Australia-Windies first ODI today

West Indies kicked off Australia's home summer and now they're back to finish it off with five ODIs and two Twenty20s after the Australians completed a tri-format clean-sweep of Pakistan.

Chris Gayle's men showed more consistent fight in the Test series than did Mohammad Yousuf's team and they have started their return leg of the Australian tour well, by posting a remarkable 5 for 399 - of which Gayle made 146 -

in 45 overs against the Prime Minister's XI. The two batting stars are Gayle and Kieron Pollard, who thrilled Australian crowds during the Big Bash last month, but the loss of Dwayne Bravo due to a broken thumb is a big blow to a team already missing Ramnaresh Sarwan and Shivnarine Chanderpaul. It is a while since this outfit has played 50-over cricket, though. The player-board crisis meant a second-string team was sent to the Champions Trophy having also lost at home to Bangladesh and Gayle hasn't led a full-strength ODI team since early July.

For Australia, the challenge is to attempt to maintain the superb winning run they have enjoyed in the 50-over format over the past few months. Since the start of the post-Ashes onedayers in the United Kingdom, Australia have

won a remarkable 20 of 24 ODIs, with a deadrubber loss to England and two defeats at the hands of India their only blemishes. Chris Gayle proved during the Test series that he enjoys batting in Australia and he was the

Player of the Series having made contrasting

hundreds in Adelaide and Perth. The one-day

format suits Gayle even better and 146 from 89 balls against the Prime Minister's XI was a handy warm-up. He hasn't made an ODI century against Australia but given the form he's in, this is the perfect opportunity. "I'm looking forward to it," Gayle said. "I think over here in Australia it actually suits my batting. The wickets here have a bit more pace and a bit more bounce. I like the ball coming on to the bat."

It will be interesting to see whether Ryan Harris can continue his remarkable form against a new opponent. Harris burst on to the scene with back-to-back five-fours against Pakistan and was so impressive that he was named Player of the Series despite not playing the first two matches. His bustling style of fast bowling will suit the MCG pitch if it's as quick as during Friday's Twenty20, but containing Gayle is a different task to restricting the Pakistan openers.

Australia's selectors face a decision over which in-form fast bowler to leave out. Doug Bollinger is back in the squad after resting for the final two ODIs against Pakistan, while Harris, Clint McKay and Mitchell Johnson are all in good form. The rest of the side basically picks itself, with James Hopes likely to be squeezed out once again.

Since Clint McKay's debut in November no Australian has taken more than his 17 ODI wickets, Ryan Harris has played four onedayers and already has a Player-of-the-Series title, performance in his first game Doug Bollinger continues to India Nanal make himself a star and Shane Watson's bowling has improved dramatically.

"I think the depth that we've hattrick while skipper Jamuna got now as far as our fast-Brett Lee (elbow) hasn't bowling goes is outstanding," Ponting said ahead of the first ODI against West Indies. "It would have to be the best group of fast bowlers anywhere in the world right at the moment. We were most stretched in India in the oneday series we had over there a

Kallis, Amla lead SA

Jacques Kallis and Hashim Amla slammed unbeaten centuries to help South Africa seize the momentum on the opening day of the first Test against India on Saturday.

Kallis scored 159 and Amla made 115 as the tourists recovered from a shaky 6-2 to reach 291-2 at close after electing to bat at the Vidarbha Cricket Association Stadium in Nagpur.

The duo shared 285 runs for the unbroken third wicket to post South Africa's highest partnership against India for anywicket.

Kallis has so far hit 13 fours and two sixes in his 290-ball knock while Amla also opened up to play some fine shots after a sedate start to his 225-ball innings.

"Kallis and Amla batted really well," said Indian captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni. "But our bowlers also did a decent job as the wicket was rather slow. They were a bit unlucky as the ball missed the edge on quite a few occasions.

"We had to go for a semidefensive field as there was not much help for spinners. There was a bit of turn but it was not a rankturner."

Amla reached his eighth Test century in style, hitting part-time spinner Virender Sehwag for a four to the squareleg boundary.

Kallis completed his 34th Test ton to join India's Sunil Gavaskar and West Indian Brian Lara in third place on the all-time list of top century getters.

India's Sachin Tendulkar heads the list with 45 centuries, followed by Australian skipper Ricky Ponting on 39. India's bowlers laboured

without luck after tasting success in the morning session when pace spearhead Zaheer Khan (2-67) sent back openers Ashwell Prince and Graeme Smith in a fiery opening spell. Prince was out for a duck, caught behind by Dhoni in the

fifth over when he failed to fend off a bouncer, although TV replays suggested the ball brushed past his arm guard rather than the gloves. The pacer struck again in his Rohit Sharma, called in as cover

next over to remove Smith (six) with a ball that moved through the gap between bat and pad,

cleaning up the stumps in spectacular fashion.

Kallis and Amla then steadied the innings, putting on 103 runs off 33 overs in the postlunch period and another 98 in the final session.

Kallis looked confident against the spinners, slogsweeping Harbhajan Singh twice for a huge six and a four in an over to race to his 53rd Test half-century off 75 balls.

