Pabna dealers stop taking delivery as farmers refuse to buy 'rotten' fertiliser

Large amount also getting damaged under open sky in Gaibandha

Fertiliser dealers of Pabna district have decided not to take delivery of imported fertilisers from buffer godowns due to its 'poor quality' rotting under the open sky on the premises of buffer godowns in Gaibandha district.

A meeting of Pabna District Fertiliser Dealers' Association on Monday afternoon decided that dealers will not take delivery of imported fertiliser from buffer godowns in this month as most of the February for Boro cultivation, they said. earlier received 'damaged' fertilisers have remained unsold, reports our Pabna correspondent.

"Imported buffer fertilisers have lost quality. Kept under the open sky without proper maintenance, these fertilisers have turned into hard stuff and reduced in weight. The bags have become discoloured too. So, farmers

do not want to buy these fertilisers,"

while thousands of tonnes of urea is buffer fertilisers for 103 dealers of the district in January and the dealers took delivery of 7142 tonnes, DAE officials said. For February, 9810 tonnes of fertilis-

ers have been allotted but the dealers have not taken any delivery of fertiliser till February 9 although the highest amount of fertiliser is needed in

Several dealers said most of the fertiliser they took in January has remained unsold as farmers are waiting for locally produced 'superior quality' fertiliser.

"The dealers in the district took delivery of 7142 tonnes of buffer fertilisers but 75 percent of it is still unsold. The farmers prefer 'Jamuna

fertiliser' due to its superior quality," Md Idris Ali Biswas, president of Pabna District Fertiliser Dealers Association.

This year the BCIC has allotted only imported fertilisers in January and February whereas in earlier years 50 percent of the allotted fertilisers were country-made, fertiliser dealers' association leaders said.

They have demanded allotment of locally produced fertilisers instead of imported buffer fertiliser.

If the dealers do not take timely delivery of fertilisers in this peak season, boro cultivation may be hampered, said an official of the Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE) in the district.

Our Gaibandha Correspondent reports: Thousands of tonnes of urea fertiliser, kept under the open sky due to lack of accommodation in the buffer godowns in the district, see gradual decline in quality.

Of the yearly requirement of 65 thousand tonnes of urea fertiliser in Gaibandha, 37 thousand tonnes is needed for boro paddy farming from January to March and the BCIC authority has allocated 35 thousand 47 tonnes of fertiliser in this boro season, said DAE officials in the district.

The BCIC authority in this boro season allocated 35 thousand 47 tonnes of fertiliser in Gaibandha district.

As the buffer stock go-downs with four thousand-tonne capacity is too inadequate to accommodate the present stock, authorities have stockpiled huge fertiliser under the open sky on and around the go-down premises.

This season plantation of boro seedlings is being delayed as farmers could not work in the field due to prolonged cold spell and foggy weather.

Faulty solid waste management in Rajshahi city

Dumping in open space poses health hazard to dwellers

Over 40 percent solid wastes of Rajshahi city are dumped into drains, open spaces and water bodies, causing environmental pollution and health hazards.

Even the officially designated dumping ground remains open to pollute the air and water while liquid wastes collected from drains are often kept on streets to dry up as Rajshahi City Corporation (RCC) lacks proper waste management logistics, said experts and sources in the RCC.

The city generates approximately 350 tonnes of solid waste every day while the amount increases to 400 tonnes during summer. Of the total, only 210 tonnes are collected and dumped into the open dumping ground at Nawdapara, said Sheikh Md Mamun, chief without anywork. conservancy officer of RCC.

The remaining 140 tonnes of waste are dumped straight into drains, water bodies and open spaces, said waste management staff and researchers.

The matter came to light recently as the RCC started implementing projects to clean the city's major drains. The officials found the drains filled up and clogged due to rampant dumping of solid wastes over years.

"Many residents have to dump solid wastes into drains and other spaces as the RCC has poor logistic support," said Dr Muhammed Alamgir, civil engineering faculty dean of Khulna University of Engineering and Technology.

Alamgir, who conducted a research on waste management in Rajshahi, said his research found that the RCC's open dumping ground at Nawdapara is unscientific and contributing to

pollution. RCC has 1,073 waste management manpower provided with eight tractors, 16 lorries, two hydraulic trucks and 182 rickshaw-vans to

collect wastes from households. A large number of sweepers, backed by a section of RCC officials, allegedly draw salaries

"The situation has improved since the corporation stared night time waste collection last year and involved communities in the work," said RCC Chief Engineer Sirajum

"An initiative is underway to develop a properly engineered landfill at Nawdapara dumping ground. Once the landfill is developed, many waste related problems will be solved," he

Man beats pregnant wife dead

A pregnant woman, seriously tortured by husband at Dhulandi village under Ghior upazila in Manikganj on Monday, succumbed to her injuries at a clinic in Savar on Tuesday night.

The victim, Lipi Akter, 22, daughter of Harej Dewan of D-Tarail village under Shivalaya upazila in the district, was pregnant for five months.

When Lipi was married to Babul Hossain, son of Sheikh Naimuddin of Dhulandi village under Ghior upazila in the district one and a half years ago, her family gave Tk 1.80 lakh to Babul as dowry, said the victim's family mem-

Later Babul demanded a motorcycle and gold ornaments from Lipi's family and tortured her for failure to meet the demand, they said.

Babul Hossain mercilessly beat up Lipi Akter on Monday afternoon, leaving her injured.

She was taken to Manikganj Sadar Hospital at 10:00am on Tuesday.

In the afternoon, doctors referred her to Dhaka Medical College Hospital. As Lipi's condition deterio-

rated on the way, she was taken to Enam Clinic at Savar where she died at 8:00pm.

The victim's body bore several marks of torture, Ghior Police Station Officer-in-Charge Azizur Rahman said, adding that the body was sent to Manikganj Sadar Hospital morgue for autopsy.

"Victim's father Harej Dewan filed a murder case against six people including Babul and we have arrested four of the accused," the OC said.

His neighbours rushed to the spot and caught Nurul Islam, one of the gang members while others managed to flee. Villagers beat up Nurul severely, resulting his death on the spot. On information, police went to the village, recovered the body and sent it to Dinajpur Medical College Hospital for autopsy.

Motorbike snatched from ASI
