# EC against redrawing of ward boundaries

Decides to ask govt for amendment to act, avoid delay in holding polls in May-July

The Election Commission has decided to ask the government to amend the union parishad act to avert possible 'social disorder' due to redemarcation of the parishad wards maintaining no more than 10 percent population disparity among them, before their upcoming elections.

now, it will delay the commission's current plan for holding the long overdue polls to the union parishads between May and July this year, the EC apprehended in a letter to be sent to the LGRD ministry today or tomorrow, according to commission officials.

The commission rather wants to maintain the existing delimitation of the wards Moreover, if the redemarcation begins for the upcoming union parishad elections.

The Local Government (Union Parishad) Act 2009 stipulates that the wards of union parishads should be redemarcated maintaining no more than 10 percent population disparity among the wards of a union parishad. Each union parishad has nine wards.

# Govt moves to use climate fund rightly

Okays an act to ensure transparency

The government will promulgate an act to use climate change fund judiciously and transparently so that benefits reach the affected people properly.

The cabinet yesterday approved the draft Climate Change Trust Fund Act, 2010. The draft will soon be finalised and sent to the law ministry for vetting.

Earlier on August 24, the cabinet approved Climate Change Trust Fund, which was supposed to be registered under the Bengal Trust Act 1882.

"The law ministry suggested us to make a law SEE PAGE 15 COL 6 in this regard since general people are the bene-

ficiaries," Environment and Forest Secretary

Mihir Kanti Barua told The Daily Star yesterday. He said the act is needed to bring the entire process--from generating fund to approval of projects and use of the fund through a trustee board--under a strong legal coverage.

He said 66 percent of the fund would be spent on six designated areas marked under Bangladesh Climate Change Strategy and Action Plan while 34 percent would be in bank for crisis situation.

The prime minister told the meeting that apart from assistance from international agencies and countries, Bangladesh has taken various steps on its own to face the adverse impacts **SEE PAGE 15 COL 7**

# Land officer assaulted Mugging spree in city

A man was stabbed to death and two people were shot in the capital yesterday in separate mugging incidents.

A mugger killed a cutting master of a garment factory, identified as Mizanul Haque Mizan, 37, at Cantonment area after snatching his mobile phone and money.

victim, said that passersby brought the injured Mizanul to his home in a CNG and she then rushed him to Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

He died around noon yesterday. Mizanul told her that he was stabbed

when he refused to hand over his mobile

phone.

She also said that Mizanul had returned to Dhaka from his village home in Bogra around 2:15am.

As he was looking for a bus in Cantonment to travel to his Manda residence, three muggers severely stabbed him in the chest, back and abdomen.

Mizanul had travelled to Bogra to Rehana Begum, a neighbor of the attend a family programme but he returned alone as his wife and children were staying on at their village residence.

The dead body has not been sent to the morgue because the incident occurred in the border jurisdiction of Cantonment and Kafrul police stations and neither are claiming responsibility to investigate.

Therefore an autopsy has not yet been conducted.

And in a separate incident, two persons were shot by muggers at Jhigatola under Hazaribag thana in the city yesterday.

The persons shot inside the hotel around 12pm were identified as Giasuddin, 40, a cashier of the sanitary shop Satata Shambhar at Paribagh and Mohammad Bahar, 23, a staff of hotel New Gausia at Jhigatola.

The owner of the store, Mohammad Sumon, said that Giasuddin, accompanied by Rubel, a shop assistant, went to Sonali Bank Hazaribag branch and withdrewTk60,000.

# Jamaat leader remanded again

4 more Shibir cadres held at RU

Police arrested four more cadres of Islami Chhatra Shibir, an associated organisation of Bangladesh Jamaat-e-Islami, at Rajshahi University yesterday. The arrestees are Rahat, a sixth semester student of manage-

ment department, Riad Ibne Ahad, Arifuzzaman and Monjurul Islam, third year students of law and justice department of the university. Sources said BCL activists beat up Rahat in front of the man-

agement department in Rabindra Arts building suspecting him

a Shibir cadre and handed him over to police around 12:30pm. Later, police picked up Riad, Arifuzzaman and Monjurul while they were taking the university exam. Following the arrests, the RU Institute of Business Administration (IBA) suspended all academic activities till

February 25 while departments of Marketing and Management postponed all scheduled exams indefinitely. Officer-in-Charge of Motihar Police Station Tofazzel Hossain said the arrests were made on suspicion of their involvement in six cases filed in connection with the recent RU violence. "We will take further action after interrogating

## Down in dumps

Tears were flooding the eyes of the three, who lost their mother Buddha Bati Chakma in a shooting allegedly by security personnel in Baghaichhari upazila Saturday morning.

Sumita Chakma, 19, her brother Jewel Chakma, 15, and their younger sister Rupna Chakma, 10, passed the last three days with their relatives in Bongaltali, some 15 kilometres away from their burned down house, without any help from the government.

They are passing the nights without warm clothes and the days in a single dress as everything they had was reduced to ashes in an arson attack allegedly by Bangalee settlers.

The helpless and shellshocked father Uttom Chakma has yet to recover from the loss and doesn't want to speak to anyone.