"It was a very difficult start in the morning but we recovered fantastically," said South Africa's batting coach Kepler Wessels.

"It was an awesome performance by Kallis and Amla. Their shot selection was very good. You don't often see Harbhajan go through without a maiden. They had a very good game plan against Harbhajan and executed it perfectly." Injury-hit India, missing the

experienced trio of Rahul Dravid, Venkatsai Laxman and Yuvraj Singh, awarded Test caps to Subramaniam Badrinath and Wriddhiman Saha. Saha came in only because

for Laxman, hurt his left ankle duringwarm-up before the toss.

The second and final Test of

the series between the world's top two teams begins in Kolkata on February 14.

South Africa can snatch back the number one Test ranking from India if they win the series while the hosts need just a draw to remain on top.

Bangladesh's two finalists Ishrat Zahan Eva came fifth with a timing of 25.64 sec while Nazmun Nahar Beauty came seventh at 26.20 sec. This event was a token participation for Beauty, the country's fastest female sprinter, and she was included in the event only at the eleventh hour despite being not totally fit.

The men's 200m sprint gold was grabbed by India's Abdul Najeeb Qureshi (21.16 sec) beating Shehan Saearuwan Abeypitiyage of Sri Lanka (21.19 sec) and Liaqat Ali o Pakistan (21.27 sec). There was frustration for hosts as Khalilur Rahman pulled a hamstring before the final while the other participant Mizanur Rahman failed to make it to the final.

Akmal vows to improve

Kamran Akmal, the Pakistan wicketkeeper, has said he is keen to move on and improve as a wicketkeeper following a tough tour of Australia, where he came under great scrutiny. He said it was normal for all players to go through a bad patch once in a while and that the important thing was to learn from each experience. The nadir for Akmal was the second Test at

the SCG, dropping Michael Hussey three times off Danish Kaneria on the third day after missing a run-out chance. He also dropped Peter Siddle off Mohammad Sami on the fourth morning. Hussey went on to score an unbeaten 134 and helped stretched Australia's lead from 80 - at the end of the third day - to 175. Pakistan were the favourites to win on the fourth day but folded for 139 and lost the match by 36 runs and with it the series. Sarfraz Ahmed replaced him for the third Test. "Even the greatest players who have played

the game have gone through rough patches in their career. Even the likes of Ricky Ponting have gone through slumps in their form," Akmal told Pakpassion.net. "The most important thing for me to concentrate on is how I bounce back from this. The Sydney Test match was a horrible experience. There is no point in making excuses over events in Sydney.

"All I can do is to work hard on my cricket, learn from the events of Sydney and take on board the advice from colleagues and friends." Akmal said advice from former

wicketkeepers like Ian Healy and Wasim Bari has been forthcoming. He said his Australian counterpart Brad Haddin also spent time with him in Hobart, the venue of the third Test of that series. "Ian Healy has been very helpful to me and

given me some excellent technical advice and tips," Akmal said. "You can't ignore advice from a wicketkeeper of such experience and pedigree. Brad [Haddin] chatted with me in Hobart about some technical issues and told me to keep my chin up. I'm so appreciative of the advice and time that both Healy and Haddin gave me and I'll always be grateful to them." He was also contacted by Bari, the former

Pakistan wicketkeeper, who is now an official with the Pakistan Cricket Board. "Wasim Bari phoned me up after the Sydney Test match and we had a good chat. Wasim encouraged me and also told me to keep my spirits up. He is a very experienced wicketkeeper and his advice was also much appreciated."

Pakistan endured a miserable tour, losing all three Tests, five ODIs and the Twenty20. Akmal said that despite the series of defeats, the whole team had learnt plenty by just observing the professional work ethic of their opponents. "It's tough, cricket in Australia, it's hard

work and you are thoroughly tested in every aspect of your game. The preparation of the Australians and their attention to detail is something that we can all learn from. There are so many things we can take from this tour and use to improve our cricket."

Greatbatch praises his charges

New Zealand coach Mark Greatbatch, in his first series in charge, has praised the way his players powered to a 146-run win in the first ODI in Napier, after Bangladesh had them under pressure early on.

New Zealand lost two wickets at 19, and stumbled to 135 for 5, before Jacob Oram and Neil Broom hit attacking halfcenturies to lift the score to 336 for 9. Peter Ingram, on debut, made 69 as an opener and a brisk 32 by the captain Daniel Vettori also aided New Zealand's late assault. Oram was particularly brutal, smashing five sixes and eight fours in his 40-ball 83.

"I thought Bangladesh, for probably 20 overs of the game - bowling and batting - put us under pressure but we soaked that up," Greatbatch told Press Association. "We probably lost a couple of wickets too many in that middle stage but they kept playing positively and that set us up to get to 330."

Greatbatch singled out Broom and Oram for praise. They added 123 in 11.1 overs for the seventh wicket to take the initiative away from Bangladesh. "Neil was exceptional because it was a mature knock for a guy who hasn't really had a lot of success in one-day cricket,' Greatbatch said. "I thought Jacob Oram's allround performance, particularly his batting, was exceptional.
