l against the standard level of 100 mg/l, chemical oxygen demand (COD) 1544 against standard level of 200mg/l and coliform up to 500 n/100ml.

DoE Senior Chemist Mustafizur Rahman Akhand told The Daily Star that the level of DO and SS at the mouth of the canals fluctuated very much that has been threatening lives of aquatic animals and plants to a great extent.

He blamed the untreated wastage of industrial units alongside the river and the canals carrying the wastage from inside the city for the highest level of the COD.

He emphasised the need for immediate disconnection of drains that carry wastages from the industrial units and residential areas of the city of over 40 lakh people.

Prof Manjurul Kibria of Chittagong University Zoology Department in one of his surveys found that of the 66 species of fresh water fishes, around 20 to 25 species and of 59 species of saline water fishes, 10 species already disappeared from the river due to pollution.

"This is the high time to save the river by hook or by crook and if the pollution cannot be stopped, not only fishes, all types of aquatic animals and plant will be disappeared from it," Prof Kibria said.

DoE Director Abdus Sobhan told The Daily Star on Sunday that they carried out the survey to identify the structures that are creating barrier to the navigability of the river and improve quality of the river water.

"The level of the coliform in the water indicates how much human excreta finds their ways to the river through the canals and help the people contacting water-borne diseases like jaundice and typhoid," he said.

He said the industrial units will get time to take environmental clearance and stern action will be taken against the violators.

Ctg Customs House limps along

Lack of manpower hampers activities, create scope for corruption

Shortage of human resources hampers activities at Chittagong Customs House alongside creating scope for part-timers to work there.

Working on "no work, no pay" basis at important sections, the part-timers, known as Tonni, stand as a barrier to maintaining official secrecy, said the

The customs house is running with the workforce less than what was approved for it back in 1982 though its activities increased by several times by now, sources said.

With no recruitment taking place since early nineties Customs House, Chittagong is now left with a total of 668 officials and employees against 792 authorised posts (as per organogram of 1982).

At present there are some 32 first class officers against 41 approved posts and 95 third class staffs against 135 posts.

There is only one official sweeper for 40 toilets and only two official security guards to take care of the whole of the three-storey Chittagong Customs House building.

In absence of recruitment, some 285 officials and employees had been working in the same place over the last ten years.

The manpower shortage forced the authorities to allow some 50 parttimers known as "Tonni" to work against different vacant posts at both import and export divisions of Chittagong Customs House for a daily payment of Tk 80 each.

Tonnis are working as assistants, computer operators and peons for a long period ranging from 10 to 15 years. They also assist newly posted principal appraisers (PA), appraisers and inspectors at the customs house working on deputation from value added tax (VAT) and other offices under National Board of Revenue (NBR).

"Recently 14 office assistants and senior assistants have been promoted to the posts of appraisers. In absence of recruitments these 14 posts are lying vacant and are being manned by the Tonnis," said a customs official preferring anonymity.

Thus being engaged in confidential Shamsul Islam said lack of manpower and important works like assessment of goods, Tonnies some times get involved in corruption and irregulari- However, anyone involved in corrupties, he alleged.

An official at Audit Inspection and Research (AIR) branch said three Tonnies were caught red-handed while trying to release imported printing paper worth Tk 20 lakh by forging sig-

natures of principal appraiser and appraiser on January 14.

While talking to this correspondent on Tuesday one of such Tonnis identified as Sheikh Abul Hasan said he has been working at Group 4 of Chittagong customs house from 2000.

"Having crossed the age limit of government job far ago I am now left with no other option other than the hope for getting permanent in my job here," said Hasan.

The customs officials while talking to this correspondent said seven Tonnis at customs assessment desk have been sacked for their involvement in corruption and irregularities.

They said regularising the service of Tonnies or training for the officers coming on deputation can prevent appointment of Tonnis in important works and check corruption.

Deputy Commissioner (Preventive) forced the Chittagong customs house authorities to engage the part-timers. tion is getting punishment.Joint Commissioner (Import) Md Moazzem Hossain also echoing the same said the authorities have been making proposals for recruitments to overcome the manpower shortage from time to time.
