## Remembering a cultural icon

Chhayanaut's homage to Waheedul Haque

Chhayanaut paid tribute to the cultural icon Waheedul Haque on January 27. Marking third death anniversary of the renowned Tagore exponent and founder member of the organisation, a daylong event was held at the auditorium of Chhayanaut Shangskriti Bhaban.

Waheedul Haque was born on March 16, 1933 at Bhawal Mohonhariya village in Keraniganj, Dhaka. He was one of the initiators and organisers of the Tagore birth centennial celebration in 1961. The same year he founded Chhayanaut, now one of the leading Bangladeshi cultural organisations. He was also a founder member of other renowned cultural organisations including Rabindra Sangeet Sammilan Parishad,

Kanthosheelan, Anandadhoni and more. His belief in an educational system, which values cultural practices, is reflected in Nalanda School (an educational institute for children). A noted writer, researcher, organiser and columnist, Waheedul Haque's books include "Gaan-er Bhetor Diye", "Chetona Dharaye Esho" and "Shangskriti Jagoron-er Prothom Shurjo".

Haque passed away on January 27, 2007. Artistes of Chhayanat and renowned

cultural personalities placed wreaths at the portrait of Haque at 7am on the day. Highlight was a cultural programme in the evening, featuring teachers and students of Chhayanaut and guest artistes. The programme began with a choral rendition of the Tagore song "Bajao Tumi Kobi".

A trustee of the Liberation War Museum, Mofidul Haque delivered the welcome speech. Noted music exponent Professor Karunamaya Goswami remi- Prem-e Dhonyo Koro" were two choral nisced on Haque.

"Holding the philosophies of Rabindranath Tagore in his heart, Waheedul Haque ceaselessly worked in disseminating epistemological, literary and cultural elements amongst the people of Bangladesh. I believe, in the days ahead, Dhaka is going to be a true cultural capital of Bangladesh and Chhayanaut will be a cultural hub where Rabindranath, Nazrul and above all Bengali culture will be impassionedly practised. Undoubtedly, Waheedul Haque was a successful cultivator in preparing the cultural field of

Bangladesh," said Professor Goswami. He also recalled the veteran cultural activist and another founding member of Chhayanaut, Shamsunnahar (Rose),

who passed away on January 27, a year

after Waheedul Haque's demise.

The evening also included renditions of Tagore, Nazrul and folk songs by artistes of Chhayanat. With a Tagore song "Achhey Dukkho Achhey Mrityu", Sharmila Bandopadhyay, Sudeshna Swayamprabha, Mohona Das, Shatabdi Das and Anindita Saha presented a dance performance at the event.

"Srabon-er Dharar Moto" and "Tomar performances, while Laisa Ahmed Lisa, Shumon Chowdhury, Nasima Shaheen, Iffat Ara Dewan, Elora Ahmed Shukla and Bulbul Islam performed "Dao Hey Hridoy Bhorey", "Boro Bedonar Moto", "Akashey Bhorer Tara", "Aaro Aaro Probhu", "Tomarey Jani Ney Hey" and "Shudhu Tomar Bani Noy Go" respectively. Other singers performing at the programme were Mita Haque, Aditi Mohsin, Chandana Majumdar, Biman Chandra Biswas, Tania Mannan and Ashim Dutt. Samina Hossain Prema performed a dance with the song "Dhaye Jeno Mor Shokol Bhalobasha".

Enamul Haque Omar on tabla, Ashit Biswas on esraj and Pradip Kumar Roy on mandira assisted the vocalists.

The programme ended with a rendition of the National Anthem.

## Razzle-dazzle of Bangladeshi dance at the SA Game

In conversation with Nipa and Munmun

Renowned classical dancers Shamim Ara Nipa, Shibli Muhammad and Munmun Ahmed will be performing this year at the inaugural (today) and closing programmes of SA Games. The Daily Star talked to Nipa and Munmun about their choreography and the upcoming programmes at the game.

Shamim Ara Nipa: About 300 dancers will be participating in two 30-minute dances, at the opening and closing programmes. It's a remarkable experience for us, as we are performing for the first time at this prestigious event.

We will represent Bangladesh at the opening session. The focal point will be the Liberation War. Nature is an integral part of our lives and dance is a reflection of it, so the composition will also highlight nature. There will be the much-popular "Peacock Dance" as well. There will be a segment on our rural life too.

At the closing performance, we will be dancing to the Rabindra Sangeet "Momo Chittey", and then there will be a Kathak piece called "Tara". The third segment is called "Angel" and at the end, there will be a dance to the lively song "Kolo Kolo Chholo Chholo" that will depict a traditional boat race.

This would be an interesting experience as it combines projection with live performance; it would seem like the dancers are in water. And then we come on stage. The technical support will be provided by a Singaporean company. Choreography and concept are by Shibli and me.

Munmun Ahmed: SA Games would be seeing a total of 900 dancers performing my choreography, and we are really excited about it! We will be doing a dance drama based on the Ila Mitra-led movement, 'Tebhaga Andolan'. During the movement, the rebellious leader Mitra was captured by the authorities and tortured inhumanly. The script is by Syed Wahiduzzaman Diamond. Music direction is by Shujeo Shyam and Alauddin Ali. Dance direction and choreography are by me.

Out of the 900 participants, 600 are Santals from Nachol, and 300 from different schools and colleges. It's a 21-minute performance. In my opinion it is for the first time that such a large group is performing in our country. We put a lot of hard work behind it. I went to Nachol for 15 days, and came back on the 25th of this month. Our final rehearsal will be today. I hope it will be a great success.
