Medical team off to Haiti

UNB, Dhaka

A 30-member medical support team left here on Friday for Haiti to provide medical assistance to the earthquakeaffected people of Haiti under the mission named 'Operation Caribbean Hope,' said an ISPR release yesterday.

The team, led by Colonel MHM Delwar Hossain, comprises of 17 members from Army Medical Corps, three members from Army Signal Corps and 10 civilian medical personnel.

The team carried necessary medical equipment and medicines provided by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare and Directorate General of Medical Services.

The team will stay Port-au-Prince for one month. Duration of stay may be extended if necessary.

'Criminal' killed in 'shootout'

A criminal was killed in a "shootout" between his cohorts and law enforcers early hours yesterday at Dakshin Rangamatia village in Fatikchhari upazila of Chittagong. The dead, identified as

Osman Goni, 42, was the leader of a local gang, Osman Bahini. Acting on a tip-off, a joint

team of police and Rapid Action Battalion raided Rangamatia village around 3:30am while Osman with his gang members was making preparation for committing a robbery, police sources said.

Kitchens to get prepaid meters

Gas crisis leads Titas to ask industries for replacing old boilers, furnace for energy efficiency

The Titas Gas company has started working on introducing prepaid meters for all consumers on an urgent basis to stop wastage, increase efficient use of natural gas and end the default billing culture.

Besides, the company has started asking industries using gas-fired old boilers and furnace to either replace them with more energyefficient boilers and furnaces or switch to alternative fuel within six months.

The energy ministry had earlier asked Titas Gas Transmission and Distribution Company

Ltd (TGTDCL) to take up these measures to ensure better use of gas. The ministry was prompted to do so in the wake of acute gas crisis this winter.

A top Titas source says on January 12, the energy ministry in a letter asked Titas to urgently prepare a project to introduce prepaid meters for all kinds of consumers to stop wastage and improve gas supply pressure.

Titas is now setting up a technical committee that will analyse the cost benefits of introducing prepaid meters and submit a report within a short time.

In eyes of Gen Shafiullah PM vows to bring

In this exclusive interview with The Daily Star, Maj Gen (retd) KM Shafiullah, Bir Uttam, who was the army chief when Bangabandhu was killed on August 15, 1975, tells Inam Ahmed and Julfikar Ali Manik what was happening in the army before and after the killings.

The artillery and armoured divisions of Bangladesh Army were into regular night training twice a month. Thursdays and Fridays were chosen for the training and incidentally the August 15 night fell between these two days.

"One big problem [at that time] was that the army did not have any organised intelligence wing," Shafiullah says. The usual norm is that the army intelligence wing is developed along with the force. The Directorate of Forces Intelligence that was raised with the army was supposed to report directly to the chiefs of the three forces. But in 1974, the DFI was suddenly placed under the president's secretariat. This

Directs AL grassroots to protect environment

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the six fugitive killers of father of the nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman will be brought back home and executed.

"Wherever the killers are, they will be brought back and executed. The world is small, where will they escape to?" said the premier at Gano Bhaban where the ruling Awami League's extended meeting was held after 20 months.

Hasina, also the AL president, directed her party's grassroots leaders to pay sincere attention to protect the country's environment, plant trees and stop cutting trees from the green places. She warned that no deviation would be tolerated in this regard.

This was the first directive of the premier regarding environment protection at any party level meeting. Around 10,000 grassroots leaders of the AL from across the country took part in the meeting.

She also directed them to remain cautious against the "propaganda" and "falsehood" by the opposition, make people aware of it and let them know the right information. Besides, she asked them to strengthen the party at all levels, recruit new party members examining their ideologies and beliefs, and watch out for the opportunists.

"I need the party to fulfil our electoral pledges. Only the organisation can keep holding the people's confidence in the government.



5 killed in Comilla road crash

Five people were killed and 25 others injured in a head-on collision between a bus and a truck at Amjader Bazar on Dhaka-Chittagong Highway in Chouddagram upazila yesterday.

Two of the deceased were identified as bus driver Saiful Alam and its supervisor Nurunnabi.

The identities of three others, including the truck driver, could not be known immediately.

Quoting witnesses police said a Dhaka-bound bus of Star Line collided head-on with a truck at about 6:00am, killing five people on the

Climate change to hit public health hard

Children to be worst affected; skin cancer, eye diseases to be most concern

Climate change will have an adverse effect on public health -- particularly that of children -- agriculture and environment, health experts said yesterday.

They were speaking at a roundtable discussion titled "Climate change: The biggest health threat coming our way" jointly organised by The Daily Star and Health 21 at the conference room of the health risks. English daily.

Prof Pran Gopal Dutta, vice chancellor of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University, said, "If temperature goes up from 5 to 8 degrees Celsius, children will

be affected the most and 10 percent of them will not be able to celebrate their fifth birth day." Prof Md Lutfar Rahman of Ahsania

Mission Cancer Hospital said, "About 10 crore people will be affected by skin cancer and 4.5 crore by eye diseases by 2075 due to the impacts of climate change." He underlined the necessity for proper

health management in addressing the The speakers stressed the need for an

integrated inter-ministerial policy framework to tackle possible health hazards caused by climate change in a concerted manner with participation of private

sector players.

Direct impacts of climate change on health include malnutrition, waterborne diseases like diarrhoea, cholera, skin and eye diseases due to floods, and cardiovascular diseases following rise in temperature, Sardar Arif Uddin of Action Aid said in a keynote presentation.

Root causes of the health hazards will be food insecurity, water crisis or pollution, air pollution, decline in agricultural production and rise in temperature, he said.

Sardar Arif Uddin called for revision of climate change strategies in the national health policy.
