


Zoran misses second day

Serbian coach Zoran Djordjevic skipped conducting the training of the national footballers

for a second successive day though the booters have been gearing up for the AFC Challenge Cup finals in line with the training that he had outlined before the South Asian Games.

The Bangladesh Football Federation highups has kept on persuading Zoran to retain his service while Saiful Bari Titu, one of the two AFC's A-licence coaches in Bangladesh, has been passing a busy time with the players after Zoran declined to train the booters citing the drawing up of a new four-year deal after helping Bangladesh emerge unbeaten champions in the 11th South Asian Games on home soil.

BFF vice president and national team management committee chairman Badal Roy has kept in touch with Zoran and had a discussion yesterday to pursuade him and it seemed to him that the Serbian coach has retracted a bit from his position.

"After talking to him today (Friday), it seemed to me that he has retracted from his ego and he has placed his long-term ideas and we will discuss it after the arrival of the BFF president tomorrow (Saturday)," Badal said. "Without the government assistance, the BFF has no ability to implement the ideas what Zoran has designed for Bangladesh because it is a ques-

tion of a big amount of money."

Roy again stressed to honour the first contract Zoran has signed. "He should respect the two-month contract that he has signed and then we will consider signing a new deal with

It is expected that the crisis may be over today after the discussion between Zoran and the BFF president Kazi Salahuddin, who is scheduled to return home from London today morning.

While the BFF officials is trying to persuade Zoran, the champion footballers have been getting ready for the next challenge through almost the same training that they undertook under the supervision of Zoran before the SA Games.

Local coach Titu was a part of that training and he is mainly following up with that train-

"May be coaches have different philosophies but the method and ingredients of the training are almost same and what I have been teaching is a continuation of Zoran's training as I was involved with the training when he had conducted it for two teams at BKSP," said Titu.

"Like Zoran, I am also trying to motivate the players to get maximum from them as they know it well that finally they have to perform on the field whether there is a good or bad coach with them," said Titu adding that modern training has a close similarity in each country whether it is Europe or Asia.

All eyes on Eden

A desperate India will look to hit back at South Africa in the decisive second and final Test starting on Sunday after suffering a humiliating defeat in

the opening tie. India's reputation as the number one Test side in the world took a massive blow after they lost the first Test in Nagpur by an innings and six runs to the second-ranked

Proteas. Mahendra Singh Dhoni's men need a series-levelling win at the Eden Gardens in Kolkata to stop South Africa from snatching the coveted ranking.

India's hopes received a timely boost when key middle-order batsman Venkatsai Laxman was cleared to play after having recovered from a

finger injury. With star batsmen Rahul Dravid and Yuvraj Singh ruled out at the start of the series with injuries, Laxman was sorely missed in Nagpur as India crashed for 233 and 319 in reply to South Africa's 558-6

declared. Laxman, 35, has scored 6,993 runs in 109 Tests at an average of 45.70 with 14 centu-

India were forced to play rookie wicket-keeper Wriddhiman Saha as a specialist batsman in Nagpur after Rohit Sharma, the first-choice replacement for Laxman, got injured just before the toss.

"We definitely missed some important players due to injuries," said Dhoni after suffering his first Test defeat since taking over as captain in

"That pushed us to the back foot. Injuries can cause a bit of panic in the dressing room.

"It was a test of our bench strength. So I won't complain, I'll only say that we were completely outplayed by South Africa."

India's bowling attack also lacked firepower, with pace spearhead Zaheer Khan and frontline off-spinner Harbhajan Singh paling in comparison to their South African rivals, Dale Steyn and Paul Harris.

Steyn, with a match haul of 10-108, underlined his reputation as the leading fast bowler in the world, while left-arm spinner Harris proved effective with three vital wickets in the second innings.

During their last series in India in 2008, South Africa

won the second Test in Ahmedabad by an innings and 90 runs to take the lead in the three-match series after the first match was drawn. India drew the series on an

under-prepared wicket in Kanpur, raising fears that a similar ploy may be used at the Eden Gardens. South Africa's coach Corrie

van Zyl, however, said his team will not be intimidated, whatever the nature of the wicket.

"Mentally, the South African team is better pre-

said van Zyl, who took over as interim coach from Mickey Arthur just before the start of the India tour.

"I won't say it will be a minefield, but I do expect something that will help the Indian team. We know that if the first Test was a challenge, then the second Test is going to be a bigger challenge."

The Kolkata Test will be followed by three one-day internationals in Jaipur (February 21), Gwalior (February 24) and Ahmedabad (February 27).

