## Court frames charges against Gayeswar

A Dhaka court yesterday framed charges against BNP standing committee member Gayeswar Chandra Roy in a case for amassing wealth illegally and concealing wealth information from the Anti-

Corruption Commission. Judge Mozammel Hossain of the Special Judge's Court-3 passed the order rejecting a discharge petition submitted

by the BNP leader. The court also fixed March 18 for trial of the case and summoned complainant and witnesses to appear before the court on the day.

Gayeswar pleaded not guilty and demanded justice after the charges were read out to him.

The ACC filed the case with Ramna Police Station on January 5 last year on charges of amassing Tk 2.61 crore and concealing information of his wealth worth Tk 25.95 lakh in his wealth statement.

On August 3 last year, the court issued an arrest warrant against the BNP leader following a report submitted by the investigation officer of the case.

WORLD CANCER DAY OBSERVED

## '40pc cancers can be prevented'

The World Cancer Day was observed in the country as elsewhere across the globe yesterday with the theme 'Cancer can be prevented too'.

According to the World Health Organisation, 40 percent of cancer cases can be prevented through changing lifestyles and diet, and 90 percent of lung cancer cases can be prevented by avoiding tobacco.

Experts said this at a discussion organised by Ahsania Mission Cancer and General Hospital at the office of Dhaka Ahsania Mission.

They also stressed the need to perform self-examination of breast to prevent breast cancer and stop early marriage to prevent cervical cancer. The experts also said that early diagno-

sis could save lives of a huge number of cancer patients.

State Minister for Health Mojibur Rahman Fakir attended the discussion as the chief guest.

Brig Gen Dr Syed Fazle Rahim, Dr Mohammad Lutfor Rahman, Prof Dr Syed Akram Hussain, Prof MR Khan, Prof ABMF Karim and Kazi Rafiqul Alam spoke at the discussion.

Bangladesh Cancer Society and Bangladesh Cancer Hospital and Welfare Home jointly took out a procession from in front of the National Museum at Shahbag in the morning on the occasion.

A 'Tomtom' procession was also held in the city. Another discussion was held at Geneva

most common cause of death in the world, but simple lifestyle techniques can save huge lives. They stressed the need to eat fresh

Dhaka Zoo beefs up biosecurity

Biosecurity measures on Dhaka Zoo have been strengthened in the wake of fresh outbreak of bird flu.

The zoo authorities beefed up the biosecurity measures, as bird flu broke out at the government's central poultry

Dhaka Zoo Curator Dr Mosaddek Hossain told The Daily Star that disinfec-

tant has been being sprayed on the bird sheds thrice a day.

Cautionary signs have been put up near the bird sheds and that the fences would be shifted farther from the bird cages today to keep the visitors at a safe

distance from birds, he added. "However, the birds in cages are less vulnerable to H5N1 virus, known as bird flu. It mostly infects the poultry birds in

farms," Dr Mosaddek said.

"We have placed disinfectant foot baths at the entry and exit points of the zoo so that the virus cannot spread and the visitors can remain safe," he added.

Bird flu struck the central poultry farm recently and more than 800 fowls were culled on Tuesday evening, officials of the Directorate General of Livestock said yesterday.

Earlier this year, bird flu attacked three poultry farms in Joypurhat and Sirajganj.
