Asif's golden return

Asif Hossain Khan made a triumphant return to competitive shooting when he led Bangladesh from the front to

win the men's 10m air rifle team event gold of the 11th South Asian Games at the National Shooting Range in Gulshan

And it could have been a delightful double for the ace shooter hot on the heels of Sharmin Akhter Ratna's poem of a success in the women's 10m air rifle on Tuesday had he not lost his concentration completely while firing his penultimate shot. Asif's penultimate shot in the shoot-off

fetched him a career low 6.8 points that also cost him and the country a gold in the individual event. As a result, he had to be content with the silver, but his spectacular return after a career-threatening brutal beating by police in 2006 at this very place reminded everybody that class is permanent.

After the heroics of the woman shooters the previous day, when Bangladesh won both the

team event and individual gold, the spotlight was on the celebrated shooter, Asif, and he delighted everybody on way to winning the team event gold in company with two young prospects -- Abdulla-Hel-Baki and Shovon Chowdhury.

However one dramatic fall out in the ninth shot of the exciting shoot-off saw India's Imran Hasan Khan turned the table on him to clinch the individual gold. Despite the late slip Asif was understandably happy because it gave him a new lease of life after that shameful incident that almost threw the Commonwealth Games gold medalist into oblivion.

"At first my apologises to my countrymen because I deprived them from a sure gold. For a fraction of a second I lost my concentration and it cost me dearly. But I am still happy with today's outcome because it's like I make a new start in my career," said a delighted Asif, who had been struggling to regain his form over the last two years. Asif even had to fight hard in trials to get the ticket as the last shooter to participate in the biggest regional sporting extravaganza.

Bangladesh emerged Group B champions in handball of the 11th South Asian Games with an emphatic 48-18 win over Afghanistan at the newly-built Handball Stadium adjacent to Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday to set up a semifinal clash against India.

Fresh from a 40-18 win over Nepal, Bangladesh put up another spirited show to send Afghanistan, who lost to Nepal 33-23 in their first game, packing. Afghanistan's second successive defeat meant Nepal qualified for the last four and play the semifinal against Pakistan, who emerged Group A champions with a hard-fought 33-31 win over India.

Both semifinals will be played today at the same venue. Bangladesh, who are hoping to clinch the gold medal in a discipline included in the regional extravaganza for the first time, didn't give any room to the opposition and controlled the game from the word go. The hosts dominated the first half 26-5 and finished it with an impressive margin of 48-18. Waliur Rahman was the most successful scorer with eight goals, Khairuzzaman and Rasel Chakma scored seven goal each while Saiduzzaman found the back of Afghanistan net six times.

at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday. With three victories in their three matches, Bangladesh will play their semifinal against group B runners up India on Friday. Maldives will face group B champions Afghanistan on the same day.

Both teams having already confirmed their semifinal place, gave their senior and more experienced players a welcome break and fielded a youthful and relatively inexperienced sides. Bangladesh rested seven players from their last game including skipper Aminul Haque and striking duo Enamul Haque and

Zahid Hassan Ameli. Maldives too rested some of their key players including Ashfaq Ali, Nasser Mukhtar and Umair Mohammad.

Zahid Hossain who missed the SAFF Championship in December due to injury was included in the side for the first time in the competition. The young winger grabbed the opportunity with both hands and produced a moment of brilliance to make the difference in the game. Just before the breather, receiving the ball from the midfield he danced past two defenders towards the box from the left, shimmied past another before releasing a cheeky chip over the keeper's head on the far post. It was a moment to behold as the crowd leapt to their feet in adulation of being witness to some magic. An ecstatic Zahid Hossain was overwhelmed

Bangladesh bagged bronze medal in the mixed doubles event of badminton in the 11th South Asian Games despite having lost to their semifinal clash against the Indian counterparts at the newly-built Wooden Floor Stadium yesterday.

It, however, became an all-Indian final in the mixed doubles, the men's doubles and singles, women's doubles and singles. India had earlier bagged both gold medals in the men's and women's team events.

Bangladesh pair Shapla Akter and Rasel Kabir suffered a 21-14 and 21-6 defeat to Indian Ashwini Ponnappa and Diju Viliyaveetil, who will play the mixed doubles final against compatriots Aparna Balan and Sanave Thomas. The Aparna-Thomas pair beat Sri Lankan duo of Renu C Hettiarachchinge and Niluka Karunaratne 21-14 and 21-13.

Pakistan blow Nepal away

Pakistan toyed with Nepal to secure a massive 91-run victory in the 11th South Asian Games cricket at the Sher-e-Bangla National Cricket Stadium in Mirpur yesterday.

A superb top-order batting enabled Pakistan to score 173 runs for two wickets in their share of 20 overs after deciding to bat. And Umar Amin and Ali Waqas gave them a flying start as they put the Nepal bowlers to the

sword during their 75-run association in 7.5 overs. Umar top scored with 53 off 32 balls that featured four boundaries and two sixes while Ali added 27 off 25 deliveries with the help of four fours.

Both the batsmen returned to pavilion in quick succession only to handover the batons to Ali Asad, who smashed three fours and a six in a 33-ball 45 and Adil Amin who remained not out on 35 off 20 balls that contained four boundaries.

In reply, Nepal batted without any purpose and finished their 20-over quota for 82 runs.

Nayyar Abbas and Kamran Hussain claimed two wickets each. In the today's match, Bangladesh play Maldives at the Shere-Bangla National Stadium at 9:30am while Sri Lanka meet Pakistan at the same venue at 1:30pm.
