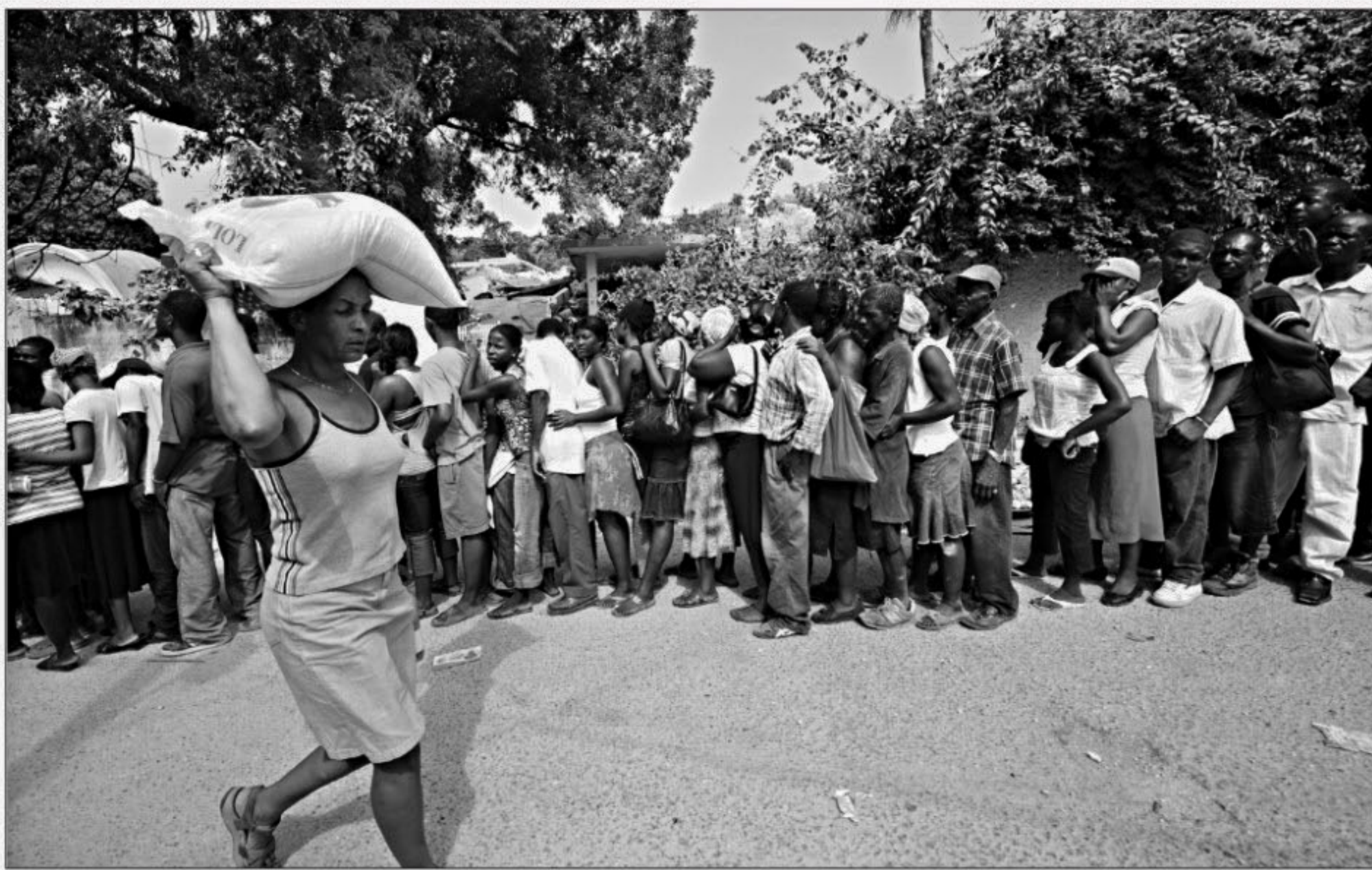


Haiti detains 10 Americans taking kids across border

A group of 10 American Baptists were being held in the Haitian capital yesterday after trying to take 33 children out of Haiti.

Americans the first known to be taken into custody since the January 12 quake put themselves in the middle of a firestorm in Haiti, where government leaders have suspended adoptions amid fears that parentless or lost children are more vulnerable than ever to child trafficking.

US, China escalating row over Taiwan arms sale

Washington rebuffs protests

China and the United States were locked Sunday in an escalating row over US arms sales to Taiwan, with Washington rebuffing Chinese protests and insisting the deal promotes stability in the Taiwan Strait.

Beijing warned of "severe harm" to relations. The Pentagon expressed "regret" for the bitter response, which reflected a rapid souring of relations with the United States amid strains over trade, climate change and China's Internet controls.

UN slams Africa power-grabs as Gaddafi steps aside

UN chief Ban Ki-moon yesterday criticised power-grabs in Africa in a speech to the continent's leaders as Libya's Muammar Gaddafi reluctantly handed over the presidency of the African Union to Malawi.
