

### Photo finishes Sumita

It must have come as a surprise for Gayathry Gobindra Raj of India that she has won the women's 100m hurdles gold of the 11th South Asian (SA) Games. About 20 minutes have already passed after the race had ended and favourite Sumita Rani, draped in red and green colours, of

Bangladesh is on victory lap round the track. This is when the shock came for Sumita. A photo finish separated the two, by a hundredth of a second. And the gold went to

Gayathry. This is how the women's 100m hurdles event went at

the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday. Gayathry took 13.98 seconds to grab the gold while Sumita followed her by 0.01 second more. The bronze also went to a Bangladeshi, Jasmin Akhter who clocked 14.05 seconds.

The 22-year-old Sumita, who won bronze in the 2006 Colombo Games, made a promising start and initially it looked like that her fight would be against Sri Lankan Amali Harshani Wijesinghadon as they ran neck-and-neck until the half-way mark. Sumita then surged past the Lankan, raising hopes of becoming the first Bangladeshi woman athlete to win a gold

But Gayathry, an Indian junior hurdler, who is participating in the Games for the first time, recovered from her poor start and did extremely well in the last 10 metres to do what she finally did. "After the race, first I was confused. But in the end I am really

happy to win gold for India," said Gayathry. The girl from Tamil Nadu said that she was confident of winning the gold as she had done her best to push down the last 10 metres to make up for her shaky start. Gayathry, however, said that it was not her best performance as she

Pakistan defied the odds to beat powerful India 4-3 on penalties in the final to retain South Asian hockey supremacy. The match rolled into extra time after

the regulation 70 minutes ended 1-1. Even the added fifteen minutes after that failed to break the deadlock.

Pakistan converted four of their five strokes as opposed to India's three to retain the gold medal they won from India in the Colombo Games in 2006. Besides, it was an immediate revenge for Pakistan as they lost to the same side 5-1 in the group match on February 3.

The first half was completely dominated by India and it looked like it was going to be another one-sided show as the group match. And the Indians took an early lead in the sixth minute through captain Ajitesh Rai who scored from a penalty corner. Dharmavir Singh pushed the ball on which there was a dummy before Ajitesh converted with a clever hit. India created couple of more chances but could not capitalise as Pakistan defended deep.

India were unlucky when Roshan Minz's sliding effort came off the post. A scuffle broke out between the two sides from a foul as big-match tension got the better of their temperament. As a result, both captains received yellow cards for two minutes.

Pakistan regrouped in the second half and played with much more vigour and purpose than the first. They kept pressing for an equaliser and their hard work paid off as they came back in the game through a penalty corner 12 minutes into the second half. It was once again the tall Wasif Siddique, who has been phenomenal in the tournament as far as penalty corners are concerned, converted it after a push from skipper Sabtain Raza. Pakistan keeper Imran Butt made some good saves to deny India from taking the lead again. Minz missed an excellent opportunity from an unmarked position 10 yards from the post as he shot it wayward.

The match rolled into extra time but no team could break the deadlock either so it was destined for a tiebreak.

Varinder Singh's feeble effort was saved by Butt to give Pakistan the edge, but then Zeeshan Ali hit the post that kept India in the tie. The next shot from Dharmavir was saved by Butt. Pakistan needed to put their last shot in and skipper Raza stepped up to convert that one to lead the team into wild celebra-

Pakistan coach Shahbaz Ahmed Jr. was delighted with his team's performance.

"I am very happy with the team's performance. We always believed that we could beat India and the 5-1 defeat in the group match was just a bad game for us. We were conscious of not making the same mistakes we made on that day. After a below par first half, we managed to lift our game and won it in the end," said the great.

India coach Clarence Lobo rued the missed chances that their strikers failed to take in the second half: "It was bad luck. We expected this sort of fight from Pakistan. But we should have won though had we not failed to capitalise on the chances we created."

## Kaka ends a long wait

Brazilian superstar Kaka scored his first league goal in three months as Real Madrid closed back to within five points of pacesetters Barcelona at the top of the Spanish top-flight with a comfortable 3-0 home win over Espanyol.

Barcelona had gone eight points clear with a 2-1 home win over Getafe earlier on Saturday, despite playing over an hour of the game with ten men, so the pressure was on Real and they responded with an 11th consecutive home victory.

Real were without Cristiano Ronaldo, completing his two-match ban, but didn't need the Portuguese star as goals from Sergio Ramos, Kaka and Gonzalo Higuain

sealed an easy win. Madrid got off to a great start when Ramos headed in Esteban Granero's

Despite being one man less Barca created chances and Seydou Keita missed a sitter on the hour mark putting his shot wide from close range.

Fortunately for Keita it didn't prove costly with Messi showing great balance and control to set up Xavi who made no mistake to score on 66 minutes.

Rafa Marquez was sent off in the closing stages for giving away a penalty which Roberto Soldado converted but Barca took the spoils.

Earlier Valencia triumphed 2-0 at home over Valladolid, moving them six points clear of fourth-placed Sevilla.

### Injured fan dies

A Blackburn Rovers football fan critically injured at this weekend's Premier League match at Stoke City has died in hospital, police said on Sunday.

The man, who was found unconscious in a stand during Saturday's game, was treated for a head injury and cardiac arrest, then rushed to the hospital. A police spokesman said:

"A 30-year-old man was pronounced dead at 1.55am this morning at University Hospital North Staffordshire. "The circumstances are

being fully investigated and a 25-year-old man remains in custody and is helping police with their inquiries." The victim was found collapsed in the concourse

area of the south stand just after half-time, where a group of Blackburn supporters were gathered.

