Home loans on a roll

Specialised private financiers widen market share

Housing finance by specialised private providers has been rising rapidly in the past few years, fuelled by growing demand from the urban middle-class, statistics show.

In the past three years -- from fiscal 2006-07 to fiscal 2008-09 -average housing loans provided by the private sector rose by nearly 26 percent a year.

The highest growth -- 39 percent -- was witnessed in fiscal 2006-07, while the following two years achieved 17.6 percent and 21 percent growth, despite the impacts of global recession on real estate, according to Bangladesh Bank data.

There are several specialised private housing finance companies offering loans for construction, renovation and purchase of residential accommodation, mainly in Dhaka. Of them, Delta-Brac Housing Finance Corporation (DBH), IDLC Finance and National Housing Finance and Investments Ltd are the market leaders.

The outstanding loan figure of

Delta-Brac Housing Finance stood at Tk 1,220 crore or nearly 70 percent of the total loans provided by specialised private housing financiers on June 30, 2009.


Home loans by IDLC and National Housing Finance reached Tk 390 crore and Tk 170 crore respectively at the same time.

Earlier, Bangladesh House

Building Finance Corporation (BHBFC), the lone state-owned house loan provider, enjoyed monopoly. But its market share is shrinking by the day, BB data shows. BHBFC's housing loans stood at

Tk 2,490 crore at the end of 2008-09, which was Tk 2,630 crore and Tk respectively.

On the other hand, total housing loans grew for all, including specialised public and private organisations, public and private banks, other financial institutions and microfinance institution Grameen Bank, by a whooping 80 percent to Tk 18,180 crore in fiscal 2008-09 from Tk 10,090 crore three years ago.

Recently, banks, particularly the private ones, have aggressively come up with home loans. These banks are seen as significant competitors to housing financers. At the end of June 2009, private banks' market share crossed 41 percent, up from 35 percent three years ago.

Private loan providers said prompt and hassle-free services helped them attract customers.

"A phone call to our office is enough to obtain counselling," said a senior DBH official.

The terms of housing loans are generally between 1 year and 20 years and the interest rate varies from 14 percent to 17 percent a year, differing from organisation to organisation. sajjad@thedailystar.net

A month of florists

Flower business has witnessed brisk sales this month mainly because of three occasions linked to the tradi-

tional symbols of love and honour.

The occasions are International Mother Language Day, Valentine's Day, and Pahela Falgun, the first day of spring in Bangla calendar.

Florists said demand for flowers was high throughout the month, pushing up prices.

"We buy 100 roses for Tk 200-Tk 300 on normal days. The prices shot up to Tk 1,000 on the eve of February 21," said Badal Chowhan, proprietor of Jharbera Puspalay at Shahbagh. "It's for the first time I saw such a price boom." Chowhan said wreath and bouquet makers also

bagged extra bucks. Sellers at the flower shops at Shahbagh said they prepared for supplying flowers and other related items two

days prior to Language Martyrs' Day. "We couldn't sleep last night (February 21) because of

the huge work pressure," said Arif, a flower shop representative at Shahbagh. The sellers also said flower supply was low on February

21 as flowers in gardens across the country were nearly sold out on and after Pahela Falgun and Valentine's Day. Demand was so high that the shops collected rose-

buds, failing to get the blooms, said Abdus Salam, another Shahbagh trader who began such business in 1993. Salam said he saw a lot of changes in the sector after he

had joined the trade. In the past, most flowers had been imported, but now

the country produces many traditional flowers meant for

business. Jessore is the main domestic source of flowers. Jhenidah, Munshiganj, Dhaka and Bogra are also emerging as flower zones.

The traders said Shahbagh was the prime retail and wholesale flower market in the capital in the past, but now Farmgate is the main wholesale market.

"Besides the flower selling outlets, there are eight to nine dedicated companies in the capital who decorate places or event venues with flowers on different occasions," said Liaqat Hossain, a member of Bangladesh Flower Growers and Exporters' Association.

Flower business runs round the year but the peak season is between December and April when different cultural, political, social, religious and family programmes take place.

Sector people said the business has been expanding over the years, but the sector is still faced with a lot of problems, including a lack of flower preservation facility, poor maintenance and absence of any permanent market.

"Poor maintenance and packaging cost them 30-40 percent loss during transportation," said Chowhan of Jharbera Puspalay.

Erratic weather also harms their flowers at the makeshift shops at Shahbagh, said some traders.

"We have to pay toll to the government party stalwarts and also the law enforcers since some 25 shops in the market don't have legality to run business," said a trader.

According to Export Promotion Bureau statistics, Bangladesh exported flower/foliage worth \$17.33 million in the first half of the current fiscal year with 9.20 percent growth over the same period last year. kawsar@thedailystar.net