Report finds disciplinary faults

A team manager's report on Pakistan's disastrous tour of Australia blamed defensive captaincy by Mohammad Yousuf and discipline problems for the

debacle. Pakistan were whitewashed 3-0 in Tests and 5-0 in one-day matches before going down in the only Twenty20 match on their tour of Australia which ended on

February 5. The defeats forced chief selector Iqbal Qasim to resign from his post, while the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) formed a

six-man evaluation committee to ascertain the reasons for the defeats. Coach Intikhab Alam and wicket-

Smith scare for SA

South African captain Graeme Smith suffered a finger injury on Friday, causing a scare in the tourists' camp ahead of a decisive Test match against India.

Smith hurt the little finger on his left hand during the team's fielding session at the Eden Gardens in Kolkata, where the second and final Test starts on Sunday. X-rays did not reveal a frac-

ture, but Smith was set to undergo an MRI scan to determine if the injury was more serious than a sprained liga-

"There is no fracture, but we need an MRI scan done, to be sure it is not a serious injury," team spokesman Michael Owen-Smith told reporters.

Teammates back Strauss time and effort that has gone

England stand-in captain Alastair Cook insists his team have given their support to regular skipper Andrew Strauss's decision to miss the forthcoming tour of Bangladesh.

Strauss was keen to rest ahead of a gruelling domestic campaign but the opener has been criticised by former teammate Steve Harmison and several ex-England captains, while Australia legend Shane Warne claimed the decision was disrespectful.

Cook, who will lead in England's Test and one-day sides on the trip, is adamant it was a call Strauss made in the long-term best interests of his squad.

"It's a decision he hasn't taken lightly at all," Cook said at Lord's on Friday.

"There's a huge amount of week block and not looking

into that decision and it's a proactive move for him.

"He's looking ahead to what is a huge period for us over the next 18 months with the Ashes and the World Cup. "He's decided he needs a break so he is fully refreshed

and we are fully backing that decision. It gives opportunities for other players to step in and it gets a few more people used to international cricket. "The amount of effort he and (coach) Andy Flower have put in over the last 12 months

has taken a bit of a toll on him

and he needs this break so he

can have a full burst leading the side forward." Essex batsman Cook, 25, can't wait to lead his country in battle, having previously captained England Under-19s in Bangladesh, and he believes his increased experience will benefit Strauss upon his

return. "I'm looking at this as a six-

too far ahead," he said. "I'm very excited by the

challenge and slightly nervous as well, but it's a great opportunity for me to learn about the role and give a good account of myself.

"Hopefully it will benefit me as a person and a cricketer. Creating more leaders in the English side will help Straussy when he comes back too, but to lead out my country will be thrilling and I will give it my all for six weeks.

"There have been a lot of phone calls to Andy Flower talking through our tactics and where we want this side to

"The Ashes and the two World Cups are our main priorities and this is a stepping stone of learning for this side on the subcontinent. It's a hugely important tour for us to

do well in. Although Cook has plenty of experienced players and coaches to turn to for advice,

Rain thwarts WI hopes

West Indies had their best performance of the series cut short by the weather as they were allowed six balls in their chase before the third ODI was washed out. The desperate tourists, who now have to win the final two matches to level the five-game contest, were hopeful of victory after Ravi Rampaul's 4 for 61 restricted

They had scored six runs when the rain came for a twohour delay and it refused to leave for long enough to ensure a result. Play resumed at 9.20pm local time with West Indies facing a target of 151 off 24 overs, but the weather

closed in again after one delivery. The sides will head to Brisbane for the fourth fixture on Sunday, when Australia will attempt to wrap up the series and Chris Gayle's men will try to hold on.

Gayle gambled by bowling first at the SCG after losing Kemar Roach to injury, but his back-up men stood up in hot and humid conditions at the start and windy ones towards the end of the innings. Australia experienced a testing opening to be 2 for 30 and the batsmen were unable to find fluency while West Indies' medium pacers enjoyed a pitch offering seam and some

inconsistent bounce. Rampaul led the attack well in the absence of Roach -- he didn't deserve a late thrashing from Ryan Harris -- while

Dwayne Smith, the stand-in opener, had 3 for 45 as they regularly threatened the locals. Australia relied on late contributions from Michael Hussey, who struck 44 off 53, and Harris (21 off nine) as they built on Michael Clarke's 46 to post what should have been a

challenging total. Hussey, who came in just before a 20-minute rain break, worked hard while James Hopes chipped in with a valuable 30 before Harris arrived with some grunt. He hit Rampaul for three fours and a six in the 50th over before finding Kieron Pollard at long on as Australia were dismissed with a ball to go.

Australia had already lost four wickets in the Powerplay, which was taken in the 45th **SEE PAGE 18 COL 3**