#### Police caught up in Cabanas shooting

Mexican authorities have accused three policemen of being implicated in last month's shooting of Paraguay World Cup star Salvador Cabanas, the ministry of public affairs said late Saturday.

Cabanas was shot in the toilet of a trendy Mexico City and underwent emergency surgery.

Closed-circuit images from the bar allegedly show three police, escorting the main suspect inside the building.

The police gave their account to investigators Thursday and have been placed in temporary custody, the ministry said on its website.

Authorities are looking for the suspect, Jose Jorge Balderas Garza, nicknamed "El JJ", and a man known by the nickname "El Contador."

The 29-year-old Cabanas plays his club football with Club America of the Mexican league. He has been able to be up and about in recent days but



remains in hospital.

## Hosts get back hockey bronze

Bangladesh came from behind to beat Sri Lanka 2-1 to regain the bronze medal in hockey of the 11th South Asian Games at Maulana Bhasani National Hockey Stadium yesterday.

It also was a sweet revenge for the hosts, who went down 2-0 to the then hosts to lose the medal in the Colombo Games four years ago. Ashiqur Rahman and Mamunur Rahman Chayan scored for the winners while Mulaffer scored the lone goal for Sri Lanka.

After putting up a superb show against India for a 3-3 draw in the final group match on Friday, Bangladesh were expected to keep up the momentum against Sri Lanka, who they handed an emphatic 3-1 defeat in their group match, but it was not so easy a task for the hosts to beat the islanders for the second time.

Even the game saw the Lankan players refrain from playing for a couple of minutes in protest of Pakistani umpire Kamran Sharif's decision to award a penalty corner to the hosts in the closing moments from where Bangladesh struck the winning goal through a combination of Rasel Mahmud Jimmy, Moshiur Rahman Biplob and Mamunur Rahman Chayan, who converted the goal five they finally rallied back to win the game. minutes from time.

Bangladesh, however, could have taken a lead in the opening moments but Sri Lankan goalkeeper Rathnasiri made a superb save to foil an effort from Kamruzzaman Rana.

Sri Lanka adopted a counter-attack strategy

to keep two players up front deploying six players in the backline and they went ahead from a counter-attack when Mulaffer ran down from the right to dance past three Bangladeshi players including goalkeeper Kiron inside the 16-yard box to give his side a lead in the 18th minute. Shrugging off the nervousness, Bangladesh

reorganised to press hard in the second half for the equaliser. It came in the 50th minute when veteran Ashiqur pushed a Chayan slap home. Chayan then converted Bangladesh's sixth penalty corner to seal the match in the 65th minute. But before that a scare came from Sri Lankan

captain Abey Arathne Dammika who beat Bangladesh keeper Kiron only to see his push narrowly miss the board in the 41st minute.

Bangladesh captain Biplob admitted that they initially were under pressure, but overcame that to win the game.

"Not only today, whenever we play against Sri Lanka, we find ourselves under pressure and I don't know why this happens," said Biplob adding that they could not play according to their plan in the first half, but

# Nepalese cyclists on a peace mission

Two Nepalese cyclists on their odyssey to pedal around 99 countries in five years are now in the city with a message of peace for the world leaders and renowned personalities.

Rupak Khadka, 21, and Rajendra

Sepakota, 22, from Kathmandu have pedalled over 2621 miles (4,218 kilometres) in 79 days to reach the city. "We plan to get round the world and spread our message. This mission is not about mate-

rial gain or international fame. It is simply about spreading the message that it would not be possible to save the world environment without gaining internal peace within one's individual self," said Rupak Khadka while on a brief break from his travels in Dhaka. The two yogis [Hindu spiritualists who are

advanced practitioner and has achieved a high level of spiritual insight] has cycled through India to reach Bangladesh. They hope that by the time they return to

their country in 2014, they would have met the leading world leaders including the president of the United States.

"We plan to meet the US president and show him the documents and mementoes of our travels," said Rajendra Sepakota, "We want to tell him that the whole world is looking towards him to take a decision". In their one-week stay in Dhaka, the two

cyclists will appear in programmes organised by the Rotary Club, Dhaka University's environmental science department, Nepalese organisations as well as various educational institutes to spread their message. "We are also looking forward to meet with

the Prime Minister and the President. We want to spread the message that they should look at the world with love in their eyes and then they can make a difference around them," said Rupak Khadka.

From their experience in the city, the two intrepid travellers said that the city needs more environment-free development.

"They should consider the environment more when developing the city," said Rajendra, "But we also want to laud the government for banning polythene as this happens to be the only city we have seen so far that does not allow the use of polythene".

They were inspired to take to the saddle by another Nepalese cyclist Pushkar Shah who had pedalled around 150 countries since 1998. They cycle 8 hours a day on average, drinks five to six litres of water and covers about

100km (62 miles). Furthermore they say that they have not been ill once during the journey - "Not even a headache".

They began their journey with 3,000 Nepalese rupees (\$121) handed to them by their family members. But as their story spread, cash donations came from various sources, from individuals to organisations, from city mayors to charity groups.

"Initially it seemed just like a dream," they told The Daily Star. "We trekked 8,500 kilometres in Nepal to spread our message and then we decided to go for a world tour." After one and a half years of planning, the

trip became a reality. Rupak and Rajendra set off in November 2009 on their \$68-bicycles. They have been through some testing

times in their journey. But the two everoptimistic cyclists say that their bad times are offset by the people who offer them kindness and hospitality.

The duo will head to Bhutan after their
