

Golden girls shoot to glory

Sharmin Akhter Ratna scripted history for Bangladesh in shooting when she won both the individual and team event gold in the women's 10m air rifle competitions of the 11th South Asian Games at the Gulshan Shooting Range

The expectation was that the three Bangladeshi young prospects Ratna, Syeda Sadia Sultana and Tripti Datta would do something special in the regional showpiece event, but what the trio has done in battle of nerve, accuracy and unbridled emotion was beyond anybody's guess. It was a day for Ratna, who transformed her years of training

from Magura shattered the Games record by scoring 499.4 out of 509. The previous best was India's Radhika Varalle's 498.1 in Colombo 2006. After scoring 398 in her first ten shots, Ratna went into the shoot-off as favourite and from there on she didn't look behind

to complete a magnificent double that no other shooter of the country has achieved before in any international meet. Sadia took the silver with an aggregate of 498.3 points, but Tripti, who score of 396 earned Bangladesh the team event gold,

missed the individual bronze by a whisker. India's Mampi Das with a total of 496.9 points, 0.1 more than Tripti, took the individual bronze in an exciting battle that kept everybody on the edge of their seats.

Mampi (394), Sruti Tushar Bhatepatil (391), Tejaswini Manojrao (390), won the silver in the team event while Nazis Khan (386), Nosheen Maqsood Ali (382) and Naheda Naqvi (379) took the bronze for Pakistan.

Ratna is very popular for her carefree approach and there was no shortage of confidence when she was talking with the reporters after her dazzling effort, which helped the hosts to make a bright start in the shooting event on the opening day.

"I always love to dream something big. I achieved my best score today and so far it's best achievement in my career also and I think self-confidence was the key behind my success apart from my coach's contributions. Now my target is to hunt gold in a bigger international stage like Olympics," said a delighted Ratna, whose efforts stunned everybody after the way she improved her previous best.

"India had the favourites tag but we had the confidence and it was just a matter for us to prove ourselves in the field. And we did exactly that today. That's it," said Ratna referring to their brilliant team effort, which almost outclassed their Indian challengers.

"Magura is known to people because of Shakib (Al Hasan) but from now on it will be known because of me also," said the smiling Ratna.

The battle of two Bangladeshi shooters Ratna and Sadia was the most exciting part in the day's event as the latter pushed the champion shooter hard but finally lost as Ratna bounced back SEE PAGE 18 COL 2

Bangladesh suffered an 18-run defeat to Sri Lanka in their second encounter of the 11th SA Games Cricket at the Shaheed Kamruzzaman Stadium here yesterday.

In front of a 20,000-strong crowd, Bangladesh were set to chase a target of 166 runs, but the toporder failed to fire except Anamul Haque who contributed team highest 42 off 40 balls that included only two fours and a six.

Sri Lanka recorded their consecutive second victory when Bangladesh were bundled out for 147 runs with one ball to spare.

Rony Talukdar made a bright start to electrify the home crowd as the right-hander began with a sweetly timed boundary followed by a six in first three balls but Lankan pacer Thisara Perera removed the opener quickly to make the inroads.

Thereon Bangladesh lost wickets at regular intervals. Nasir Hossain made the second team highest 28 off 21 balls that contained five

Mahmud lifts bronze

After the golden day on Monday, Bangladesh weightlifter Firoz Mahmud had to be content with a bronze medal in the weightlifting event of the 11th South Asian Games at the National Sports Council Gymnasium yesterday.

Mahmud won the bronze in the above 105kg category lifting a total of 264 kg, 34kg less than Sri Lankan silver medalist S Rapaaska. India's S Sandeep won the gold lifting a total of 345kg.

India also bagged the gold medal in the below 105kg category after Rao Srinivasa of India and Pakistan's Sajjad Amin Mallik were tied lifting equal weights of 327 kg.

The Indian lifter was declared winner because of his less body weight than his Pakistani counterpart.

Chandarat Thusitha of Sri Lanka won the bronze lifting a total of 279 kg. Bangladesh's Biddut Kumar

finished behind Thusitha. In a bid to overcome the Sri Lankan competitor, Biddut, who won bronze medal in the Colombo SA Games in 2006,

attempted to lift 159kg in his
