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Dhaka, Delhi agree on 1,320MW joint venture power plant

Coal-fired plant to generate power in 3yrs

Bangladesh and India yesterday agreed to form a joint-venture company to set up a two-unit coal-fired power plant of total 1,320 megawatt capacity in Khulna.

The two countries also agreed to establish a cross-border power grid, for which tenders will be invited this month, and the work order will be issued in June this year.

The decisions were taken at the second meeting of the Bangladesh-India Joint Steering Committee on Power Sector which had been formed during Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's visit to Delhi last month.

Each of the units in the joint-venture power plant will have the capacity to generate 660MW of power using imported coal. National Thermal Power Corporation of India will carry out a feasibility study for the plant this month,

and submit a report by July this year to the Bangladesh government while the timeline for finishing the project has been set between 36 and 48 months of issuing the work order.

A bilateral document prior to signing of a memorandum of understanding regarding the matter is expected to be signed today. At yesterday's meeting the Indian side was

headed by its Power Secretary HS Brahma, who had flown to Dhaka on Thursday with a delegation on a three-day visit.

The power secretaries of both countries jointly briefed journalists about the meeting's resolutions at the PDB headquarters in Dhaka.

"We want to gather experience regarding coal based power plants, since in future we will have to set up several such power plants to utilise the coal deposits of the country," said Bangladesh Power Division Secretary Abul Kalam Azad who SEE PAGE 15 COL 5

Environment ministry favours polluters

Writes to commerce ministry to allow scrap ship without pre-import cleaning

The environment and forest ministry has requested the commerce ministry to relax its rules to allow ship breakers to import toxic ships without submission of precleaning certificates from exporters. The import of such ships will pose

risks of health hazards for ship-breaking workers and widespread environmental pollution in the country's coastal belt.

In a letter to the commerce ministry on Wednesday, the environment and forest ministry said government officials would examine the ships and issue cleaning certificates.

"We have sent the letter to the commerce ministry. But we shall not let any ship pollute the environment. Our officials will examine the ships and only those without toxic substances will be allowed to enter the country's maritime territory," said Environment and Forest Secretary Dr Mihir Kanti Majumder.

He said the ministry is preparing a code of conduct on ship breaking in line with the High Court order and directives from Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

"We shall complete it within two months," the secretary said.

Following an HC order, the commerce ministry amended its import policy order 2009-12 on January 28 this year making it mandatory for ship exporters to submit pre-cleaning certificate before any ship enters the country's maritime territory.

The HC directed the government to ensure cleaning of all ships before they enter the country and safety of shipbreaking workers, following a writ petition on March 18, 2009. The Department of Customs recently

barred at least 10 ships from entering the country's maritime territory as their exporters did not have any pre-cleaning certificates.

UN climate change process in limbo

The UN process for tackling global warming is now captainless as well as rudderless after climate chief Yvo de Boer suddenly announced his resignation two months after the illstarred Copenhagen summit.

De Boer, 55, announced on Thursday he would step down as executive secretary of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) to pursue a career in the private sector.

His abrupt departure -- and the search for a successor able to satisfy 194 nations -- adds SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

Service-seekers face hassle at BRTA

Withdrawal of 200 volunteers worsens situation

Suffering of service-seekers at Mirpur BRTA has multiplied after the recent withdrawal of around 200 yellow-jersey volunteers, who used to assist 30 officials and staff at the understaffed office.

Officials at the Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) said work is now piling up every day as they can do only 25 percent of a day's work at the Mirpur office where 75 automobile and about 100 motorbike owners seek vehicle registration and 750 vehicles come for fitness tests on an average day, apart from other service seekers.

Talking to The Daily Star, a number of service seekers at BRTA said one could have got the required service there if that person came early in the morning and gave a tremendous amount of effort. But now it sometimes takes four days

to get something done.

"I went to BRTA on four consecutive days to get my sister's car registered and finally I got it done on the fourth day. On the first two days I just went from counters to counters to know the process," said a service seeker.

"As I found long queue at every counter, it

took me sometimes an hour to be the first in line at the counter and get the official's counsel. On the third day I managed to reach a staff, who helped me fill up the necessary papers. I had to give him some 'tip' in return," the person said.

The volunteers used help people advising them on how to get things done at the BRTA in return for tips.

During the last caretaker government's rule, the authorities introduced the 200 yellowjersey outsiders at BRTA allowing them to aid officials and staff of the severely understaffed

PM accuses BNP govt of renaming 200 institutions

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday defended her position on renaming different institutions and structures, saying the BNP-Jamaat coalition deserves a lesson.

"We started construction of 200-250 institutions and structures during our previous rule. But after assuming power, they [the BNP-Jamaat coalition government] changed the names of those institutions one after another. They did not think that the renaming game will not end there, so they need a lesson," she said.

"Changing the name of just one or two structures has upset them; what will happen if we change the names of 250 structures?" said the Awami League chief while addressing a discussion on the International Mother Language Day at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre in the capital yesterday.

"I hope they will not engage in any game of renaming in the future," she added.
