Trouble flares in hills again

2 ethnic people die in army firing, Bangalee settlers torch 200 houses

At least two indigenous persons were claimed by the authorities to have been killed as the army opened fire on agitated indigenous people feuding with settlers in remote Gangaram Mukh area of Baghaichhari upazila in the district yesterday.

But indigenous people claimed the number of killed to be at least six.

Seven persons including an army person were injured in the incident, which followed an attack on Friday night allegedly by a group of Bangalee settlers on the indigenous people over land disputes, report our correspondents in Rangamati and Khagrachhari.

The settlers had allegedly set fire to 40 houses of indigenous families on Friday night. They burnt 160 more houses in 11 SEE PAGE 15 COL 1



1,320MW PLANT

Dhaka, Delhi sign MoU

The government yesterday signed a Memorandum of Understanding with India to install a 1,320megawatt coal-fired power plant under joint venture in the country.

National Thermal Power Corporation (NTPC) of India will conduct feasibility studies in Chittagong and Khulna. A plant with two units having a capacity of 660MW each will be installed in any of the two places after completion of the study in July.

The agreement, signed by two officials of NTPC and the Power Development Board in Dhaka, includes the provision of setting up joint-venture power plants in any place in the region in future, renovation of old power plants in the country, and training for manpower in Bangladesh's power sector.

Talking to journalists after signing of the MoU, PDB Chairman Alamgir Kabir said PBD and NTPC will form a joint venture company to set up the plant.

BDR to shut its shops

BDR boss says disciplinary force should not be involved in commercial venture

Bangladesh Rifles has initiated a move to shut down the BDR shops, a chain of business outlets believed to have done the border force more harm than good.

Its Director General Major General Md Mainul Islam reckons that a disciplinary force like BDR should not be involved in commercial ventures.

Talking to The Daily Star yesterday, he said, "We have taken measures to shutter the shops. I think the sooner they are closed, the better."

In 2007, BDR teamed up with a private company named Nirmal Udyog and set up some well-furnished general and grocery stores in the capital.

Currently, it has 11 shops including one in the BDR Pilkhana headquarters and a warehouse.

February 25-26 mutiny that saw 74 people including 57 army officers killed in Pilkhana headquarters last year. The then BDR DG, Major Gen Shakil Ahmed, was among the dead.

Now there is a realisation among the BDR authorities that it might have been a wrong step to engage the border troops in business activities.

Accordingly, BDR has recently written to the home ministry, saying it wants to close down the shops.

Queried about the BDR's letter, Home Secretary Abdus Sobhan Sikder told The Daily Star that he has already asked the local government ministry to take over But things have changed after the running of those shops, as it was on the LGED land where the businesses are located.
