# No respite from custodial deaths

6 extra-judicial killings even after HC concern

At least six people were killed in law enforcers' custody even after the High Court on December 14 expressed its grave concern over the persistent extra-judicial killings. Attorney General Mahbubey Alam informed

different law enforcement agencies about the HC concern so that measures could be taken to stop such killings.

According to Ain O Salish Kendra (ASK), a leading human rights organisation in the country, four persons were killed in Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) custody while two in police

Firoz Koshai of Kishoreganj, Osman Gani of Chittagong, Hobi Kobiraj of Kustia and Behai Pervez of Dhaka were killed in Rab custody while Alamgir Hossain of Dhaka and Khalil Prokash Sohel of Chittagong in police custody, said ASK counsellor Saifur Rashid.

Saifur Rashid on Wednesday told The Daily Star that they would move to dispose of extrajudicial killing cases through HC hearing.

#### OBAMA-DALAI LAMA TALKS

# China at odds with US

AFP, Beijing

China yesterday bitterly condemned US President Barack Obama's meeting with the Dalai Lama, saying it had "seriously harmed" relations and summoning the American ambassador in Beijing to protest.

The denunciation came swiftly after Obama vowed support for Tibetan rights in his White House talks with the exiled Tibetan spiritual leader on Thursday, a meeting that China had repeatedly warned against.

"The US action seriously interfered in Chinese internal affairs, seriously hurt SEE PAGE 15 COL 4 | the feelings of China's people and seri-

ously harmed China-US relations," said a statement released by foreign ministry spokesman Ma Zhaoxu.

Ma said the meeting "grossly violated basic norms of international relations" and US pledges to respect Chinese sovereignty.

The White House had meticulously planned the meeting in hopes of containing Chinese protests, inviting the Dalai Lama to a private area of the executive mansion rather than the Oval Office and not allowing cameras inside.

But the 74-year-old Buddhist monk took the unusual step of mingling with reporters afterwards, telling them he was "very happy" with Obama's support and

even engaging in a playful snowball fight. The White House later put out a pic-

ture of the two Nobel Peace Prize laureates in the 45-minute meeting and issued a statement backing the Dalai Lama's goals. "The president stated his strong sup-

port for the preservation of Tibet's unique religious, cultural and linguistic identity and the protection of human rights for Tibetans in the People's Republic of China," White House spokesman Robert Gibbs said. "The president commended the Dalai

# Mosquitoes rule despite DCC drive

# 'Crash programme' had little impact on the menace

The weeklong anti-mosquito drive of Dhaka City Corporation has failed miserably as the city dwellers are still suffering from mosquito bites every hour of the day.

The SSC examinees are the worst sufferers of nuisance, as they are to keep awake till late at night when mosquitoes buzz around in their thousands making their study difficult.

The drive titled "crash programme," which started on February 14, could have little effect as many city areas were out of its purview, residents from different areas complained.

Gulshan, Banani, Khilgaon-Bashabo, Dhanmondi Kalabagan, Mohammadpur, Mirpur, Jatrabari, Lalbagh and Nayabazar were under the programme. But most parts of the areas could not be covered in the drive, they complained.

The residents of different areas, including Rampura, Mirpur, Pallabi, Shenpara, Kazipara, Shewrapara, Taltala, Uttara, Jatrabari, Mohammadpur, Lalmatia, Azimpur, Rajabazar, Lalbagh, Islambagh, Basabo, Malibagh, Shantinagar, Madartek and Gopibagh, are the main sufferers from mosquito bite.

People at offices, business establishments, bus stoppages, train stations and launch terminals as well as floating people are also easy victims of the stinging insects.

"Although I had rented a house on the fifth floor of a building to save my baby from mosquito bite now I cannot save it even in daytime," said Shima Talukdar, a resident of Senpara.

Yesmin, a resident of Pallabi, said it becomes very tough for her mother who is a paralysed patient as she cannot save herself from the bites even in daytime.

### 2 outlaws murdered by 'rivals'

Two outlaws were killed Thursday night at Ramchandrapur cremation ground under Shailokupa upazila in Jhenidah.

The dead are Shariful Islam, 41, of Mailmari village under Shailokupa upazila and Masud Rana, 33, of Raghunathpur village under Harinakunda upazila of the district. They were relatives.

Officer-in-Charge of Shailokupa Police Station Anwar Hossain said the outlaws were members of Jasod Gono Bahini and working to build an armed group.

A rival faction, Kalu Bahini in Harinakunda upazila has killed them by slitting their throats, the OC alleged.

Police were trying to find out the reason behind the killings, the OC added.

# US pilot flies into Texas tax office

'Grudge against US admin,' no link with int'l terrorism: officials

A Texas pilot with an apparent grudge against the US government flew his single-engine plane into a tax office building Thursday, leaving two dead and 13 wounded and setting off a huge fireball.

Officials described the startling incident as a deliberate assault on a US government institution, but authorities stressed the crash did not appear to have connections to international terrorism.

The pilot, who left an apparent suicide note on the Internet bitterly railing against the US authorities, was unaccounted for after the attack, as was one federal employee. Two of those wounded were in critical condition.

"The remains of two individuals have been found in the building," Candice Wade, a spokeswoman for Austin's emergency management office, told AFP, declining to confirm that
