Vulnerable country



Bangladesh is highly vulnerable to earthquakes, because it is close to the meeting point of the Indian, Eurasian and Burma (Myanmar) plates. The observatory at Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (BUET) recorded 86 tremors of over four magnitude during January 2006-May 2009. The meteorological department detected at least 90 earthquakes taking place in the country between May 2007 and July 2008, nine of them above five on the Richter Scale and epicentres of 95 percent being within a 600 km radius of Dhaka city. Experts say it is these minor tremors that indicate the possibility of much more powerful earthquakes hitting the country.

The government needs to formulate effective plans and programmes for disaster preparedness in the event of an earthquake. To make a start in formulating effective plans for earthquake preparedness and damage control, building designs, particularly that of highrise buildings, must be earthquakeproof. The Building Code must be revised to ensure adequate protective measures for the builders of faulty buildings that can be severely damaged by earthquakes. Also highways and bridges must be adequately reinforced. Warnings of earthquakes need sophisti-

cated equipment which have to be procured and installed in meteorological stations.

To ensure adequate damage control, we need to learn from the experience of the countries prone to regular earthquake, such as Japan and Indonesia. Md. Nazmus Sakib

According to a UN study conducted in 1999, Dhaka is the world's most earthquake vulnerable city followed by Tehran. Dhaka has gone 130 years without a major quake. The Comprehensive Disaster Management Programme (CDMP) found that around 25,0000 buildings in the three major cities of Bangladesh---Dhaka, Chittagong, Sylhet -are extremely vulnerable to earthquake.

On a preparedness scale of 1 to 10, we are close to the bottom. So, we have to take proper steps in this respect.

Hospital explosion The AFP report on the explo-

sion in a Ukrainian hospital published on January 19 in a local English daily is a serious matter. All our clinics and hospitals should take note of this accident, and review their safety measures as they are one of the largest users of oxygen all over Bangladesh. The explosion of oxygen

canisters and not high pressure oxygen cylinders as reported, must have been due to two primary reasons. One, there was something flammable that contaminated the oxygen. It could be leaking natural gas or methane, or oil or some inflammable liquid and a source of fire. That could be an electric spark or careless use of a lighter or cigarette or any such source. Oxygen by itself does not

ignite an explosion, it needs a combustible material and a spark or flame; to cause such a havoc particularly in the (ICU) intensive care unit of a hospital! The matter as reported only reflects the poor standard of housekeeping and safety precautions being taken in that hospital, as such explosions are rare. There is more possibility of such accidents in an industrial work place involving gas cutting and welding operation where both oxygen and the highly combustible acetylene gases are normally used.

For such an explosion and fire to happen in a hospital and an ICU for that matter is beyond comprehension! Something must have been seriously ignored at the hospital by the management, beyond the normal levels of

neglect, that one may come across. The explosion, fire and the destruction of the hospital building, is a matter that needs to be thoroughly investigated and reported so that

such accidents can never

GM foods

Common food buyers even in our country search for 'deshi' (country) chicken, vegetables, fishes, fruits, etcetera when they go to the market. In other words, they are not interested to buy Genetically Modified (GM) foods, that is, they want to purchase foods which do not contain genetic materials but with original or natural gene-DNA set up.

Meanwhile, people all over the world have raised a question whether GMO (Genetically Modified Organism) or GM foods are safe and suitable for humans? By inserting genes from another species into a food's DNA, GM foods are being made which often contain virus and bacteria

used to produce genetically modified foods.

In fact, only a few researches have been conducted to determine the actual effects of GM foods on living organisms. Some tests on rats with GM foods had shown negative effect on rats. It was found that rats fed with genetically modified foods had developed liver, kidney, spleen, heart, and adrenal gland problems. It is feared that intake of GM foods may lower the strength of our natural immune system. The genetically modified food may contribute to the development of new diseases plus

cancer! In agriculture, GM technology has introduced a new era. The GMOs ensure higher yield, need less pesticides due to insect and pest resistant property of GMOs, and can adjust with climatic fluctuations, etcetera.

In my view, the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) and the World Health Organization (WHO) of the United Nations should form an international research team comprising agricultural scientists, medical specialists, nutritionists, and other related professionals to conduct both field and laboratory oriented research to ascertain the real impact/effect of genetically modified foods on humans plus environment.
